Several members gathered around the prospec-


tors to learn how the gear worked. I was impressed with the ingenuity and creativity of our Club Members who designed this equipment.

WHERE'S THE GOLD? TIPS AND TECHNIQUES


In this column each month we will try to give newcomers to our hobby some valuable tips and techniques which may help them get more enjoyment out of recreational prospecting and mining. Who knows, it may even help them find GOLD!

DRYWASHING FOR GOLD !!!

So you're thinking about attending the Club outing in June but are wondering what type of equipment to bring with you to Section 34. Other than a metal detector, a drywasher is probable the natural choice.

The recovery of gold from placer gravel by dry concentration is a subject that has received much attention over the years. Inventive minds have been occupied with this subject for years, and a great many machines have been designed for this type of work. It is interesting that the late Thomas A. Edison, about 1897, designed a dry process machine for saving gold from a placer deposit in New Mexico. Prior to this invention, prospectors in Mexico put placer gravel concentrates in blankets and tossed them in the wind exposing the concentrates to the wind while the fine gold is enmeshed in the hair of the blanket. Early machine type dry washers were of various designs and sizes and were utilized in working the placer deposits of Nevada, where the water available



is insufficient for wet methods. As this machinery developed the Mexican dry washer, or air jig, became the most popular.

Although there were a number of different styles of the machine, the same principle is employed in the construction of all of them. The dry the basis behind the modern Drywasher. All dry washers share one common characteristic...all materials must be completely dry as gold will not settle down to the bottom of the pan if the material is even slightly damp.

When digging, try to get as close to the bedrock as you can. When exploring dry river beds and arroyos, look for the same signs that you would in a flowing stream; large rocks and boulders that create "pockets", bend in the now dry gravel beds, etc. Dig as deep into cracks and crevices as you can. Use a small bar, a rock hammer, creciving device and a whisk broom to help you get all the fine materials into your pan. When running materials on your drywasher, be sure to keep an eye out for

washer operates on the same principle of the jig, and consists essentially of a screen, hopper, rifle board, and some type of air transfer such as bellows, all mounted on a frame so as to be easily portable. The basics of the machine are still used today. The machines used a intermittent pulsation of air, whereby the heavier mineral particles settle to the bottom and the lighter material came to the top and is removed by gravity and air pulsations. That early machine is

Two Injured **Abandoned** Mine

It is with great regret that I report on yet another incident related to abandoned mine openings in Nevada. This is the third such report for calendar year 1998 and I sincerely hope that it is the last!

Sunday, October 11, 1998

Las Vegas area residents Vern Johnson and Richared Strickland ventured out into the desert southwest of Las Vegas. They drove out Warm Springs Road to the end of the pavement and continued on for another mile and a half to a grouping of old mine dumps. parked their faded GMC pickup below the dumps and climbed a short distance up the rocky slope to take a look. They may have been imbibing a few "brewskies" and were admiring the panoramic view of the Las Vegas skyline that one has at that location.

Eventually, a flawed decision was made and the two passed through a vandalized fence and entered an adit that was, at one time, an opening into an underground gypsum mine. The two left a pack of cigarettes and a dollar bill held down with a small rock and the portal. Approximately 120 feet inside the adit was a raise that connected to an adit higher up the hill. Loose rock that had been fallen (or thrown) from above mostly clogged the adit the men entered. They crawled over the loose material and continued farther into the adit, reportedly running in the mine and had no matches, lights, or sup-

plies with them. At 180 feet inside
the mine was a 50 foot deep vertical
shaft (winze) which the two failed
to see and down they fell.

Wednesday, October 14, 1998

Bill Pennington, a 71 year old prospector, had passed by the area and noticed the battered GMC parked near the mines as early as Monday, but thought it to be abandoned. On Wednesday morning, something told him he better check things out. He was a bit wary because some prospectors don't like to be bothered when they are working. Finding the cigarettes and the dollar bill at the portal he had a sense that something was wrong. He entered the mine and called out. Johnson and Strickland called back. Pennington contacted the authorities and a three-hour rescue effort was conducted by the Clark County Fire Department Rescue Team.

Both men were severely dehydrated as a result of being trapped for four full days. Vern Johnson received a broken ankle and broken ribs in the fall and was transported by ambulance. Richard Strickland suffered serious head injuries and was flown by Care Flight to a Las Vegas hospital. Both men miraculously survived the ordeal. Johnson reportedly told rescuers that he had seen NDOM's "Stay Out and Stay Alive" public service announcements many times on TV but failed to listen to the message.

There is an unsung hero in this story, Mr. Bill Pennington. His intuition, concern and courage saved two lives. We sincerely appreciate his actions

We also commend and say "Thank You" to the members of the Clark County Fire Department Rescue Team who ventured into dangerous territory and put their lives

on the line to save the two men.

Division staff, assisted by staff from the Clark County Public Response Office, repaired the fences surrounding the mine workings and posted new warning signs two days after the rescue operation. It was reported to NDOM that the signs were gone and the fences vandalized within the next week and a half!

