

National Day of Prayer for Peace in Our Communities Set for September 9

Diocese hosting Interfaith Prayer Experience at Cathedral

In the wake of a number of tragic incidents in cities around the country over the past several months, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has called for a National Day of Prayer for Peace in our Communities on September 9, the feast of St. Peter Claver.

The immediate focus for this day is on coming together in prayer as the foundation for future dialogue and healing within our communities struggling with violence in many forms.

The Diocese of Scranton will participate by hosting an **Interfaith Prayer Experience for Peace in Our Communities on Friday, September 9, 12:10 p.m. at the Cathedral of St. Peter**. All are welcome to join with people of many faith backgrounds to pray together for peace and to renew our commitment to actions of faith response as peacemakers. CTV: Catholic Television will broadcast the service live.

"Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, my brother bishops and leaders of other faith traditions have been encouraging people everywhere to pursue means of promoting peace in our troubled world. This is one opportunity for us to heed that call and come together in a spirit of unity and common purpose," said Bishop Joseph C. Bambera.

"By joining our voices and hearts in prayer, we can indeed forge a commitment to offer respect, compassion and the loving mercy of God to anyone we encounter. I invite everyone to join us in this noble effort."

Parishes in the Diocese are also encouraged to plan their own local prayer observance. The Office for Parish Life has provided resources to assist parishes to develop a program of their choosing that fits their local circumstances and communities.

Special Mass to Celebrate Milestone Anniversaries of Bishop Emeritus James C. Timlin

As Bishop Emeritus James C. Timlin marks several milestone anniversaries, the Diocese of Scranton is expressing its gratitude for his many years of service to the Church.

On July 16, Bishop Timlin observed his 65th anniversary of priestly ordination, and on September 21 he will celebrate his 40th anniversary of Episcopal ordination.

In recognition of these significant moments in both Bishop Timlin's life and that of the Diocese, a Mass of Thanksgiving will be celebrated on Wednesday, September 21, 2016, the Feast of Saint Matthew the

Apostle and the actual day of his 40th anniversary of Episcopal ordination at 12:10 p.m. in the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton. All are welcome to attend. CTV: Catholic Television will broadcast the Mass live

"Bishop Timlin has served us faithfully for so many years and continues to do so generously in many ways. We are blessed by his ministry and devotion to our Diocese," said Bishop Joseph C. Bambera.

"On a personal note, I am grateful for his friendship and support throughout my years as a priest of our Diocese and now as I have the privilege of serving as Bishop. I look forward to joining with clergy, religious and lay faithful of the Diocese as we honor and thank Bishop Timlin."

With typical humility, Bishop Timlin attributed his accomplishments and longevity to Our Lord and others.

"I am very grateful to God, he has been very good to me," he said. "I have been helped by so many people over the years, and have so much to be thankful for. And I thank Bishop Bambera for arranging this special Mass for me."

Bishop Timlin is a native son who received his grade school education at St. John the Evangelist in South Scranton and Holy Rosary in North Scranton. He graduated from Holy Rosary High School and St. Charles College, Catonsville, Md.

He attended St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore before enrolling in the North American College, Rome, Italy, where he completed his studies for the priesthood.

Bishop Timlin was ordained on July 16, 1951, in Rome by the late Bishop Martin J. O'Connor, then-rector of North American College.

After ordination he continued theology studies in Rome before returning to the Diocese, where he was appointed assistant pastor at St. John the Evangelist Parish, Pittston, in 1952. On June 12, 1953, he became assistant pastor of St. Peter's Cathedral Parish, Scranton, where he served until September 12, 1966, when he was named assistant chancellor of the Diocese and secretary to the late Bishop J. Carroll McCormick, the sixth Bishop of Scranton.

He was named Auxiliary Bishop of Scranton on August 3, 1976. He was ordained in St. Peter's Cathedral on September 21, when he also became Vicar General of the Diocese. In September, 1979, he became pastor of the Church of the Nativity of Our Lord, Scranton.

