### RECEIVE AWARIDS

The Sacremento River Delta Historical Society has recently been honored by ceiving two separate awards for their outstanding historic restoration project. refurbishing and revitalization of the Dai Loy Hall in Locke has been singled-out as the most ambitious and successful undertaking of the year by the Awards of both the Sacramento County Historical Society and the state historical society.

The Award of Merit for Historic Preservation from the SCHS was presented to the local society at a reception at the old governor's mansion in Sacramento on December The citation notes the efforts in restoring the Dai Loy Gambling Hall Museum, and the award was given in "well deserved recognition of the time, talent, and effort of over 50 volunteers in clearing, repairing, sorting, researching, and organizing displays and the interest of those who loaned photographs for reproductions and artifacts for display."

The Conference of California Historical Societies will present their 1979 award for Historic Preservation to the SRDHS at their annual meeting in Sonoma on June 22. On the basis of material complied and submitted by Bob James and Kathie Graham, the CHS has chosen the Locke project as the year's most significant contribution to pre-

serving California's history in the statewide competition.

The SRDHS meets every other month from September through May, with meeting locations rotating from Rio Vista to Walnut Grove to Clarksburg. All members, guests, and friends are welcome to enjoy a wide variety of interesting speakers and programs aimed at sharing views, memories, and information about the people, events, and history that made early Delta life unique.

#### JANUARY

Over 200 people attended the third annual meeting of the SRDHS on January 23 at St. Anthony's Hall in Walnut Grove. An elegant pot luck dinner was accompanied entertainment provided by the New Holland Combine, an enthusiastic vocal and instrumental ensemble οſ Clarksburg residents.

Also on the program was Don Derbyshire who told of the Great Riverboat Race to be re-enacted on April 22 by boats leaving from and Stockton Sacramento and commemorating the days of fierce competition of paddlewheal steamers on The Delta and the Bay.

The effort and preparation necessary to produce a factual and readable bok was reviewed by June Kay Clarksburg, at the May 23 meeting in Walnut Grove.

With her co-author June is now researching, Outlining, writing, rewriting, interviewing, and negotiating with publishers fulfill her dream of doing a book about the Delta historic, yet humanistic— and containing stories of all ethnic and chronological groups who settled near the river.

A display of Indian artifacts, collected by Les Lyman complemented the die cussion of Indians of the area, primarily the Miwok tribe, which was sparked by the speakers comments on presettlement.

# CHS ON CRUISE

The California Historical Society has announced a "Delta History Cruise" on Sunday, June 10. Participants will leave Stockton aboard the 62 foot Channel Star and tour for four hours through the Stockton Channel, north through Potato Slough, scenic backwater canals, and on to Venice Island. A tour commentary will provide historical perspective and current thinking on many of the problems facing what many consider the major agricultural and recreational resource.

# AWARDS TRIP TO JUNE 22

An opprotunity to attend the 25th anmual meeting of the Conference of California Historical Societies in Sonoma on Friday, June 22, is open to SRDHS members. The Society will be honored at the awards luncheon in the main dining room of the Sonoma Mission Inn by the presentation of the statewide Historic Preservation award on that date.

Registrations for a limited number are now being taken for a bus trip to the conference. Marlene Peterson will list those wishing to participate and have final arrangements on June 8. Cost for the lunch will be \$5 plus a special \$2 registration fee; transportation is extra.

# PROJECTS -

MUSEUM: The organization is justly proud of the museum which has begun its third season of March to November weekend openings. Attendance to date has been 22,111 with 2,778 this year alone. Maintenance work was done this spring with new picture captions being added, plastic overlays affixed to photographs, and additional display items catalogued. Total income of \$2,578.20 from donations has thus far paid for all museum ex-With the current 1979 total at penses\_ \$4,36,20 it is hoped that, even with the substantial increase in rent, the museum will remain self-sufficient. Many thanks go to the over 90 persons who have given their time to staff the Dai Loy.

ORAL HISTORIES: In an on-going program the society is collecting and working to make transcripts of interviews with senior members of pioneer delta families. Volunteers are need to type copies of tapes made by SRDHS speakers and oral histories of those who have shared their recollections and knowledge of the early delta in private sessions. Interviewers are also needed to assist in collecting additional reports.

NEWSLETTER: In an effort to inform members of plans, projects, and personalities, the society will publish and distribute a newsletter. From the current modest beginning, it is hoped that later issues can be professionally printed with illustrations, historical footnotes, and profiles in addition to updating recent activities. Suggestions would be welcomed by Yvonne Pylman, Clarksburg.

## MEMBERSHIP FACTS
