your God: it is a statute forever throughout your generation in all your settlements.

²² When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleaning of your harvest; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the LORD your God.

Affirmation: We give that we might have more to give.

ENGAGE

God knows the secret of giving. The key that opens the doors to giving is in God's possession. It is carried in God's heart. God has shown us by precept and example. Did God not give God's only son? Did not God's Son give His life? We must trust their demonstration of word and deed. Who else are more trustworthy than this Father and Son? But remember, their reason for giving required dying! Our reason requires living!.

As we saw last week, the reasons for giving vary. The motivation reflects individual differences, and yet, at the same time, there are common causes that appeal to many of us. God allows for differences. No two persons are alike. That is God's will. Therefore, individual choices are available and permissible.

Some exercise their choice based on 2 Corinthians 9:6-8. it is a give-more, get-more paradigm. You reap what you sow! Therein lies a part of the reason some give. I say a part because there are manifold reasons for giving, some more noble and service-oriented than others.

Upon examining the giving motivation in Exodus 35:20-29, we discovered that the response to the giving appeal was based on multiple reasons. Primarily, it was because the Lord asked the Israelites to give Him the "Lord's offering." They were told what it was for and encouraged to give a generous freewill offering no obligation to give; no said amount to give; no intimidation, or obvious enticement to give. The response to the appeal was the impact of a combination of these factors The lesson today affords us another opportunity to explore reasons for giving.


EDUCATE

"The Lord spoke to Moses: ' Speak to the people of Israel and say to them..." (Leviticus 23:9) is an often used formula when God spoke to Moses to inform Moses of what He wanted conveyed to God's people Israel. This formula appears thirty times in Leviticus-five times in chapter twenty-three alone.

The initial verses of this lesson offer a good example of reasons for giving to the Lord. You should notice instantly that which is given to and for the Lord is not financial. Unfortunately, too often, when the subject is giving, our minds register dollar signs. In many cases, the alarm signals the alert offering

Eastertide covers a fifty-day period (six Sundays) that challenges persons to reflect on the resurrection of Jesus.

Ascension Day is celebrated the sixth Thursday after Easter and commemorates the last manifestation of Jesus to His followers after the resurrection. (Luke 24:50-51 and Acts 1:2-11.)

Ascension Sunday is the Sunday following Ascension Day. The season ends with the Day of Pentecost.

Color: White is the appropriate color for the season, with gold as an accent color. White is symbolic of light, joy, purity, glory, and the bright light of truth.

The Season After Pentecost covers 10-14 Sundays. The liturgical color is red for the Season After Pentecost. (May 20. 2018)

Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after the day of Pentecost. This Sunday emphasizes the three-fold manifestation of the Godhead (God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit/Ghost): three and yet one. White is the appropriate color.

Color: Red is symbolic of loyalty, power, witness, Christian zeal, blood, fire, the work and ministry of the Church, and the Holy Spirit.

UNDERSTANDING THE ORDER OF WORSHIP

The order of Worship can be found where?

The Discipline, The Hymnals, Church Bulletin

What is Worship?

Reverent honor and homage paid to God, or a sacred personage, or to any object regarded as sacred.

What is a Tabernacle?

- 1. A movable shelter, especially for religious worship by the Israelites. A place for worship: the human body.
- 2. A sacred tent and its furniture made according to a divine plan given to Moses in the mount.

The tabernacle was placed within a courtyard measuring 100 cubits by 50 cubits. It is also called the "Tent of Congregation".

The tabernacle was divided into two parts separated by a veil:

The Holy Place and The Holy of Holies

- 1. The Holy Place was twenty cubits long and ten cubits wide or 36.5ft x 18.5ft. It contained the Table of Shew bread, the golden candle stick and the Alter of Incense.
- 2. The Holy of Holies was ten cubits square or 18.5ft x 18.5ft.

The Alter of Incense is located inside the Holy Place.

The Alter of Incense was a raised structure upon which sacrifices were offered or incense burned. It was man's simplest and earliest effort to give outward expression of faith in God, the desire to worship, and his need of sacrifice for sin.

It was the idea of The Alter of Incense expanded by divine revelation to meet the needs of the nation for sacrifice and worship.

