A Broken Heart

The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit. **Psalm 34:18**

As we age, it seems that we experience the loss of loved ones and friends more often. These experiences can indeed be heartbreaking and lead to sorrow and grief. The way we handle the sorrow and grief will determine how well we recover. If we remain to ourselves, closed up, we may experience an unnecessarily prolonged period of sorrow and grief. This is the equivalent of closing a wound.

In medicine, we only close a wound if it is clean and fresh and not deep. A puncture wound is particularly prone to infection and abscess formation (festering). They should never be closed. Such wounds are surgically opened further (incision and drainage or I&D) and left open to heal. An open wound requires a lot of care to ensure proper healing, including careful observation for signs of infection, removing dead tissue, debridement, irrigation, and covering with a sterile bandage.

Emotional or spiritual wounds need similar care. Like a physical puncture wound, an emotional or spiritual wound is usually experienced as a piercing or stabbing - perhaps by a word spoken in anger, a rejection, or a sudden tragic loss. Consequently, these wounds are deep. If such wounds are closed, they will become "infected and fester" like a deep physical wound which is closed. Also similarly, an "infected" spiritual or emotional wound can release "toxins", poisoning the rest of the body and leading to such conditions as broken heart syndrome and other complications.

A broken heart (or heartbreak) is a common metaphor used to describe the intense emotional pain or suffering one feels after losing a loved one. Although, "heartbreak" ordinarily does not imply any physical defect in the heart, there is a condition known as the "broken heart syndrome" or "Takotsubo cardiomyopathy", where a traumatizing incident triggers the brain to release chemicals that weaken heart tissue.

Insults have broken my heart and left me weak. I looked for sympathy, but there was none; I found no one to comfort me. (Psalm 69:20)

Therefore, when we experience emotional or spiritual wounds, the best approach is to follow the

medical model and remain open, call for the support of friends and family who can be with us

(observation), listen to our grief (debridement), shower us with prayer (irrigation), and cover us with their love (bandage).

He (the Lord) heals the heartbroken and bandages their wounds. (Psalm 147:3).

Meet one of your Council's Newest Board Members



Father William J. Bartz, CAPT, CHC, USN (Ret.)

Father William J. Bartz, son of Father and Mrs. George Bartz, was born in Scranton, PA and raised in Akron, OH. He graduated from Hellenic College with a Bachelor of Arts in 1975; received a direct commission to be an Ensign in the United States Navy Chaplain Corps in May 1977; graduated from Holy Cross School of Theology with a Master in Divinity with Distinction in 1978; and was ordained a Priest in the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America in March 1982.

His active-duty service began in 1984. He served at three Navy commands: Naval Station Norfolk, USS Biddle (CG-34), and USS Carl Vinson (CVN-70). His assignments also included eight Marine Corps commands, beginning in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina and continued in Okinawa, Japan; Quantico, Virginia; and Norfolk, Virginia. He served as the Chaplain in a Battalion, Regiment, Group, Base, Division, and Force. He graduated from the Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, receiving a Masters in Strategic Studies.

During his last five years on active duty, he was the most senior Orthodox Priest in the US military. The Navy Chaplain Corps selected him to be the 2010 recipient of the John H. Craven Award, a peer-nominated and peerselected Award by Navy Captain Chaplains, recognizing his exemplary servant-leadership among Chaplains. After retiring from the Navy at the rank of Captain, he served as the Chancellor (Executive Assistant) of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Detroit from August 2011 to August 2013.

Father Bartz was appointed by the Chairman of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America to be the En-Dorsing Agent for Military Chaplains in November 2011. The Archbishop of the Green Orthodox Archdiocese appointed him to be the Endorsing Agent for Institutional Chaplains in February 2012.

On 1 September 2013, Father Bill became the Presiding Priest of Holy Trinity Church in Carmel, Indiana (Indianapolis area). Under his leadership, the \$1 million mortgage was paid, and the entire interior of the Church was completed, including iconography, flooring, pews, liturgical furniture, and sound system (\$2.5 million). Holy Trinity Church was elevated to the dignity of a Cathedral in November 2018.

Father Bartz retired from the active parish ministry on 1 August 2019 and moved to the Richmond, Virginia area. He continues to serve as the Endorsing Agent for Military and Institutional Chaplains and assists part-time at Saint Elpis Church in Hopewell, Virginia.

In July 2022, he received the ecclesiastical Office of Protopresbyter of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the most senior rank of a married priest in the Orthodox Church.

Father Bill is married to the former Emily V. Mamalis, daughter of Father and Mrs. James Mamalis. They have three children and five grandchildren.

Four Chaplains Day February 3, 1943

On February 3, 1943, the USAT Dorchester was sunk by a German submarine off the coast of Greenland. Among the almost 900 crew and soldiers onboard were four Chaplains of different denominations but a common belief in God and their duty to serve Him by serving His children. Instead of seeking the safety of lifeboats, they chose to give their own life jackets, gloves and warm clothing to escaping soldiers and seamen. Armin-arm, they huddled together singing hymns as their ship sank in the icy waters.

Their story is well-known and their devotion to God and to His human creations epitomizes their faith in God and His commandment that we love our neighbors as ourselves, in this tragedy, to the extent of their own deaths.

While recognizing their sacrifice by

these Army Chaplains, the Richmond Navy League reveres this day to acknowledge your importance to our Sailors, Marines, and their families and to thank you for working as God's servant with duty and faith. We hope that you will never be faced with this same crisis, but we know that you would make whatever choice God calls you to make.

We are privileged to call you "Shipmate" and we are here to assist you, as best we can. On this memorialized day, please know that the Richmond Navy League appreciates your mission more than we can express.

The 2025 Virginia International Tattoo will feature an incredible international cast of more than 800 civilian and military performers from seven nations. Returning favorites are Norway's Band and Drill Team of His Majesty the King's Guard. The remarkable Massed Pipes and Drums from four nations will be joined by the incredible OzScot Australia Highland Dancers.

The Tattoo will include an emotional and grateful tribute to the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps on the occasion of their 250th Birthdays. With stirring music and presentations, tributes from U.S. military bands and appearances by special guests, this Tattoo will remind us that as Americans, we have lived under a blanket of freedom woven by the service and sacrifice of our fellow citizen soldiers for 250 years And of course, we will celebrate the men and women of the U.S Coast Guard, Air Force, and Space Force as well!

THE "TATTOO" TRADITION

The centuries-old tradition of Tattoo originated as a signal from drummers instructing Dutch innkeepers near military garrisons to "Doe den Tap-too" or "turn off the tap." Hearing the call "Tap-too," soldiers would return to their barracks for an evening roll call. The ensuing parade of soldiers evolved into a spectacle now known worldwide as "Tattoo."
