PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

Dear Immanuel Family and Friends,

In 1 Thessalonians 5:18 we find the following words, **"Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you".** With these words, the Apostle Paul wrote to a church that was used to suffering great persecution under evil Roman rule. St. Paul understood what the church was facing. He was beaten, thrown in jail, and ultimately put to death because of the faith that he held so dear. Yet in the suffering that he himself and the church of Thessalonica was facing, St. Paul wrote these words of encouragement. "Give thanks in all circumstances...".



Friends, these words are applicable to us today as well. Our world, country, state, and communities are suffering with cases of Covid-19, loss of employment, the inability to see our loved ones in the hospitals, nursing homes, and independent living facilities. Businesses are closing their doors, livelihoods are being uprooted, and the mental, emotional, physical, and spiritual health of everyone is suffering.

The church is no different. Though in many places, in person services are now beginning to resume, it will not be as we are accustomed. There will be no handshaking, singing without masks, nor the ability to have food and fellowship. In some places, even the celebration of Holy Communion will look a little differently and some of the people whom we love will remain at home a little longer. And in some countries, Christians are not only suffering, but they are being put to death because they believe in Jesus who died for them.

How should we then as children of God respond to this suffering? I think this is a fine time to take St. Paul's words to heart. Folks, give thanks. Things are uncomfortable right now. They will continue to be for the foreseeable future. This includes a few of the things we've grown accustomed to doing at church (sitting where we want, pot lucks, hugging and shaking hands, etc.). Yet, I encourage you that even now, to give thanks. God's not withdrawn Himself from us. He still gives us His Word that is like a balm to our hurting hearts. His gift of the Holy Sacrament is still present so that our faith is

In closing, I wanted to also take a moment this month to thank God for fathers. They are bestowed by our loving heavenly Father to be spiritual heads of their families. It's not an easy task and not every man is given that vocation. But being a father is important for they are called to protect their families, provide for them, and to create life and to teach what God's Word says about the sanctity of human life. Fathers, we honor and thank you!

Thank you Lord for your blessings on us even when we suffer. Amen.


MALIM Grant Funds Online Services

Plans are moving forward with livestreaming our Sunday worship service. After having received quotes from suppliers, Immanuel applied for and received a \$3000.00 grant from MALIM (Mid-Atlantic Lutherans in Mission) to fund the project.

In response to the current crisis with COVID-19, Mid -Atlantic Lutherans in Mission has made available Art Scherer Memorial Crisis Response Grants to Southeastern District (SED) congregations or preschools/day care centers. A Letter From Immanuel's Music Director, Dennis Janko:

"To everything there is a season and a time to every purpose under heaven . . . a time to keep and a time to put away." (Ecclesiastes 3)

I began singing in the Lutheran School children's choir when I was seven and played my first church service when I was thirteen. After graduating from Concordia University in Illinois, I became a Commissioned Minister of the Gospel when I began my career as a Lutheran school teacher and Director of Church Music in Hyattsville, MD. I was there for forty-five years serving as teacher, musician, principal and working on District and Synodical worship committees.

Caron and I moved to Delaware in 2005 and

were attracted to the worship style and music at Immanuel, Preston, MD. We both sang in the choir and played handbells and I did some service playing. In 2008, President Ruth Thomas offered me the position of organist and Director of Music at Immanuel. Caron and I thought we could help.

Over these past twelve years, I and the pastors, singers and ringers, soloists, instrumentalists, and organists, developed a program of lead-










On June 11, the Church remembers and gives thanks to God for St. Barnabas, Apostle.

A Jewish Levite who originally hailed from the island of Cyprus, Barnabus steps into history in the account Luke provides in Acts 4. Originally named Joseph, this godly man sold some of his temporal possessions and laid the a second journey, Barnabas was willing to give John proceeds at the feet of the Twelve. This was to aid the poor in Jerusalem and support the Church's mission. The apostles gave him the name Barnabas, which means "Son of Encouragement." We also learn from Acts that Barnabas was cousin to the young John Mark, who would be the author of the second Gospel.



After Paul's conversion and initial ministry in Damascus, he visited Jerusalem but found the Church as a whole leery of this former persecutor. Barnabas, however, took Paul under his wing and introduced him to the apostles. He told them the story of what had happened to their erstwhile opponent.

When word reached the apostles that something was stirring in Antioch, where Gentiles were beginning to call on the name of Jesus, they dispatched Barnabas to investigate. Barnabas was overjoyed at the Spirit's work. He immediately headed to Tarsus to fetch Paul and bring him into the work. Worshiping together in Antioch, the Spirit foretold a famine to afflict Judea. The two were sent to bring relief to the Jerusalem Church. Later, the Spirit instructed that Barnabas and Saul be set aside for the work to which He had called them. They were then dispatched on the first great missionary journey, spreading the saving name of Jesus to Jew and Gentile throughout Asia Minor.

Accompanying them on that journey at first was John Mark, but he did not complete the work and returned home. When the traveling companions contemplated Mark a second chance. Paul, at the time, thought it inadvisable. The two ended up sharply contending dividing. Barnabas and Mark headed to Cyprus while Paul and Silas traveled first to Asia Minor and then into Europe.

From 1 Corinthians 9:6, it is apparent that Barnabas followed the same pattern as Paul in not making use of his right as a minister of the Gospel to receive pay. He was clearly known to the Church there, and he is also mentioned in Galatians 2:13. He is not mentioned again in the pages of the New Testament. A document survives from the Early Church known as the The Epistle of Barnabas, but scholarly consensus is that it is not authentic. Tradition suggests that Barnabas died a martyr's death in Cyprus, continuing to preach the Good News to his native land, being stoned to death after first being tortured.

Almighty God, Your faithful servant Barnabas sought not his own renown but gave generously of his life and substance for the encouragement of the apostles and their ministry. Grant that we may follow his example in lives given to charity and the proclamation of the Gospel; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
