The term "scholarship" determines that the funding is given directly to the educational institution to cover tuition.

The Live Your Dream Awards are NOT scholarships, but are purposefully designed as cash grant awards given directly to a woman so that she can use the funding to offset any costs associated with her efforts to attain a higher education, including books, child care, transportation, school supplies, tuition, etc. Giving a woman the freedom to decide how best to use the funding towards her education is an important and empowering aspect of the program. She may, for example, already have a scholarship or two to cover tuition, but needs funds for a bus pass and child care while she is in school.

SIA headquarters upgraded the software for our membership database system on January 9. In order to login to the website to interact with any of our tools behind the login—including making donations, adding new members, or interacting with SIA member directories—new login procedures are now in place. In 1921, the first Soroptimist club, Alameda County was formed in California with over 80 business and professional women from in and around the city of Oakland. With Violet Richardson as the first President, back then the first club, which changed its name to SI Oakland in 1928, met weekly, debating service projects and hearing speakers on various worldwide issues that would broaden members ' horizons.

The name Soroptimist was coined from the Latin soror meaning sister, and optima meaning best. And so Soroptimist is perhaps best interpreted as 'the best for women'.

Report 2 from U.S. Global Leadership Coalition Meeting Feb. 2018

US Humanitarian Efforts and US International Affairs Budget

More than half of Americans believe that our foreign assistance constitutes 25 percent of our U.S. budget but it is less than 1%. The budget for international affairs funds diplomatic and consular programs, global health initiatives, security assistance, and other programs.

US Secretary of Defense, Retired Marine General James Mattis says:

"The US has 2 powers. The Power of intimidation and the Power of inspiration."

What has the US International Affairs Budget accomplished through inspiration?

Over the past 25 years, the U.S. has led an historic initiative. Since 1990, the US working together with NGO's - Non-Governmental Organizations (Soroptimist is a NGO) has had enormous impact. We have halved the number of people living on less than \$1.25 per day, even with an increase in population. We have halved the number of people who die from malaria and tuberculosis. We have halved the number of children who die under the age of five from preventable,

treatable diseases like pneumonia, malaria, and diarrhea.

We have halved the number of women who die from complications in pregnancy and childbirth. and we have turned the tide of the HIV/AIDS crisis.

Yet women and children continue to suffer at a disproportional rate in the face of famine, diseases such as Ebola and Zika, lack of clean water and lack of opportunities. Governments act on behalf of their people and their national interests. US Soroptimist's are a "Global Voice for Women" who must continue to advocate for global Gender Equality through governmental and private humanitarian initiatives to improve the lives of all. This is one of the ways Soroptimist stand apart from other organizations.

Alice Atemo was travelling to Washington to visit her brother when she stopped by to share her Soroptimist experience with our members. After graduating from University in 1999, Alice recognized a serious need to educate those orphaned by HIV AIDS plus the homeless who had no opportunity to attend school. She started with flyers and set up a card table outside a church. 27 children came the first day. Today there three schools in Kakamega, Bunyore and Nambale. The student population is over 1,000 with 67 teacher/guardians. Alice is raising funds to build dormitory-style housing for the students. Her story was inspiring.

We gifted her with some SIA and Suburban items and are currently looking into establishing a friendship link.

Membership is the foundation of our club's. <u>Fundraising/public awareness/Programs</u> <u>Membership</u>

The sales model of "making the sale" is appropriate for gaining a new member. It takes repeated solicitation and special offers:

- 1. Ask someone to join repeatedly
- 2. Offer free samples: share a newsletter
- Give a trial sample or test drive, ask them to help you at an upcoming program/event
- 4. Offer a dues payment plan if necessary: ½ down and the other half due in 5 mo.
- Offer a free meal prior to the first meeting
- 6. Provide a personal taxi service to an upcoming meeting or event
- 7. Share testimonials from club members regarding what Soroptimist means to them, 8. Offer a broad range of programs/events to choose from for a free sample.

