

# 8 The Buzz with Rabbi B



#### 2 Months for the Price of 1!

Many years ago, when I was a student at the Hebrew Union College, I remember around this time of year, signs started popping up around campus, many of them upside-down that read, "Be Happy, It's Adar!" I remember thinking it was really strange to tell someone to be happy. I learned later that it's actually a commandment to rejoice during the Hebrew month of Adar. We are instructed to find ways to rejoice with family, friends and community because in many ways, sharing life's joys is just as holy as the solemnity and prayer of the High Holy Days. Some rabbis argue that life's pleasures

and joys are basic Jewish values. In fact, the Talmud suggests that in the olam ha'bah in the world to come, a person will have to answer for every legitimate pleasure in this life that he or she renounced. The month (or in this case months) of Adar is supposed to teach us an important lesson. That we have to take a moment to slow down, rejoice with those whom we love, be a little silly, and work to make our world a place in which everyone can rejoice. We focus on gratitude. We are grateful for all we have in our lives. And we acknowledge that sometimes in a pace of our daily lives, it is difficult to see the blessings surrounding us.

If the idea of slowing down and really focusing on rejoicing this month sounds good to you, hold on to your hat because folks, we're in a leap-year which means we will be celebrating the month of Adar twice! Let me attempt to explain. Adar is one of the Hebrew months of the year – it's the month in which Purim falls. Because of the joyous holiday of Purim, we greet one another by saying, "Be happy, it's Adar!" But surprisingly, during some years of the Jewish calendar including this one, there are two months of Adar! Why is that? It's a leap year, to keep the Jewish (lunar) calendar closer in line with the secular Gregorian (solar) calendar. The solar calendar is about 11 or 12 days longer than the lunar calendar. Remember about five years ago that Chanukah was so early, the first night fell on the night of Thanksgiving? (We all called it Thanksgivukkah and I still have a turkey-shaped Menorah - Menurky)

If there were no corrections, no leap years, in the Jewish calendar, the holidays would get earlier and earlier every year – we'd be celebrating Halloweenukah and 4th of Julyukkah. The ancient rabbis didn't like that idea – they knew that many of our holidays were intended to correspond to specific seasons. So, there is a mechanism built into our Jewish calendar that says 7 years out of a 19 year cycle will have an extra month added to them. Did that mathematically blow your mind? This is now fixed in the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th, and 19th years of the cycle. In order to further fine-tune their calculations, the rabbis determined that the months of Nisan, Sivan, Av, Tishrei, and Shevat are always 30 days long. Iyyar, Tammuz, Elul, Tevet and Adar are always 29 days long. Heshvan and Kislev are either 29 or 30 days in length. In a leap year, there are two months of Adar. When that occurs, Adar I is 30 days long, and Adar II 29. A short Jewish year, therefore, consists of 353 to 355 days, while a leap year varies between 383 and 385 days. So this will be a long year, as it is the year 5779, the 14th year in the cycle.

It's a treat that the month we get to have twice is the month of Adar, the most joyous month! (Two months of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur would be quite the challenge! And our digestive tracts couldn't handle two months of Passover.) Whenever the leap year occurs, Purim is held in the second month of Adar, on the 14th day of the month (Save the date for the Purim Spiel on Weds, March 20). The first month of Adar begins this month on February 6th.

So, from this month forward, the holidays will feel a little later. Passover starts the evening of April 19, Shavuot is June 9th, and Rosh HaShanah this year is at the very tail end of September, on September 30th.

We have a whole extra month this year. How will you use it? May we all be inspired to find some reason to rejoice – friends who care about us, family members who support us, pets who love us, a community that surrounds us. May we rejoice in Adar I and Adar II, and may we continue to improve our world so that everyone around us can rejoice as well.

Wishing you a Happy and Healthy Adar I and Adar II!

