OUR FOUNDER: PEGGY ANN WALPOLE




Peggy Ann Walpole worked as a nurse in the Emergency Room of St. Michael's Hospital in the 1950's. There she encountered many women who suffered from the debilitating effects of life on the street; violence, isolation, poverty and poor health. Peggy Ann was frustrated, knowing that once these women were treated and discharged, most had nowhere safe to go.

And so Peggy Ann founded Street Haven at the Crossroads in 1965, a drop-in centre where women could have a cup of coffee and access assistance, without judgement. Next, she bought a stately old mansion on Pembroke Street and opened the first Emergency Shelter for homeless women in Toronto. Over the years, Peggy Ann added supportive housing, residential and community addiction treatment, and a learning centre to Street Haven's roster of life-saving services.

Peggy Ann devoted her life to our community's most vulnerable women. She was awarded the Ontario Good Citizenship Medal and was appointed a Member of the Order of Canada. Peggy Ann died in 2006 but her legacy lives on in the work we do at Street Haven, every day.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

In June 2006 I joined Street Haven's Board of Directors. At the time I was reasonably knowledgeable about the needs of Toronto's most marginalized women but I was unaware of the scope and complexity of the organization and the exceptional dedication and caring of the individuals that worked to meet the needs of these women. Over the last 10 years, the Board of Directors has worked with the management team to successfully meet these needs and to respond to the very challenging fiscal realities of these years. This was achieved in a way that balanced thoughtful innovation, cost effectiveness and caring.



The result is a stronger organization, and one that still honours the legacy of Street Haven's founder, Peggy Ann Walpole who, 50 years ago, recognized the need to provide a safe, accepting and empowering space for marginalized women.

In September I retire from my position as Street Haven's president of the Board of Directors. Retirements often initiate reflection. For me this reflection centres on the question: how far have we really come as a society in addressing the needs of marginalized and homeless individuals? In 1965, the Rt. Hon. Lester B. Pearson said the following to the Ontario Association of Housing Authorities: "Your immediate problem is not so much the right of the soul to expand, but the necessity for everyone to have a decent dwelling; not to make homes mansions, but to ensure that none of them are hovels. It is only a rare soul that can expand in a hovel. The objective of decent housing has to be achieved in our democratic society."

To me it is clear, as a society, we have a long way to go.

"Street Haven gave me a sense of home for the first time in my life. They showed me what unconditional love was, and in that I learned to love myself."

It is my hope that when you contribute to Street Haven, with a financial gift, donation of goods or volunteer time, that you reflect on Shelly's words and the profound difference you are making in the lives of some of the most vulnerable women in our city. Yes, you are providing a bed and a meal, but you are also providing so much more—you are providing a woman with a home, with love. Is there anything more important that we can do in this world?

STREET HAVEN IMPACT REPORT 2015-16: SERVICES FOR WOMEN EXPERIENCING OR AT RISK OF HOMELESSNESS

Emergency Shelter

Street Haven's Emergency Shelter provides 50 women with a safe place to sleep, nourishing meals, clothing, hot showers and medical supports, as well as access to counselling. Every night, the shelter is filled to capacity. Some women stay a few days and others stay longer than a year, due to the scarcity of affordable housing in Toronto. The women who seek refuge at Street Haven have experienced poverty, violence, addiction, illness, trauma and exploitation.

Our **Housing Within Shelters** program staff assist women in the shelter to find adequate housing, which can mean renting a room or securing a subsidized or market-rent apartment. Staff also support clients to maintain housing after their move. This can include eviction prevention, negotiations with creditors and pre-employment supports. In 2015–16, staff located housing for 59 women, 12 of whom found employment, 11 enrolled in school and 14 became active volunteers. Staff also helped an additional 53 women to maintain their housing.

Supportive Housing

Street Haven's Supportive Housing program offers accommodation for 32 women in three different locations in downtown Toronto, each with a varying degree of staffing based on the clients' needs. Through these locations, women who are recovering from trauma, mental wellness challenges or substance abuse issues, as well as homelessness, learn to set their own goals, live independently and become active members of the community. The program offers a variety of workshops to enhance life-skills and communication.