The final task is to give a membership application and **ASK FOR THE DUES PAYMENT**, be prompt in submitting the dues to the Region and SIA. Hold an induction ceremony and give a membership pin, assign a mentor, and give one or more orientations.

Congratulations your club is growing but life doesn't stop here. Your members need to start all over again. Good Luck. Beside club growth, it is important that we gain clubs in the region. If you have a chartering in progress, SIA has a deal for you. Beginning April 1, 2018, members inducted to charter clubs before the new

club year will be billed

- Charter member fee
- One quarter of the SIA dues amount covering the remainder of the current club year (April-June 30) PLUS
- SIA dues for the upcoming club year (July 1 – June 30)
- SI dues (one-time charge for 15 months)
- Club liability insurance, if applicable (one-time charge for 15 months).

As far as I know payment of Region and District dues remains the same. This means the charter members' SIA dues balance will be paid in full through the end of the following June. Clubs chartering on or after April 1 through the convention will not be billed the convention fee.

Ladies – if you ever wondered if we do make a difference by being members of Soroptimist International, see the guiding principles below from Days for Girls that apply to us and our clubs and all the friends we made as well as the difference we can and do make. The pictures attached speak a thousand words of our impact and the time we dedicate to helping others and ourselves by being Soroptimists.

Dear Friends,

Earlier this month, at my church, Antioch, we were discussing "guiding principles for current and future activities." I thought that the guidelines were excellent and could be applied to almost anything. Here they are and how they apply to both our Farmington/Livonia DfG Team (volunteers, donors, churches who provide space, missionaries, humanitarians and medical teams) AND the girls and women that we serve.

- 1. Transforming people's lives. My life has been transformed! I have the privilege of working with so many generous people and creating what is a beautiful, useful and much needed gift. What started as an interesting and startling idea (that girls really NEED pads!) has turned into a life mission. For the girls we serve: They are transformed by receiving a gift that insures their dignity, knowing they can go out in their world without fear of bleeding through their clothes.
- 2. Build and connect communities. Friends have met each other at our volunteer events and come regularly to see each other and work on the DfG kits. These friendships are based on shared values and interests. People have said that this (volunteering for DfG) is the highlight of their week! Through the missionaries, medical teams and humanitarians who distribute the DfG kits; we now have an extended community that reaches around the world!!! For the girls we serve: They know that some people far away care about this very personal problem and are willing to help them with it.

- Share Blessings and burdens. We do know each other well and when a new volunteer comes in it isn't long before we know their story as well. We share new grandbabies, dance recitals, gardens and flowers, new jobs, other volunteer work, travel, changing homes, weddings, High school sports, all the different diets and awesome sweets! We also share our sadness over loved ones who have died, the shock of a bad diagnoses, hospital stays, sick pets, aging parents and even roofs blowing off. There is a lot of wisdom and someone to listen. For the girls we serve: The girls will receive an education about their body and the changes it is going through. This gives them an opportunity to ask questions from someone who cares. To learn what they are going through is natural, normal and that all women experience it.
- 4. Do things well. The DfG kit is held to a very high standard. Sometimes we have had to take things apart and redo. We work together to improve our methods and find new ways to work better, faster and with higher quality. For the girls we serve: Because their feminine hygiene needs taken care of; they can now focus on their education and a better future.
- 5. Have fun! We do have fun! I have told our volunteers that I don't care if you don't do anything but talk to your friends! Show off the latest project that you are working on. Get up and walk around or beat your own best number for the most liners serged! I am always glad that you have come to help and I want you to enjoy the task that you are doing. For the girls we serve: Just look at the attached pictures of girls learning and receiving their kits!

We will meet 4 times this week. Tuesday at Antioch Lutheran, 6:00-8:30, Wednesday at Trinity 12-4, Thursday at Berean Bible 6:30-9 and Saturday back at Trinity11 am -3. Please come and join us as we work to make the world a better place, one girl at a time.