#### Sparking Joy this Adar

Recently, avid Netflix binge watchers and the American public at large has been swept up in the craze of Marie Kondo, organizing consultant, bestselling author, and host of new hit Netflix show *Tidying Up*. In each forty minute episode (which I definitely didn't binge over the course of a few days), Marie visits a family struggling to clear the clutter and part with their things, and she assists

them in tidying up their respective spaces in the course of a few weeks.

The core of Marie's "KonMari" method is simple: keep whatever sparks joy for you. The rest - anything that doesn't bring you joy or fit into the life you want moving forward - donate or toss it.

"But what is 'spark joy,' what does that mean to you?" asks one of Mari's clients in an early episode, surrounded by piles of clothes in his small apartment. Marie responds that it is a physical and emotional reaction you feel as soon as you pick up the item - maybe you instinctively hold it close, make a joyful sound, or maybe you feel a warm memory. "The feeling is like this," Marie says, and then she adorably stands on one foot and lifts a hand into the air while chiming, "Ting!" The couple, skeptical at first, give it a try with their own pieces of clothing, and after a while, they proclaim with relief, it's easy - you just know that "ting" feeling when you feel it.

The sparking joy craze actually fits in nicely with our current Hebrew calendar! This month, we will welcome the new Hebrew month of Adar (it begins February 6th on our secular calendar). In Rabbi B's article, he talks about our two months of Adar. The month of Adar is most famous for our most joyful holiday, Purim, where we celebrate Queen Esther and Mordechai saving the Jewish population of Shushan from the evil king's advisor Haman - save March 17th for our Purim Carnival and the 20th for the famous Purim Spiel! But our tradition teaches us that as soon as Adar begins, we must immediately increase our joy, and keep increasing it so that when Purim finally arrives, we are bursting with happiness.

This seems like a nice idea on its surface: our tradition wants us to be joyful! But is it really possible to feel this way all the time? What if I wake up on February 6th and I'm just not in the mood to be happy? What if I stub my toe getting out of bed, I get caught in a terrible snowstorm on the way to work, and I come home to find my cat is sick? What if something worse happens during the month? As nice as it is to imagine feeling joy throughout an entire month, we know that the natural course of life doesn't always work that way. And if our happiness becomes artificial or forced, I doubt we are still fulfilling the ancient rabbis' teaching for Adar.

Admittedly, Marie's "sparking joy" method of decluttering can also hit some snags in this regard. I decided to give her KonMari method a try, and I'm still in the middle of the decluttering process. It certainly feels nice to reconnect to items that make me feel joyful, and let go of ones that don't, but there is definitely a gray area where her advice doesn't hold as much water. My can opener, electric bills and running shoes definitely don't spark joy, but they're all items I need to keep. And most importantly, what if an item doesn't spark joy but nostalgia and sadness, and yet I still want to keep it?

For me, the most important caveat with Marie's method, along with our Sages' idea about Adar, is that joy is best felt when it's not forced, or when it's given priority over all other emotions. As the Pixar film Inside Out beautifully demonstrates, joy is an important feeling, but it's not the only one with value. In fact, joy can come from working through feelings of sadness and anger - which is actually something I experienced while decluttering sentimental items. This also connects with our Purim story - we can and should be joyful that Queen Esther saved us from Haman, but we also can't brush aside feelings of sadness and anger that Haman was *this* close to succeeding in our annihilation, thanks to his blind hatred, his power, and being enabled by King Ahashverus.

As we usher in the month of Adar, and perhaps as we embark on some early spring cleaning, may we attempt as best we can to spark joy for ourselves and those around us. But at the same time, may we meet all of our emotions as sacred; as professor and author Brené Brown writes, "The dark does not destroy the light; it defines it. It's our fear of the dark that casts our joy into the shadows." I hope each of us finds moments of increased meaning and joy during this month of Adar!

## Supporting TBS

Did you know - if you are 70.5 years or older and have an IRA, you can potentially donate money directly from your IRA account to TBS without that gift counting as income?