In chapter 25 – 27 of Exodus, God tells Moses what the Israelites must offer for the making of the Tabernacle.

In the layout there are two floor plans:

- 1. The plan of the Tabernacle (which Moses and the nation of Israel carry while journeying around in the wilderness.
- 2. The plan of Solomon's temple.

Note how similar they are.

There are five major parts to the tabernacle:

The Gate: The entrance to the tabernacle.

The Court: The area where the people gathered.

The Holy Place: This is where only the priests could enter.

The Veil: the entrance to the Holv Of Holies.

The Holy Of Holies: This is where only the High priests could enter. This 9:45 A.M. During this period those is also where the Ark was placed. The Ark not only served the purpose of housing the two tables of the Law, but it was also a symbolic throne for God, and reminded the Israelites of His constant presence in their midst.

Now let look at how we can apply this plan to how we worship today.

Our Service Of Worship: Sunday morning worship in our church represents another design in the human search for God. The movement of our worship is as altar stairs ascending to the living presence. Not content to remain in the sanctuary as a sheltered place, the worship culminates in a dedication of life to go forth in service to the world. In Protestant tradition worship has been known as a "meeting" in which persons meet together to meet God.

Our services are designed so that our members can have a full opportunity to worship. We begin our Morning Worship promptly at 10:00 A.M. We should make each moment with God in worship count for good.

Worshipers should really be in their seats at least ten minutes before the formal worship begins. This gives the worshiper time to prepare himself for worship in guiet meditation: to

withdraw his mind from all outside attractions.

Entering The Worship Area: When entering the worship area we must be concerned about those who are already in and meditating as they prepare for service. Considering this, it would follow that we would enter the sanctuary quietly and reverently; take our places and begin our meditation (save greeting for the close of the service). If possible all entering should be done during the PRELUDE. However, if one comes after the Prelude specific times will be set for their entrance.

The Actual Worship: The PRELUDE is the beginning of our period of meditation in preparation for worship. The organist will begin the prelude at who are in the sanctuary will be able to begin preparing themselves for worship service. It is a devout and quiet period and should be reserved for purposes of preparatory meditation.

The Call To Worship: At 10:00 A.M., the pastor will give the call to worship. This is the summons to attention, to waken absent-minded apathy. It is the recognition of the solemn privilege of meeting God. The introit declares God is in His Holy Temple. Let all keep silence before him.

THE GATE

The Processional: After the Introit, (Introit: a part of a Psalm with antiphon recited at the beginning of the service by the pastor) the PROCESSIONAL begins as the choir proceeds from the rear of the church to its position in the chancel. The congregation joins the choir in the singing of the processional. Processionals are dramatic invitations to advance into the presence of God, moving from a natural point of departure directly toward the altar. Processionals represent man's journey to God, an urgent forward march that lingers not, nor wanders, but moves onward to a definite goal.

the university.

The university itself had not been started until later in 1831. Since the church did not relocate too far from its inception-site we can envisage a continuous next-door neighborly relationship between the church and the school for a long time. Long before moving further west to its current location, the church had been recognized as the 'freedom' church and indeed registered as laying strategically on the 'underground railroad' system, aiding and comforting all who struggled to escape the ravages of servitude and oppression.

To celebrate this long, illustrious existence and continued dedication to the welfare of the community, Cross Street invited none other than Bishop George Edward Battle, the senior Bishop of the A.M.E. Zion Church as guest preacher for the anniversary day, Sunday, April 15, 2018.

All that history at the start of this essay is to further expand on the Bishop's message of the day, which paid a well-deserving homage to the black church at large and declared in no uncertain terms the grandeur and majesty of the universal church.

Bishop Battle painted the picture of the church as been the sanctuary for prayer, the source of hope, the foundation of faith and the beacon and stalwart light that continued to inspire the people who otherwise had nowhere else to turn to.

His message was so profound and strategic, considering the days

we live in and find ourselves. Even more so when we consider Attorney Bryan Stevenson's efforts at highlighting the extent and depth of the injustices that entire black people had to deal with in years not too far in our memories. His Equal Justice Initiatives are relevant and pertinent today because, according to Bishop Battle, the church successfully kept the people alive and fed them the elixir of hope until better day would manifest itself.

