

Andrea Geller



Andrea Geller is a New Jersey-based visual artist whose work explores the expressive potential of the gestural figure in motion, both on land and in water. She received her BFA from Parsons School of Design after studying painting for two years at Cornell University, and later earned her MFA from William Paterson University following a successful career as an illustrator and graphic designer.

Geller's fascination with the moving figure led to the development of her *Swimming Pool* series. Working directly from observation, she regularly photographs, sketches, and paints on site, gathering source material that informs and energizes her studio practice.

Geller exhibits her paintings regularly. In the past year, she presented two solo exhibitions: *Currents of Being* at Riverside Gallery, NJ, and *Green Fields* at Laurelwood Arboretum, NJ. Selected group exhibitions include *Painterly Dialectic* (Riverside Gallery, NJ, 2026); *Everyday People* (Drawing Rooms, NJ, 2025); *NUDE* (Manifest Gallery, OH, 2024); *Family: Blood or Bond* (Plaxall Gallery at Culture Lab, NYC, 2023); *Mother Nature vs. Human Nature: The Inequity of Climate Resilience* (Noyes Museum of Art, NJ, 2023); *cARTography: Alternate Routes* (West Shokan, NY, 2023); and *Personal Geographies* (New York Artists Equity, NYC, 2022), as well as numerous exhibitions at Emerge Gallery in Saugerties, NY. Her work is held in many private collections.

I received my BFA from Queens College, CUNY, and my MFA from Louisiana State University. I have taught at numerous colleges including Parsons School of Design at The New School, Hofstra University, Adelphi University, Nassau Community College and Suffolk Community College.

I have a fascination with nests, their metaphoric qualities and wondrously complex structures. They are a prominent subject in my printmaking work as well as drawing. I particularly enjoy working large-scale, looking closely, and sometimes using color to heighten the emotional impact.

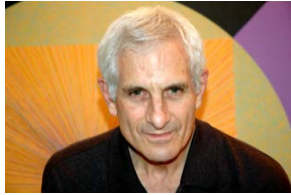
As a young kid, I always loved to draw, paint and later on loved to take photographs. I got interested in photography in 1978 when I got a part time job in a department store selling camera equipment. I shot slides, both Kodak and Fuji until about 1995, during which time I entered local photo shows and participated in local camera clubs.

In 2009 when I purchased my first digital camera and haven't put it down since. During this time, I entered local, national and international shows, been published, and received numerous awards during this time.

Norman Galinsky



Norman Galinsky's abstract geometric art has been inspired and informed by his background in science and engineering, and his ongoing interest and study of meditative and energy healing disciplines and consciousness explorations.

His work represents the intimate relationship between the energetic and quantum nature of reality and the spiritual essence embodied by art. He believes that art expression is energy itself—an aspect of what the Chinese term Qi, the universal life energy. The images depict a “stillness in motion”, drawing the viewer into a meditative dialog with the present moment. His over 30-year practice and teaching of Chinese martial arts, Tai Ji Quan and qigong exercises, as well as study of other energetic healing disciplines have been foundational in helping him generate, cultivate, and utilize energy patterns that often find their way into his images. Additionally, his earlier career and professional background in chemical engineering was instrumental in combining his use of mathematics with “permutational” and intuitive approaches to making art. His understanding and study of sacred geometry became a roadmap to explore how energy, science, and esthetics can be related.

Pam Grafstein



Pam's journey as a photographer started over 25 years ago, when she began her career as a middle school Life Science teacher, and could finally afford her first "real" camera.

Investigating the natural world has always defined her character. Early on, she learned to appreciate the value of patient observation, and discovered that fascinating scenes can be found in what at first glance appears ordinary. Her work demonstrates an emphasis on texture, shape and pattern created by thoughtful composition. It exemplifies the sentiment that you do not have to travel far for wonderful photographic opportunity, as many of her favorite images were created in her own backyard.

Pam is a long-time member and Co-Vice President of the Rockland Photography Club, which has provided the motivation and inspiration that have nurtured her growth as an artist. Her work has been displayed at the Soho Photo Gallery in Manhattan, the Blue Hill Art & Cultural Center in Pearl River, NY, the Medford Art Center in Medford, NJ, the Upstream Gallery in Hastings on Hudson, NY, the Art League of Long Island in Dix Hills, NY, the Piermont Flywheel Gallery in Piermont, NY, the Garner Arts Center in Garnerville, NY, the Nyack Art Walk in Nyack, NY, Emerge Gallery in Saugerties, NY, the Clarksville Gallery in West Nyack NY, Gallery Meraki in Garnerville, NY, Barrett Art Center in Kingston, NY, The Barn Gallery in Ringwood, NJ, and at the Intermezzo Gallery at the Bergen Performing Arts Center in Englewood, NJ. Many of her photographs have received recognition in exhibits sponsored by Adventures in Photography, St. Catherine of Bologna Patron of the Arts Association, NYC4PA, and the Ringwood Association of the Arts, and have won awards in competitions sponsored by the New Jersey Federation of Camera Clubs and the Rockland Photography Club.

