ICPRB has a long history of providing cooperative planning for the nation's river, which more than 6-million people and diverse ecosystems depend on. The commission is partnering with several agencies to develop an adaptive basin-wide comprehensive water resources plan serves as a roadmap for the sustainable use of this interstate resource now and into the future. Meetings of a stakeholder advisory committee began in September 2016. Since then the committee has met several times to work on priority issues, including water quality, ecological health, and land use.

Their award-winning facility is a model for safe, innovative wastewater treatment. Today, they serve 320,000 people and clean over 13 billion gallons of wastewater every year.