When the late Cardinal John J. O'Connor, the seventh Bishop of Scranton, was transferred to the Archdiocese of New York in March, 1984, Bishop Timlin was elected diocesan administrator by the Diocesan Board of Consultors.

Pope John Paul II appointed him the eighth Bishop of Scranton on April 24, 1984, and his installation followed on June 7.

Following his retirement in 2003, Bishop Timlin served as administrator of St. Joseph Parish in Wilkes-Barre for several months. The next year he became rector of Villa St. Joseph in Dunmore, the Diocesan residence for retired priests, a position he held until July 2011

Bishop Timlin, who turned 89 on August 5, continues to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation, celebrate Masses in the Diocese, and represent Bishop Bambera at various liturgies and events as needed.

Christian Communities Gathering to Offer Prayers for Creation

In his landmark encyclical, "Laudato Si', on Care for Our Common Home," Pope Francis stressed we all have an obligation to take steps to mitigate climate change, clean the land and the seas, and start treating all of creation - including poor people - with respect and concern.

"Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience," he said, calling us to "an ecological conversion" whereby the effects of our encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in our relationship with the world around us.

The pope also singled out for special praise Orthodox Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople, who has made environmental

theology a key topic of his research and teaching since the early 1990s.

In that spirit of ecumenical collaboration, the Christian Communities Gathering of Northeast Pennsylvania is sponsoring a service to pray for the care of the earth.

"The Office of Vespers for the Preservation of Nature" will be prayed on Sunday evening, September 18, at 6:00 p.m. in Holy Resurrection Orthodox Cathedral, 591 N. Main Street in Wilkes-Barre. All are invited to attend. Refreshments and discussion will follow the service in the Cathedral Hall.

The Orthodox Church has been celebrating a day of prayer for the preservation of nature since 1989. Other Christian Churches have recently been celebrating days and seasons of creation from September 1 to the feast of Saint Francis on October 4.

To further understanding of the encyclical *Laudato Si'*, and to encourage its implementation, a number of Catholic religious communities and organizations - such as the Columban Fathers and the Catholic Climate Movement - have published study guides and other resources that can be accessed online.

Pray for Victims of Earthquake and Natural Disasters

Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz of Louisville, Kentucky, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), invited all Catholics to unite in prayers with Pope Francis for the victims of the earthquakes in Italy and for those suffering due to natural disasters:

"(Yesterday), Pope Francis prayed the sorrowful mysteries of the rosary with pilgrims in St. Peter's Square for victims of the Italian earthquakes. Knowing all too well the personal toll of natural disasters in our own country, let us join with the Holy Father in prayer for everyone suffering from Louisiana to central Italy. We entrust the lives lost to our loving Mary, Mother of God, praying for the comfort of those mourning and the strength for those rebuilding. Amid our hectic lives, let us pause today to offer a rosary."

Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe

The Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe will be taken up in the Diocese of Scranton this weekend, August 27-28. A portion of this collection will be sent in support of the following collections which annually were taken up in Lithuanian, Slovak and Polish parishes:

- The Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid
- The Catholic League for Religious Assistance to Poland
- The Slovak Catholic Federation Appeal

The collection supports pastoral, educational and construction projects in more than 20 countries in Central and Eastern Europe and Central Asia. In 2015, the U.S. Bishops' Subcommittee on Aid to the Church in Central and Eastern Europe awarded over \$7.7 million through more than 250 grants. Projects supported by the collection assist a broad range of needs focused on providing pastoral care and developing resources in countries of the former Soviet Union and who have struggled to rebuild faith communities in a post-communist society.

These endeavors include seminaries, youth ministry, social service programs, pastoral centers, church construction and renovation, and Catholic communications projects.

The people in this region of the world still have great need, and

participating in this collection enables us to be a sign of mercy for those who struggle to practice the faith.