Lois Bender



Lois Bender's Paintings and Prints offer fresh mixes of nature-based abstractions and explorations, using both imprints and direct painting styles. Her "WaterScapes" of rippling reflections and "Florascapes" of flower shadows and pentimenti have been part of her art practice since she began her Gardenspirits designs using the French traditional art of stenciling, named pochoir, with printmaking techniques. Nature and its various displays offers continuous inspiration. The choreography of contrasting silhouetted flower, plant and water forms all evoke the lyrical aura and afterglow of nature's impact on us. Flora's lush complex fluid reflections splintering into abstractions of rippling forms inspire her shimmering metallics and flow in her paintings. The surprise of discovery is invited in blending different mediums of drawing, watercolor, photography, and printmaking. GardenSpirits has been a unifying theme throughout her art career, inspired by her mother's persona and her given name "Flora Bloom." DNA, genealogy and etymology have brought passion, art, nature and gardens together. Her art practice reveals these interconnections, promoting the advocacy that Humanity must protect, appreciate and love Nature's beauty and essence for our mutual survival.

With a BA from Hunter College and an MFA (Boston University), Lois entered the design fields, creating the brand GardenSpiritsNY Designs (est. in 1996) out of her art direction and graphic design backgrounds in the Gift Industry while working on the Godiva Chocolates Brand. Her work added a fresh synthesis of nature-based themes in gardens, landscapes, etc. Lois Bender's studio and art practice is a "Garden in the Sky" growing among city skyscrapers. She's a longtime New Yorker, who brings gardens and nature into an oasis of her home studio. She She has explored her themes at residencies in France, The Hamptons, NY, as well as Skowhegan and the Women's Studio Workshop. She teaches art and watercolor techniques in the Metro NY area and The Hamptons.

Barry Jay Yarkon



The drive to create visual art is rooted in my affinity for the Arts and an appreciation of Artists — from ancient shamanistic cave drawers to contemporary artists. Having first trained my eye using film photography, I quickly adopted digital cameras and computer post-production tools as they emerged over the years since the 1980s.

My on-line portfolio contains re-imagined photographic captures from the natural world as well as planned digitally composed projects — usually conceived in series. The subject and intent of each series determines how far along the stylistic continuum I guide it. Of course, *serendipity* is always welcome! I have been told my images appear "painterly" or "impressionistic," that they fit into an aesthetic niche between Realism and Abstraction.

I've shown with numerous art groups/art galleries/venues, among them: *Edward Hopper House Museum & Study Center* (NY); *Emerge Gallery & Art Space* (NY); *Garner Arts Center* (NY); *Rockland Center for the Arts* (NY); *Arts Mid-Hudson* (NY); *Studio Montclair Inc.* (NJ); *Woodstock Artists Association & Museum* (NY); *Oyster Point Gallery* (NJ); *Samuel Dorsky Museum of Art* (NY); and the *Los Angeles Center For Digital Art* (CA); also, on-line galleries such as *LightSpaceTime.art*. Pieces appear on the Lisbon-based website, *Episode Travel with Art* and *The National September 11 Memorial & Museum Artists Registry* (NY); and are held in corporate collections, professional offices, health care institutions; as well as commercial publications and blogs.

Like the four prints selected by the curators for this exhibition, my work is primarily distributed as 8-color dye-based-ink Giclée prints; in signed, limited-editions; created in my studio in the lower Hudson River Valley art region.

I have always been fascinated by the beautiful things created at the intersection of color and light. It could be the incredible detail and variation found in a bird's feathers, the delicate symmetry of a flower's springtime bloom, the golden hour before a shoreline sunset, the reflection of light on the surface of the water, or the layered history of a weathered, abandoned building. I'm equally drawn to abstract photography—structures, textures, lines, and patterns—and the complexity revealed in viewing objects in a different way.

I look for all of these details and attempt to capture the moment with my camera. For me, photographing them reveals the beauty and exquisiteness of life itself. Nothing brings me more joy, peace, and fulfillment than capturing the beauty surrounding me and sharing what becomes revealed through my lens. I believe it's essential to slow down and take the time to see, feel, and savor the glorious color, light, and loveliness of our world. It's there waiting for us to notice.

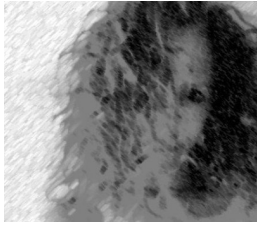