The Church has and will always be glorious because – it is one undeniable source of inspiration – source of hope – source of the courage to continue on and the source of unyielding faith that has and continues to see believers through the horrors of oppression, institutionalized segregation, blatant discrimination, vicious atrocities and lately; brutal authoritarian misuse of force resulting in numerous fatalities across the length and breadth of the country.

The 195th anniversary is a continuous event throughout the year. A momentous 195th Church Anniversary Cookbook is available for purchase at \$25. There is also the opportunity to get further involved with the need for financial support of the church's efforts by heeding the call of Reverend Dr. Nathan A. Proche of Detroit, who recommended donating \$1 for each of the 195 years of the church's existence. That is the \$195 campaign.

The universal Christian church, heeding the call to action by Christ, has made major, undeniable impact on people's lives all over the world. In its own fundamental way, the black church of America should pride itself as the glorious one. In the face of untold hardships and unbelievable circumstances of existence, where could the oppressed and the disenfranchised have turned to, but to the Lord, by way of the church? The subtle, never on anyone's conscious, is the other triumph of the black church in how it succeeded to make a home possible all over this country for other minority immigrants to live, to survive and to flourish in America.

labeling. I want to apologize right here, before I get deeper into this article that I personally love to admire and single out people who stand out in society. That means I am one of those who classify people and identify people and profile people. I do, more for insight than just labeling. I gain inspiration from such proven measures which those people might have used to achieve and establish their individual identities. I also try as best as I can to emulate them by consciously seeking new frontiers of purpose in order to forge new territories.

Think about this for a moment. Our language is replete with expressions such as 'winners' and 'losers', 'leaders' and 'followers', 'first' and 'last'. 'Inside' and 'outside', 'black' and 'white'. 'Front' and 'back', 'Alpha' and 'Omega', 'up' and 'down', 'here' and 'there', 'this' and 'that', 'what have you', 'love' and 'hate'. All of these expressions indicate classification, listing and labeling. They make it seem as if there are only those dual circumstances and nothing else. Certainly, in most social situations involving any kind of challenge you will have a 'BROAD' category of those who 'win', based on a definition of 'success' and those who do not. based on some accepted definition of 'failure'. Not winning does not make one a 'loser'. Life is not a 'black' and 'white' circumstance. Within the categories of those who 'win' and those who 'lose,' there are numerous other categories. And, it is within those two categories that you find the majority of humanity. The 'participants' of the human race. In effect, there are 'winners' and 'losers' and then the REST. They did not win, they did not lose, they are humanity.

Yes, there are leaders and there are followers. Then there are those folks in between. In some sense it may appear as if there are no others besides leaders and followers. But on second thought it is apparent that there is even a larger population of folks who neither lead nor follow. They don't compete. They match to their own drummers, they mind their

own business and they are in the majority. My point is that most circumstances require different perspectives and different approaches. It is up to the observer, that is you and me, to tune in to the events happening in our lives and to adjust our radar-antenna to the appropriate channel of reception to be able to participate accordingly.

In some sense, at some level, all of us belong in multiple categories at the same time. We lead in our families, yet we follow some other leader at work. We lead in church and yet follow the supervisor in our schools and other places. Then at some times we just don't fit into either category.

Well, the profiles of this month's cultural essay clearly defined their own categories. One was the first African American to receive a Bachelor's Degree from the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York and the other made life comfortable and subsequent inventions feasible with his numerous inventions. Both were 'giant' African American men whose categories you could not mistake. We can only just profile them for the benefit of the rest of us, mere mortals.

Landscape Engineer, Garnet Douglass Baltimore of the class of 1881 and Esteemed Inventor and Engineer W. Lincoln Hawkins of the Class of 1932 both of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, certainly defined their own personal categories.

As early as the 18th century, wherever black men found

themselves hemmed in by social and economic restrictions, thousands found legitimate ways to prosper, thereby sustaining their families and uplifting the community.

Many decades before affirmative action policies and "race-norming" of grades, when American blacks were expected to measure up to the same academic standards required of others, they excelled as chemists, biologists and engineers. Over the years, thousands achieved as scholars and professionals; in the mid -1930s, there were at least 300 black chemists employed in private industry in the United States.