This provision is called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) and might be right for you. A QCD counts towards your Required Minimum Distribution.

Are you familiar with Donor Advised funds (DAF)? With all the tax law changes occurring, this might be a good vehicle to look into to fund your annual charitable giving. You can donate appreciated stock to your DAF and avoid capital gains tax. You can also maximize your tax deduction opportunity by bundling your donation to the DAF in one year, and then spreading out your charitable giving over time.





#### **Raising Expectations**

An underdog university with a long history of terrible football teams recently hired a new head coach to turn the program around. The new coach's first game was against a Big 10 team, and in the past, the home team would typically be blown out in the first half — however, this time his team took an early lead and stayed competitive. With 3 minutes left they had a first down on the other team's six-yard line, trailing by only a touchdown. Alas, the underdog team failed to score and lost. For the next few days following the game, many alumni approached the new coach with praise for the team's performance. The

coach responded with "the alumni need to raise their expectations."

To be successful, organizations of any kind cannot sit back and continue to repeat what they have done before, even when they have had prior success. Whether consciously or subconsciously, TBS has continued to raise its expectations in a number of ways over the years, which has driven us from struggling to survive to reasonable stability with aspirations of thriving.

Rabbi Apothaker established the practice of not doing cookie-cutter life-cycle events and focused on individualizing each event. Rabbi Benjy and Rabbi Lenette have continued this personalized approach. TBS expects quality life cycle events.

When most people thought it not possible for TBS to have its own Temple facility, its members defied the odds and built one. Our mortgage is now paid off, and plans are in the works to develop a reasonably funded maintenance program to assure the viability of the building. When our religious school outgrew the facility, arrangements were made to use a facility that would meet our needs. TBS expects to have quality facilities from which to conduct its services, programs, and events.

About 12 years ago, TBS reached a decision that the religious school needed to progress so that it would be a driver for growth, which would lead to stability, even if it required some financial risk. TBS's decision led to replacing the religious school director position with an assistant rabbi position to lead and elevate the quality of the religious school to an outstanding level. Rabbi Benjy was hired and made our religious school a major attraction for TBS. Rabbi Lenette continues the school's successful programs and innovates engaging new programs. TBS expects to have a first class religious school.

Music has always been an attraction for TBS, and over the years the music has grown and become more diverse. Under the recent leadership of Gail Rose and Debbie Costa TBS has built numerous relationships with a variety of musicians, some who regularly perform like Nick Ciranni and Mark Rossio, and some who occasionally perform, such as Arkadiy Gips and Cheri Papier. Our music is outstanding. TBS expects high-quality music at its events.

In the words of the twentieth-century philosopher Woody Hayes, "If a team is not improving, it is getting worse because its competitors are continuing to improve." Taking Woody's words to heart, TBS must not only maintain its high expectations in areas such as those mentioned above, but it must also drive forward with raising its expectations in other areas such as the recently initiated affinity groups, which are intended to bring members closer to each other and the institution. We must continue to look for additional resources so TBS can continue to upgrade and innovate. We will continue to improve in services (new High Holy Day prayer books), programs (Lunch Bunch and affinity groups), and facilities (desired audio-visual enhancements as well as refreshing other facility features) so that TBS continues to be the joyful, personal, and accessible place it is.



#### DR. GARY ZOLA: ISAAC M. WISE'S 200TH BIRTHDAY & THE HISTORY OF REFORM JUDAISM

Gary Zola is the Executive Director of The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives (AJA) and Edward M. Ackerman Family Distinguished Professor of the American Jewish Experience & Reform Jewish History at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) in Cincinnati.

In April 2011, Dr. Zola was appointed by President Obama to the Commission for the Preservation of American Heritage Abroad. Dr. Zola is the first faculty member of Hebrew Union College to receive such an appointment by a U.S. president. In 2006, Dr. Zola became the first American Jewish historian and the first American rabbi to receive appointment to the Academic Advisory Council of the congressionally recognized Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission.
