Victoria nips Caldwell

By STEPHEN WHITE Sports Writer VICTORIA — In a Class 2A sub-state matchup of one school's winning tradition versus one league's winning tradition Friday night, it was the Mid-Continent League and the Victoria Knights that emerged victorious over the previously unbeaten Caldwell Bluejays, 8-6.

Sporting a record tattered and torn by the rugged nature of the prestigious Mid-Continent League, Victoria took an almost embarrassing 5-4 record into the state playoffs three weeks ago. But in those three weeks, the Knights routed two opponents, then won the shocker Friday night before a frigid but ecstatic home crowd.

The margin of difference proved to be sophomore fullback Dale VonFeldt's successful conversion run to put Victoria up 8-0 after Mitch Berens broke loose on a 70-yard touchdown gallop two plays into the second quarter.

After breaking through Caldwell's line on a run to the right side, Berens, junior tailback, out-sprinted the Class 2A state 100-meters champion, Tim Schmidt, the final 55 yards. In fact, Berens pulled away from Schmidt.

Victoria drove to Caldwell's 12-yard line on its next possession, but a clipping penalty and fumble kept the Knights out of the end zone.

Fumbles were a night-long nemesis for the Knights, as Victoria lost five of seven. But the Knights' defense rose to the occasion.

Tescott falls on last-minute drive

By HAROLD BECHARD Sports Editor DENTON — The pain etched on the faces of the players and fans of the Tescott Trojans told the story.

After driving halfway across the state and into the den of the Kansas kingpin of eight-man football, the Tescott Trojans from the Post Rock League came within an eyelash of stunning the No. 1-ranked Midway-Denton Eagles.

But it was a freshman — 140-pound quarterback Todd Caudle — who did the Trojans in.

After his earlier fumble that helped Tescott to a go-ahead touchdown, Caudle marched his team 65 yards in eight plays before scoring on an 8-yard run with 1:05 remaining in the game to give the Eagles a thrilling 26-21 victory.

The win boosts Midway-Denton to 11-0 on the season and into Saturday's Eight-Man Division II state championship game against Lenora, a 26-20 winner over Rolla.

Tescott, meanwhile, finished its season 10-1 — one game and two victories from where it wanted to be next Saturday afternoon.

"The kids have worked so hard, that is what's so tough to swallow," said Tescott head coach Jim Anderson. "It's a shame it came down to this. It's almost like a slap in the face. But I'll tell you one thing, I'm sure proud of this team."

"It's an awful damn tough way to lose. It's never easy to lose one when the kids have played so well and so hard."

When John Webb bulled his way into the end zone from seven yards out and Bobby Loveless booted the extra point with 4:04 remaining in the game, it looked like the 3 1/2 hour trip back to Ottawa County was going to be a glorious one.

It was just the second time Midway had been behind all season (the other time when a team ran the opening kickoff back for a TD). The Eagles, however, rose to the occasion and marched to the winning touchdown.

"I thought the guys showed a lot of poise on the final drive," said Midway head coach Mark Juhl. "As you could tell, it was awful tough to run on them in the second half. I was very impressed with Tescott. They have an excellent team."

Midway rolled up and down the field in the first half to the tune of 228 yards rushing and 14 first downs. But when the Eagles looked at the scoreboard at halftime, they only led, 20-14.

"We usually have people going home by this time," said a Midway fan at intermission. "They're not used to this (a close game)."

The catalyst in the first half was Caudle, the freshman. He rushed for 121 yards and scored on runs of 1 and 10 yards.

The Eagles took the opening kickoff and methodically moved 59 yards in 11 plays before Caudle snuck in from a yard out. A two-point conversion pass to sophomore brother Neil Caudle gave Midway and early 8-0 lead and the local fans sat back on the chilly and windy night to watch another rout.

Only this time, the rout never materialized. Mike Stanley made sure of that.

Norton seeks spot in 4A title game

By TIM HOSTETTER Sports Writer NORTON — The last qualifier for next Saturday's Kansas state high school football championships will be determined tonight when top-ranked Norton (11-0) meets second-ranked Mulvane (11-0) in a Class 4A sub-state game at Travis Field.

Kickoff time was set back to 6 p.m. because of the long drive involved for Mulvane's team and fans. Tonight's winner will move on to next Saturday's 4A title game to be played at KU's Memorial Stadium.

Norton dominated its nine regular-season opponents and has continued that type of play in the playoffs with a 26-3 win over Goodland in the bi-district round and a 35-7 whipping of Larned last Saturday in regional play.

Mulvane may be unbeaten but the Wildcats have struggled in their playoff wins over Augusta (13-10) and Clay Center (15-14).

Mulvane did show its offensive capabilities against Clay Center in the final minute driving 54 yards for the winning touchdown. Quarterback Mike Snow threw for 109 yards — the final 16 yards coming on the winning TD pass to Mike Stump in the final seconds — and senior tailback Mike Belew (180) ran for 143 yards on the Tigers' tough defense.

"They do a good job of mixing it up offensively," said Norton coach Neil Melillo. "They have a good tailback and a quarterback who is capable of doing a lot of interesting things."

Melillo has had the Blue Jays in the playoffs each of his four years at the helm but has yet to win a state title. In 1983, Norton lost a heartbreaker to Fredonia in the state championship game.

Certainly, Norton's senior leaders — quarterback J.D. Hand, fullback-linebacker John Jimenez and running back-defensive back Eric Farber — are craving a return trip to the title game. The three were on that 1983 team that lost to Fredonia. Hand was the starting quarterback as a sophomore and Jimenez was a linebacker.

"Experience is a plus in a big game like this because the kids are confident they will be in every game," Melillo said, "and that confidence is infectious. It spreads throughout the team to the younger players. Our kids know it's still down to one game situation, but they have the confidence they can win."

Melillo believes the Blue Jays played their best overall game last Saturday in the win over Larned.

"We are playing well," Melillo said.

KSU volleyball team loses in first round