Two distinguished graduates of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York, are Garnet D. Baltimore, an alumnus of the Class of 1881, and W. Lincoln Hawkins of the Class of 1932. Over their long, successful careers, both men were honored for their commitment and work. Baltimore, who was a native son of Troy (born there in 1859), entered Rensselaer to study engineering. On graduation, he first went to work as a civil engineer, and participated in the design and building of bridges, railroads, canals and waterways around New York State.

He is best known, however, for his gift that is seen and enjoyed daily by Troy's residents, that is, Prospect Park, billed as "84 acres of elegant nature. When private land was bought by the city, Baltimore was hired to conceive and design a park that could be enjoyed for leisure activities by all Troy's residents. He created a circular landscape with "winding roads and walks," gardens, a playground, a tennis court, pool, and an overlook which offered a breathtaking 25-mile view of the Hudson Valley.

Of all his duties and assignments, Baltimore loved his work as a landscape engineer, since it satisfied his highly developed sense of beauty. In 1903, he wrote, "[I am] firmly convinced that it is the calling and duty of the Landscape Engineer to devise ways of arranging land and its (If Profiled on page 13)

accompanying landscape so that whatever the particular purpose in view may be, the result shall be as thoroughly beautiful as possible."

Records show different dates for his death, but it is certain that he died in the mid-1940s around the age of 87.

In 1928, W. Lincoln Hawkins, who had just graduated from the acclaimed all-black Dunbar High School in Washington, DC, passed the demanding entrance exam at Rensselaer and enrolled in his first year. It was the beginning of what was to be an extraordinary career that was to span 34 years as a scientist at AT&T's Bell Laboratories, where he was granted 145 U.S. and foreign patents for his inventions.

Hawkins is respected most for his work on a polymer that was initially developed for use as synthetic rubber. Up to World War II, telephone cables had been insulated with lead, which proved impractical for a variety of reasons. British scientists developed a polymer which seemed practical, because it could be manufactured so cheaply. However, this material proved useless, since it would break down in severe hot or cold weather and, therefore, made for poor cable insulation.

After experiments, Hawkins decided that the polymer did possess all the right gualities, but simply lacked over 50 scientific papers and three "stability." He and his partner, Victor Lanza, set out to resolve the problem. His co-invention, which prevented the breakdown or oxidation of the polymer earned him wide recognition as an eminent scientist. For it is this ingenious discovery that made inexpensive plastic insulation of telephone cables possible and, most important, made universal telephone service economical.

In 1963, Hawkins became Bell Labs' Supervisor of Applied Research and in 1972, he became department head. Over the years, Hawkins was honored by all the many professional associations to which he belonged. One account claims that he "won enough awards and honorary degrees to fill a memorial library." He published

books.

After mandatory retirement from Bell Labs in 1976, he energetically continued working in his field. He taught at New York's Polytechnic Institute, acted as technical consultant to chemical and pharmaceutical companies around the country, and was research director of the Plastics Institute of America.

He is revered for his lifelong dedication to helping black youngsters develop science skills and for his work with educators to expand science programs at black colleges. Hawkins credited much of his success to the strict academic demands of his teachers at Dunbar High School, which today would be scorned for being "segregated," but at the time, measured up to other institutions as one of the finest schools in the country. In an interview in 1992, Hawkins made reference to American blacks' recognition in sports and entertainment, claiming that "Youngsters need more than that." Through his generous service and dedication, Lincoln Hawkins gave them much more than that.

A congregation that joins in the processional hymn with understanding The Call to Prayer: This call may be is advancing to meet God.

The Invocation: The INVOCATION is the calling of a superior being to be present. This prayer offers salutations to God and invokes his presence in the worship. It may be a vocal salutation, sung by the choir. The Morning Hymn: This is the first hymn of the worship service. It expresses praise, rejoicing in gratitude and ascribes glory and honor to His Name.

The Responsive Reading: The **RESPONSIVE READING** is the opportunity for the whole congregation to share in the reading of the word. The responsive reading reflects the togetherness of the congregation toward its central theme of worshipping God.

The Gloria Patri: The GLORIA PATRI is said or sung to bridge the gap between the Old Testament Scriptures and the New Testament Scriptures. It expresses our belief in the Judeo Christian Faith.

