ADVENT AND BONHOEFFER

"The celebration of Advent is possible only to those who are troubled in soul, who know themselves to be poor and imperfect, who look forward to something greater to come. For these, it is enough to wait in humble fear until the Holy One himself comes down to us, God in the child in the manger. God comes. The Lord Jesus comes. Christmas comes. Christians rejoice!" – Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Once again this year the Duke Lutherans will lead St. Paul's in our Wednesday night Advent worship services. Everyone is invited to join us at 7 pm on December 2, 9, 16, and 23, as we gather virtually via Zoom, together with our undergraduate and graduate students who've returned to their homes for winter break. Although we will deeply miss celebrating Advent and receiving Communion in the beautiful St. Paul's sanctuary, we trust that worshipping in this way will keep everyone as safe as possible. (The Zoom link and bulletin will be shared closer to December.)



As we pray and sing Evening Prayer (*Vespers*), we will also hear Advent Scripture texts paired with excerpts from Dietrich Bonhoeffer's writings and sermons. Bonhoeffer (1906-1945) was a German Lutheran pastor and theologian. As a founder member of the Confessing Church, he participated in the German Resistance movement against Nazism. His involvement in plans by members of the *Abwehr* (the German Military Intelligence Office) to assassinate Adolf Hitler resulted in his arrest in April 1943 and his subsequent execution by hanging in April 1945, shortly before the war's end. The Church commemorates Bonhoeffer as a martyr and witness on April 9, the anniversary of his death.

Bonhoeffer is also very special to the Duke Lutherans community because his teaching that we are "called to life together" defines our identity and mission. "Christ opened up the way to God and to one another. Now Christians can live with each other in peace; they can love and serve one another; they can become one" (*Life Together*).

We hope you will join us this Advent as we eagerly await Emmanuel's birth! Peace, Pastor Amanda

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

Caring for Those Wounded by Racism

Recently, the Rev. Kenneth C. Haugk, the founder of Stephen Ministry, sent a mailing to St. Paul's Stephen Leaders. Following are excerpts from his important message.

"The horrific and tragic deaths of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, and others are just the most recent wrongs inflicted upon people of color. At Stephen Ministries, we grieve with those who have lost loved ones through racial violence. We grieve with those who have suffered the pain and abuse of racism. And we grieve for a country stained by the sins of slavery, the false promises of Reconstruction, the injustices of decades of Jim Crow and segregation, and the ongoing acceptance of racism in all its forms. Stephen Ministries condemns the sins of racism and the impact that historic, deeply rooted, and systemic inequities have on our staff, the congregations and communities we serve, and our nation.

"Whether recent, or sustained over generations, the wounds of racism are deep ... I am encouraged by the work of Stephen Leaders and Stephen Ministers throughout the country and the world who continue to let the light of Christ shine into the lives of wounded people. The skills honed as Stephen Leaders and Stephen Ministers are vital in caring for those suffering from injustice. The simple act of genuine, respectful listening can start the healing process. Listen, empathize, and validate the suffering person's feelings, remembering that the anger and pain people of color may be expressing now is rooted in hundreds of years of denial and neglect."

Dr. Haugk closes with the following:

"The very best gift you can offer a suffering person is a heart full of understanding, eyes filled with tears, and ears ready to listen."