Two of Street Haven's Supportive Housing locations are located on the same block as the Emergency Shelter, providing women with opportunities to socialize, volunteer and become mentors.

The Learning Centre

The Street Haven Learning Centre is located at the Adelaide Resource Centre for Women and offers comprehensive education opportunities for women. The majority of learners are marginalized or socially isolated women. Many are homeless or precariously housed, and have experienced challenges related to mental health, trauma or addiction.

The Literacy and Basic Skills Program offers women the option of participating in individual tutoring, small groups and a larger classroom. The program is funded by the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development and follows the Ontario Adult Literacy Curriculum Framework. The Pre-Employment Program, including the Computer Lab, is funded by the City of Toronto, Housing Stability Policy & Strategic Investments.

Community Outreach

Street Haven's **Homelessness Education Initiative** is a series of staff-led workshops that deconstruct myths about homelessness and provide the community with tools needed to make positive change. In its first year, workshops were presented to middle school and high school students in Toronto.

NADIA RAJARAM: FROM STREET HAVEN LEARNER TO DEAN'S HONOUR LIST

Nadia Rajaram's path to the Dean's Honour List at George Brown College was not an easy one. In her youth she felt the public school system did not adequately support her and held her back in special education classes. This left her with doubt about her ability to attend post-secondary schooling.

But Nadia is the embodiment of determination. She began attending the Street Haven Learning Centre in 2010, hoping to upgrade her skills in reading, writing and numeracy. Nadia found so much more—she found community and the encouragement she needed to persevere. And after five years at the Learning Centre, Nadia received great news—she had been accepted into George Brown College's Applied Life Skills, Communication Technology and Career Life Transition program. Then more good news—Nadia was awarded Street Haven's Peggy Ann Walpole scholarship to assist with her tuition fees. Now in her third semester at George Brown, Nadia is on the Dean's Honour List for the second time and plans to study in the Community Worker program.

"I feel that the Street Haven Learning Centre is a second home to me. I know I have my own home, but this is my home too. In high school, I never felt like I was wanted, but coming here I felt good and was accepted."

RESIDENTIAL AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH ADDICTION SERVICES

Residential Services: Grant House

With ten regular beds and one emergency bed, this intensive six-month residential program uses trauma-centred approaches that allow women to express themselves and learn to cope and work through the trauma that led them to rely on substances. Through workshops and one-on-one sessions with their counsellors, women are able to focus on making profound changes of lifestyle and behaviour. Women can access this program from the community and from the justice system.

Community Outreach Addiction Services

This program is available to women leaving the residential program and to other women living in the community who require support, resources, counselling and help in life planning. The community program is harm reduction-based and available to women for a period of two years.

Transformations

This program, designed for incarcerated women, has been piloted at the Vanier Centre for Women. By participating in group and oneon-one counselling, women are supported in making connections between trauma and addiction. The goal is to help women develop the ability to make changes to their substance abuse. 125 WOMEN

Anne Marie Black Volunteer

Anne Marie Black came to Street Haven for Emergency Shelter three years ago, after losing her home. Now she has permanent housing and is one of the shelter's most valued and respected volunteers, offering an array of services to staff and residents, three days a week. Anne Marie's contributions range from processing donations in our clothing bank, packaging breads and pastries that are donated by a local bakery, helping staff complete the weekly pantry inventory and food order, and acting as sous chef for Saturday night's dinner!

Karen Bock was introduced to Street Haven by a colleague in her law firm a decade ago. The idea is not to just fill 50 beds in the Emergency Shelter every night and say goodbye in the morning. The idea is to allow women to set their own goals without judgement and assist in ways that provide more than a band-aid solution to the crisis of homelessness."

The 2016 surplus of \$179,011 (2015 - \$264,143) includes a surplus restricted to capital purchases of \$115,555 (2015 - \$73,992). The capital purchases surplus is restricted to supporting the building facilities for all programs, but does not support ongoing operations.

As an organization, we have a goal of maintaining an operational (unrestricted) surplus of three months of operational expenses, which amounts to \$800K. Currently, our unrestricted surplus is \$320K.
