## President's Message

Pardon me, but I am going to step up on my high horse for a moment. The ALRC Board last year was forced to make a change to the bylaws, making each term of the board two years rather that one year. We really had no choice as we were faced with nobody interested in participating as a board member. There will be no elections this year, but there are positions available. Part of any organization's ability to succeed is succession planning. Simply put, we need people to run the organization.

Let me put this in perspective. The city is completely ignoring the equestrian rural overlay in the "Etiwanda Heights" project, formerly known as the "East Etiwanda Annexation Project." The City has already leased the Equestrian Center to the ALRC because there were insufficient funds in the budget to maintain the facility. If ALRC fails this maintenance due to lack of interest, how long will it be before the city turns that land into something that makes money - perhaps commercial shops with high density housing above. Don't' say it can't happen, because it is happening in Etiwanda Heights. I know what you all are thinking: "I don't have time" or "I don't want to deal with the politics". If you have back yard horses and you enjoy any aspect of the Equestrian Center, such as the parking lot as a trailhead or meeting point, the arenas, the round pens, the buildings, even the trails themselves, you need to get involved. I board my horse at a beautiful facility with all of those amenities and have a trailer to transport my horse anywhere in the country I wish to ride. I do not live in the area of the Equestrian Center, so the closing of the park would not be devastating to me. Yet I am giving of my time and energy to keep ALRC alive and thriving, because I believe in the equestrian heritage of Alta Loma, and in preserving it for future generations. The Alta Loma Riding Club, the Equestrian Community, and the Community at large can no longer shirk our civic duty to get involved. If you live in the North West portion of Rancho Cucamonga (Alta Loma) and enjoy your current equestrian rural living space, or own horses anywhere in the inland empire utilizing the above mentioned facilities, or are merely interested in preserving the local heritage, you should be a member of the Alta Loma Riding Club and be involved, volunteering for the organization. If you just merely live in the area and are concerned with the possibility of losing the equestrian rural life style, you should join Alta Loma Riding Club.

What does ALRC need? We need all of its members to conduct a membership drive. We are asking that you go to your neighbors, with and without horses, and get them to join the organization. We have membership brochures available for you to give to your neighbors and friends. For a mere \$30 a year per family, they will be kept informed. The ALRC is in constant communication with the city to protect the rights of the residents in the equestrian rural overlay. The club maintains the Equestrian Center and ensures the trails are maintained and safe. ALRC sponsors fun events at the park open to everyone, supports the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Rancho Cucamonga Equestrian Patrol with use of the facility, and so much more. The ALRC needs to be seen as a voice of reason supported by numbers. If you aren't willing to get involved and do the work, who will?

ATTENTION ALL RIDERS! THE ALRC HAS BEEN PREPARING FOR THE ANNUAL SADDLE UP FOR ST. JUDE CHILDREN'S RESEARCH HOSPITAL FUNDRAISER. THIS YEAR WE ARE CREATING A TRAILS OBSTACLE CHALLENGE AT HERITAGE PARK FOR BOTH YOUTH (UNDER 18 YEARS) AND ADULT (18 YEARS +) CLASSES. WINNING RIDERS WILL RECEIVE RIBBONS AND TROPHIES. AS AN ADDITIONAL INCENTIVE, I WILL BE DONATING \$50 EACH TO THE WINNING YOUTH AND ADULT CLASS RIDER.

THE ST. JUDE SADDLE UP TRAIL OBSTACLE CHALLENGE WILL BE ON SATURDAY, JUNE 22, 2019. SIGN UPS WILL BEGIN AT 8:00 A.M. WITH THE EVENT STARTING AT 9 A.M. THE EVENT TEAM IS WORKING ON CREATING A FEW NEW TRAIL OBSTACLES FOR YOU AND YOUR HORSE. AS A REMINDER, RIDERS UNDER 18 YEARS MUST WEAR A HELMET TO PARTICIPATE. IT WILL BE A LOT OF FUN AND A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO WORK ON YOUR HORSEMANSHIP SKILLS. THE COST IS \$30 PER RIDER WHICH INCLUDES LUNCH AFTER THE EVENT. LUNCH FOR NON-RIDERS IS \$10 PER PERSON. A PRACTICE RUN CAN ALSO BE PURCHASED FOR \$15 ALONG WITH YOUR RIDE.

## Cajon Pass

Oh, all those lovely traffic jams, winds, ice, rain slick roads that drive us all crazy at one time or another, that's Cajon Pass, or Cajon Summit as it is known. But guess what? It was a lot worse for the settlers!

As you all know, the pass was created by movements of the San Andreas Fault and the Mormon Rocks are clear evidence of that. Driving on Interstate 15, it always sort of takes my breath away at the beauty of the terrain, but for the pioneers I often wonder if they could enjoy the views or if they were so overwhelmed with the ruggedness and the difficulty they just wanted to get through and finished with it.

Consider the fact the for us traversing the pass takes maybe 15 to 20 minutes when traffic is good, for the wagon

trains it was an arduous task that would take an entire day. In 1871, a lawyer and San Bernardino Sheriff with a buggy pulled by two mules, started at 9:00am about 12 miles south of Glen Helen Parkway. They arrived at the Martin Ranch (located near what is now Devore), stayed 20 minutes and then continued on to the upper toll gate at 3:00pm. They stayed overnight and then continued on their way the next day.

The Mormons made their way through the pass in 1851. Although referred to as Cajon Pass, Interstate 15 actually

goes to Cajon Summit, but the popular reference remains Cajon

Pass. "Cajon" is a Spanish word meaning box or drawer and the name of the pass was derived from a Spanish Grant first referred to on a map in 1852.

There have been notable disasters in the pass due to winds and dry conditions that we are all pretty much aware of. The 1989 runaway train, in 1994 a westbound train lost control and crashed into a another westbound train, in 1996 a chemical train derailed, and in 2018 a train carrying hazardous materials derailed. There is so much more to tell about the pass and it's history, but I hope this might have sparked your interest just a little bit about the pass that is so important to us and the object of so much frustration!

Good Riding and hope to see many of you on the trails and at events throughout the year.


