HOMELESS AMERICANS FINALLY GETTING CHANCE AT COVID VACCINE



Homeless Americans who have been left off priority lists for coronavirus vaccinations — or even bumped aside as states shifted eligibility to older age groups — are finally getting their shots as vaccine supplies increase.

While the U.S. government has only incomplete data on infections among homeless people, it's clear that crowded, unsanitary conditions at shelters and underlying poor health increase the danger of COVID-19 infections, severe complications and death.

COVID-19 outbreaks have been documented at homeless shelters in cities such as Boston, San Francisco and Seattle. Vaccinating in vulnerable areas will be a key to achieving herd immunity, the goal of building a barrier of protected people to stop uncontrolled spread.

"It was important for me to protect myself and the health and welfare of others," said Cidney Oliver, 39, who got her first dose of Moderna vaccine April 7 at the Seattle YWCA shelter where she sleeps.

Wanona Thibodeaux-Lee, 43, has lived in several Seattle shelters while trying to get back on her feet, most recently at WHEEL, a 26-bed women's shelter in a church basement. On April 5, she received the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

"I feel like I can move around without anyone getting me sick," she said. "It's good to know that I don't have to go back for a second one." The single-shot vaccine is preferred by many clinics who serve homeless people and by homeless people themselves, said Bobby Watts, CEO of the National Health Care for the Homeless Council.

Vaccinating homeless people is good for the health of everyone, said Los Angeles Deputy Mayor Jose "Che" Ramirez.

"We're all in it together. The more shots in arms the better," Ramirez said. "The more folks who are vaccinated, the stronger we are in building herd immunity and the faster we can reopen our city and engage with each other like we were before."

TWO BLOCKS FROM THE FEDERAL RESERVE, A GROWING ENCAMPMENT OF THE HOMELESS GRIPS THE ECONOMY'S MOST POWERFUL PERSON

As he drove past the intersection of 21st and E streets in Northwest Washington, a 68-year-old man peered through the window, struck by an encampment of homeless people here that grew from 10 tents to 20 in the past year. Then 30. Now 40 The people living in those

tents had no idea that their burgeoning village kept this man, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome H. Powell, up at night, or that he kept thinking about them as he drove two blocks south to his office. Powell doesn't know their names or backstories, either. But what he saw was clear. A visceral reminder of

the uneven economic recovery. Right there in the Fed's shadow.

It's in these brief interludes
— when the most powerful
person in the economy passes some of the most powerless — that Powell grapples
with one of the most vexing

HUD: Growth Of Homelessness During 2020 Was 'Devastating,' Even Before The Pandemic

The nation's homeless population grew last year for the fourth year in a row. On a single night in January 2020, there were more than 580,000 individuals who were homeless in the United States, a 2% increase from the year before. The numbers, released by the Department of Housing and Urban Development Thursday, do not reflect the impact of the pandemic. "And we know the pandemic has only

made the homelessness crisis worse," HUD Secretary Marcia Fudge said in a video message accompanying the report. She called the numbers "devastating" and said the nation has a "moral responsibility to end homelessness." Among the report's more sobering findings: homelessness among veterans and families did not improve for the first time in many years.

Also, more than 106,000 children were homeless during the once-a-year count, conducted in most communities across the nation. While the majority of homeless children were in shelters or transitional housing, almost 11,000 were living outside. As has been the case for years, a disproportionate share of those experiencing homelessness were Black — about 39% of the total.

economic conundrums facing the central bank, and the country, 14 months into the coronavirus crisis. How Biden stimulus bill will target homelessness

Powell referenced the tent city three times in the span of seven days, including in a "60 Minutes" interview and on a panel hosted by the International Monetary Fund. During a talk

with the Economic Club of Washington D.C. on Wednesday, Powell mentioned the encampment again, saying the homeless should be part of any assessment of the economy's strength.

"They need to be in the room with us as we make our decisions," Powell \$19 million in stimulus going to fight D.C. homelessness Powell moved fast. On

March 3, 2020, the Fed announced an emergency interest rate cut, then slashed rates to zero twelve days later. By the end of the month, the Fed outlined a sprawling set of programs to rescue the financial system.

Word on The Street — The Unanswerable Question of the Homeless and the Commanding Officer Trying to Make a Difference

When CAPT. ED RAMIREZ OF THE Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's West Hollywood Station met with the City Council for an update on public safety, the intoxicating congratulatory smiles over the drop in major crime quickly changed to the sobering reality of the human crisis facing most American communities. Homelessness and the associated issues. It is a personal issue with Ramirez, a man with three decades in the Sheriff's Department with a strong belief in community involvement. He serves as a board member for the nonprofit Shelter Partnership, a homeless support organization. "I'm happy to think outside, even remove, the box if it's not immoral, ille-

Let's try it," said Ramirez in outlining his approach to involvement in a community when he became the new commanding officer of the West Hollywood Sheriff's Station two years ago. SHE WORKS IN A HOMELESS SHELTER, AND SHE LIVES IN ONE, TOO

At the end of a 16-hour double shift at a homeless shelter in Queens, Amber Drummond, a security guard, was desperate to relax. But Ms. Drummond said she shared a room with a woman who was messy and constantly on her phone.

The room is in a Radisson Hotel. The hotel, in Queens, is another homeless shelter. where Ms. Drummond lives.


She has lived in four different shelters since 2019, often working two jobs, while spending her days off searching for an apartment she can afford. She has looked at some 30 places across the city but said landlords had rejected her applications.

"Why am I still failing?" said Ms. Drummond, who is


paid \$16.50 an hour.

Ms. Drummond's story is not unique. Many workers who tend to New York City's most vulnerable residents are themselves in precarious economic situations. Some take on multiple jobs, work staggering amounts of overtime and still struggle to find their own homes.