There are many lessons to be learned from this incident and the others that have occurred this year and in years past. A few of these are as follows:

- Alcohol and/or drugs and abandoned mines don't mix
- Fences destroyed by vandalism and theft of warning signs endangers the public because the physical deterrent has been removed
- People need to take personal responsibility for their actions
- A thoughtless act can result in placing others at risk of injury or death

The Division continues to urge claimants and property owners to secure mine openings on lands they control. Securing work, whether it be fences, barricades, or postings of warning signs, should be checked periodically and maintained. The Division has warning signs available, on request: Metal signs for \$4.00 each (plus S&H) or paper signs at no cost (plus S&H for large orders). The signs can be obtained by visiting one of our two offices, sending a written request or by calling the Carson City office at (775) 687-5050 or the Las Vegas office at (702) 486-4343. To report an unsecured mine opening, please call the nearest NDOM office or call our 24-hour cellular number at (775) 721-ROCK (7625).

3809 Mining Regs Draft Released

After three years and two separate draft proposals, the Bureau of Land Management has released its draft Environmental Impact Statement for the 43 CFR 3809 surface management regulations, or "3809." It's about 480 pages, half body-half appendix. You remember that Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt attempted to rewrite 3809 in his image, as it was "no longer in the public interest to wait for Congress" Republican (especially Congress) to reform the regs. Never mind that mining states had acted on their own to take up much of the perceived slack in the rules in the time between 1991 and 1996.

Some quick points about how the new 3809 regs would be tighter: expand the number of situations where plans of operation are required; establish plans for terminating inactive operations at both notice (less than 5 acres) and plan-level; require all operators to post estimated reclamation costs (not a per-acre fee) AND require "public comment" on such financial guarantees; and authorize BLM "to allow, at its discretion, members of the public to accompany BLM inspectors at mine sites."

Some points which may be

good: set outcome-based performance standards for exploration through reclamation; allow BLM to "defer" to state governments in administration of mine regs; clarify parent-subsidiary liability issues; and "plain English."

A series of 16 public hearings are coming up, the earliest is Reno, March 23, Elko March 24; Phoenix, Fairbanks and Denver on March 30.







Death Valley Find Is Apparent Hoax

by Deborah Hastings The Associated Press

Los Angeles (AP)~Jerry Freeman became an instant celebrity in January by announcing the discovery of a 149-year-old trunk belonging to a band of Gold Rush settlers he's obsessively researched for more than a decade.

Newspapers and television programs across the country featured his find—a wooden chest containing perfectly-preserved shoes, pottery bowls and a letter bearing the name William Robinson, a pioneer who died after crossing Death Valley in the great California Gold Rush.

This week, a big problem arose. The National Park Service, after bringing in archaeologists and curators from the Smithsonian Institute, announced the letter was a fake and that some of the trunk's contents, most notably glue containing polymers, were from the 20th century. The service would not say which items contained the glue.

"I won't call it a hoax," Park Service spokesman Tim Stone said. "At this point we know that the chest isn't from the 49er era. And whoever wrote that letter, we know it's not real.

"At present, we have no idea whether (Freeman) put it there or not. We're continuing to follow up," Stone said.

Freeman said he first saw the chest Nov. 22 in a rock cave along a trail believed taken by a group of 27 pioneers.

Freeman, a substitute teacher who majored in archaeology and has traced the party's route since 1985, insists he did not plant the chest.

"All I did was find the box," he said. "I wish I'd never walked into that cave. My reputation is in ruin."

He also says he doesn't dispute the Park Service's test results

According to the Park Service, two photos in the trunk were tintypes, a process that was not patented until 1856. A stamp on one of two ceramic bowls was not used until after 1914. The letter, dated in January 1850, contained words not in use at the time

The only authentic items were coins predating 1850 worth at least "thousands of dollars," Stone said. "This leaves me devastated," Freeman said. "But hey, I'm 56, I' grand kids, a loving wife and I a on."

How does he explain finding chest containing a bogus letter; a member of a group he has obsessively tracked for 14 years? "I don't know," Freeman said can't even fathom it."

Mining Ends in Leadville

Leadville, Colorado. (AP0An ended in Leadville February 4, when the last miners left the Black Cloud mine and hung up

their brass t for the last time.

The Black Cloud was the last operating mine in Leadville and produced millions of dollars of zinc lead over the last 30 years. But pressed metals prices and a tapped out ore body led to the closure.

have posted hiring notices at the Black Cloud.

"We've had a lot of interest from other companies," Lloyd said. "Those that want to stay in mining can do that. They just can't do it here."

Mine Woes Could Mean Higher Taxes

Silver City, New Mexico (AP)— Hard times for the copper industry could cost property owners in Grant County.

Copper mining operations account for about three-fourths of the Cobre Consolidated School District's taxable property, according to the county treasurer's office. But the area's two active mines have had massive layoffs and cutbacks because of copper prices hovering around 65 cents a pound.

The district's property and mineral values total about \$204 million, said Cobre Schools Superintendent Harrell Holder. If that drops to \$185 million, property taxes will have to go up to meet the district's bond obligations, he said.

Under a 1990 law, the portion of the mill levy assumed by copper production in the district is based on a three-year revenue average. The scaled-back production and reduced revenue mean mining companies will shoul-

der less of the district's tax burden.

If the copper slowdown continues, as projected, tax assessments from mining operations will drop even more.

Property owners are assessed a third of the appraised value of their homes times the tax rate, which for the Cobre district is about 5.5 mills. Thus, a home valued at \$90,000 pays \$165 in school

taxes.

If copper values drop 15 percent, the mill levy would have to increase to 6.1 percent to pay off the bonds, for a tax increase of \$18 on a \$90,000 home, Holder said.

"Conservatively speaking, these increases can occur over a second and third year as the three-year average declines." he said.

Chino Mines Co. produced 340 million pounds of copper last year. Its most recent newsletter said it will produce about 210 million pounds this year.