The Affirmation Of Faith: The AFFIRMATION OF FAITH is a constructive act of rejoicing in the truth. To recite a creed is to declare a faith with conviction as a code to live by and die for. There is value in confessing the faith that binds the worshipers to a common heritage.

The Scripture Lesson: The SCRIPTURE LESSON is guiding thought to spiritual verities. The lesson should be carefully chosen. A reader who is absorbed in the message to the point of forgetting himself becomes a voice for the utterance of truth. The Bible holds a central place in Christian worship as

the voice of divine revelation.

said by the minister as sung by the choir. It is intended to prepare the people for prayer. It assures the congregation of God's willingness to hear and answer prayer.

THE HOLY PLACE

The Pastoral Prayer: The PASTORAL PRAYER is a meeting of mutual concerns. Extempore prayers may wander far or settle into ruts of wellworn phrases. Yet to read pravers is often to miss the sense of direct address to God. Here, if anywhere, worship is seeking to meet and commune with God. One who is equally aware of the divine Presence and of human dependence is in the mood of prayer. To voice the needs of men and the desire of God to meet those needs is a priestly privilege and responsibility of the minister.

The Choral Section: CHORAL SECTION is a musical outburst to express praise, icing in gratitude, faith and consecration.

Pastoral Observations & Announcements: At this point we give announcements of church activities and special observations by the pastor.

The Offering: The OFFERING dramatizes the generous impulse to give. The gift without the giver is bare, yet if the giver offers himself, there is counter. It may be the climax of the whole service if one makes it a complete offering in dedication to God. The historic devotion of sacrifice is reenacted here, when the worshiper Reverend Vernon A. Shannon, was brings forward to the altar his sacrificial gifts to offer his best to God. A genuine offering has the emotional release of surrender and the votive act of dedicating oneself as a living

sacrifice.

THE VEIL

The Hymn Of Preparation: This is a carefully chosen hymn intended to prepare the congregation to receive the message.

THE HOLY OF HOLIES

The Sermon: The SERMON is central in many Protestant services, bringing a united search for the deeper meaning and concerns of the religious life, to declare and decide to follow this wav.


The Invitation: After the exposition of God's word, we "Open the doors of the Church," and extend the invitation to Christian Discipleship to those who would declare and decide to follow in the Way. The hymn is sung as an indication of our desire to be consecrated to Him.

The Recessional: The RECESSIONAL provides a formal closing for the service. It signifies marching forth to serve humanity.


The Benediction: The BENEDICTION offers repose easily lost in closing the service. The benediction sends the worshiper forth with the guiding and sustaining presence "Even unto the end of the world." Matt. 28:20

The Postlude: This is the period of reflection on the worship experience. In these moments of quietness before dismissal the value of the whole service may be summed up in perspective.

times. The mood seldom stays the same. At this point, no commentary is forthcoming on the nature of the change. This is just an observation that there is a change. What has been your experience?

What we give is related to why we are giving, that is the purpose for what is given. The purpose could be worship, financial, ecclesiastical (church administration) biblical law, theological, doctrinal, et cetera. A quick glance at the scriptural text from Leviticus indicates that the matter at hand is legal and worship matter. The ELEVATE concern is the requirements of the Levitical law and how it plays out in personal living and religious life.

Verses 10-14 make plain what the gifts for the rituals are to be, other required details are clearly stated, the participants are listed, and the ceremonial offerings are cited. The Lord spoke with clarity and specificity. The instructions were:

- 1. Bring the sheaf (bundled stalks of the first fruits of the fall harvest. Barley is generally the first fruits because they first ripen in the spring and used for grain offering in the fall.
- 2. The first fruit is received by the priest for ceremonial purposes. The sheaf is raised before the Lord for acceptance.
- 3. After the raising of the sheaf, a burnt offering of a year-old lamb, without blemish is sacrificed.
- 4. The grain offering also called the meal offering with its pleasing aroma was presented. It was meatless and bloodless-thus, the name or meal offering.
- 5. The drink offering was a part of the festive observances. It accompanied the grain offering. It was daily and in the morning.

