**Questions to consider in relation to these issues
(if they are relevant)**

Quality of life

1. Are the uses appropriate to the place?
2. Is the development fit for purpose?
3. Will the development be adaptable to other uses?
4. Will the development create and enhance spaces that can be widely used and enjoyed?
5. Will the development be easily and inclusively accessible?
6. Will the development promote biodiversity?

Resources

7. Will the development make good use of resources, in construction, in use and at the end of its life?

Appearance

8. Will the development look good and enhance the place?

**Do not discuss the following matters in your objection
(as the local planning authority cannot take them into account):**

- Any perceived loss of property value
- Private disputes between neighbours
- The loss of a view
- The impact of construction work
- Restrictive covenants
- Ownerships disputes over rights of way
- Fence lines
- Personal morals or views about the applicant

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