These festivals were (are) celebrated because they commemorate, show appreciation, honor, and serve as an unending story of the blessings of YAHWEH. The regular re-enactment perpetuate history, tradition, and the favor of God. What they give is an unending story of God and His people.

Oh! The reason they give? They just love to tell this story!

A final reason for giving is as important as any we have. Give that the poor and the foreign may have something. You see, not reaping to the edges and not gleaning completely are ways of giving. Reasons to give are as many there are needs to be met. But surely, God's word, saying, "Do it" and a need that would leave only the heartless untouched, are sufficient cause!

What is the true nature of humankind? Is self-preservation its first law? "I got mine. You get yours." is that the extent of our concern for one another? Is our extended, open hand seeking to give or to receive?

If we were reaping and gleaning and we heard the voice of God say, "That's enough; don't get any more; leave some for the poor and the foreigner, what would we say and do? Regarding the poor, would this cold retort be heard? "They are poor because they want to be. It wasn't easy for me either. They should have gotten a better job. I did. Their kids are just bad. No one can help them because they don't want any help. Other kids did okay in that school. They must have done something wrong for the police to arrest them and beat them. Had they not been there, they would not have been shot. No Lord, I am not going to leave my reaping out there to go to waste. I worked too hard to grow that crop!"

Now consider this second quote: "There are too many 'aliens' in our country already. They are one of the reasons why a lot of Americans can't get jobs. We must stop them at the border. Whatever it takes, they must be stopped. These foreigners should stay in their own country. This is our country that they are destroying thieves, thugs, drug suppliers, and gang bangers. They are filling our school and don't even speak English.

Remember 911 and the Boston Marathon, to name two terrorist attacks, and the many that they are planning. You can be in their midst and never know if they are plotting. They don't believe in God, foreigners, aliens, terrorists that they are."

Note: These last two paragraphs are random statements made by many ill-advised, violent, thoughtless, dangerous individuals who are found in village, cities, states, provinces, countries the world over.

The persons just quoted have not found a reason to give - neither to God or anyone else. Giving is neither in their heart, on their minds, nor in their plans. Giving as an act is preceded by thoughts about, interest in, or desire to give.

Our lesson demonstrated that Israel had reasons to give, was opened to give to God and share with each other, all to the honor and glory of God. To elevate this lesson to the next level, we must ask the inevitable question, not o

When he saw the flyer at our local church asking for volunteers for caring for the gardens behind the minister's residence, he responded in his characteristically unassuming manner. Without fanfare, he just signed up. He was well into his 87th year when the very thing we had always feared finally happened.

He was just finishing his watering for the day when three gang members into fall. Carl was doing some tilling approached him. Whoso findeth a wife findeth a good thing, and obtaineth favour of the Lord. (Proverbs 18:22)

Live joyfully with the wife whom thou lovest all the days of the life of thy

vanity, which he hath given thee under the sun, all the days of thy vanity: for that is thy portion in this life, and in thy labour which thou takest under the sun. (Ecclesiastes 9:9)

For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as

the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in every thing. Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it; That he might sanctify and cleanse it with

> the washing of water by the word. That he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish. So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself. For no man ever

yet hated his own flesh; but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the church: For we are members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones. For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh. This is a great mystery: but I speak concerning Christ and the church. unbelievable splendor and perfection. One day he left his home to go to a place marked by poverty and pain and become part of a low-income, working -class family. As an adult, he sometimes didn't even have a place to sleep at night.

But here's the best part of the story: He did that for you an me.

One writer said this about that Person: "Though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty he could make you rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

His name is Jesus; and He took that journey from heaven to earth to "save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21).

He did that by dying on a cross as a sacrifice for you and me. He took the punishment for our sin on that cross, and He rose from the dead to show His power over death. Then He rejoined His Father in heaven.

Because of Jesus's willingness to do God's will (John 6:38) and to give up so much for us, we can enjoy an abundant life on this earth-not material blessings, but God's presence, help, guidance, and love in our lives. And He promised us we will someday enjoy His home in heaven with Him forever.

What is our part in all of this? How can we establish this vital relationship with Jesus?

Frist, we need to recognize that we need what He did for us. This simply means we acknowledge we are sinners- that we have done things that are wrong. Scripture helps us with that: "Everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard" (Romans 3:23).

Next, we must realize that when Jesus came to earth, He was here to rescue us. That is why this perfect, sinless Man allowed Himself to be killed on a wooden cross. He alone could bear our sin. Finally, we need to understand that there's nothing we can do on our own to establish a relationship with God. The Bible, God's message of hope, says, "God saved you by his grace when you believed. And you can't take credit for this; it is a gift from God. Salvation is not a reward for the good things we have done" (Ephesians 2:8-9). It's vital that we place our faith in Jesus's gift of salvation through His sacrifice.

Then we can say to Jesus, Thank You for dying on the cross for me. I realize I am a sinner, and I'm putting my faith in You to forgive my sin. I accept Your free gift of salvation. I trust You to save me, guide me, and someday allow me to enjoy the splendor of heaven with you.

If this is your heartfelt expression of faith in Christ, you have become a key part of God's great story. Welcome to God's forever family!

FACT, NOT FABLE

READ: 1 Corinthians 15:1-19

If Christ is not risen, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins! -1 Corinthians 15:17

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the cornerstone of the Christian faith. Without it we have no hope for this life nor the life to come. That's why it is important to recognize that our belief in Christ's resurrection is not based on a religious feeling or unfounded rumor, but on historical fact with solid evidence to support it.

A century ago, a group of lawyers met in England to discuss the biblical accounts of Jesus' resurrection. They wanted to see if enough information was available to make a case that would hold up in a court of law. They concluded that Christ's resurrection was one of the most well-established facts of history.

In his book *Countdown*, G. B. Hardy offers some thought-provoking questions about the resurrec-tion: "There are but two essential requirements: (1) Has any one cheated death and proved it? (2) Is it available to me?" Hardy goes on to declare that only the tomb of Jesus is empty. And because Jesus conquered sin and death, we who put our faith in Him will share in His resurrection.

"If Christ is not risen, your faith is futile," Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 15:17. Historical evidence and countless changed lives testify that the resurrection of Jesus is a fact. Have you put your hope in the risen Christ? - Dave Egner

Christ's resurrection is more than a fact of history it's the proof of our salvation. Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me. Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended: but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forward to those things which are ahead. I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. Therefore, let us, as many as are mature, have this mind; and if in any thing you think otherwise, God will reveal even this to you. Nevertheless. to the degree that we have already attained. let us walk by the same rule. let us be of the same mind. Philippians 3:12-16

I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me. Philippians 4:13 Warmly welcome everyone possible, especially the children.

Help children participate by sharing bulletins, hymnals and Bibles as they are used. Point to the words as they are read or sing.

However small their offering might be, let them place it on the offering plate.

They will rejoice at being included.

Also, let them sign their own name on the attendance registration pad or card.

Be patient when children participate as a group in worship.

Their singing or Scripture reading or little dramas mean a great deal to them.

If they make mistakes, compliment them on their willingness to be in front of the congregation anyway.

While parents should accept responsibility for a child that disrupts worship, the rest of us need to accept interruptions occasionally as part of the joy of having children in worship with us.

Pray for the children.

They need all of the blessings of God possible ... as do we all.

hen I was growing up, my two sisters and I liked to sit side-by-side on top of my mother's large cedar-lined chest. My mom kept our wool sweaters in it and handiwork that was embroidered or crocheted by my grandmother. She valued the contents of the chest and relied on the pungent odor of the cedar wood to discourage moths from destroying what was inside.

Most earthly possessions can easily be destroyed by insects or rust, or can even be stolen. Matthew 6 encourages us to place a special focus-not on things that have a limited lifespan but on those that have eternal value. When my mom died at fifty-seven, she had not accumulated a lot of earthly possessions, but I like to think about the treasure she stored up in heaven (vv. 19-20).

I recall how much she loved God and served Him in

quiet ways: caring faithfully for her family, teaching children in Sunday School, befriending a woman abandoned by her husband, comforting a young mother who had lost her baby. And she prated....Even after she lost her sight and became confined to a wheelchair, she continued to love and pray for others.

Our real treasure isn't measured in what we accumulate-- but in what or whom we invest our time and our passions. What "treasures" are we storing up in heaven by serving and following Jesus? Cindy Hess Kasper
