1. While I was out of the office, village employees, Linda, Lisa, Ron and Todd did not skip a beat; they carried on. I am so thankful for them. When you see them let them know you appreciate their efforts. Our community is lucky to have their service.

We are grateful to Milano and Grunloh for working so hard on this. That project will begin spring 2025.

Stewardson-Strasburg: Stewardson-Strasburg is a perfect example of a "volleyball school." The Shelby County institution, which had 122 students in 2023, offers five sports for girls and five for boys. The volleyball program, however, has made 11 state trips while all the other sports combined have made three. Long known as the Comettes, Stew-Stras formed a sports co-op with Windsor in 2015 and became the Hatchets. During the first 21 years of the IHSA state volleyball series, it was the Comettes who made eight state trips, none better than the Class A state championship run of 1986. That 33-0 squad, the eighth chronologically among 11 unbeatens in state history, was coached by Jarielle Harner Winkleman. Her star was 5-foot-9 Laura Bush, who could touch 10 feet high with help from a 74-inch wingspan. Bush went on to play at Illinois after turning down offers from UCLA, Stanford, Ohio State, and Pacific. Bush helped Stew-Stras win 37 straight matches in 1985 and 36 straight across 1986 and 1987. Both streaks rank among the 15 longest in state history. In 1986, Bush hit a robust .558. "You won't see a more dominating player than Laura Bush in Class A," her coach said. "You might think she is compiling these statistics against weak opponents, but she does it at the same clip on the state level." In the 1986 final, Stew-Stras downed Easton (enrollment 62), 15-7, 15-6, after winning its semifinal over Lisle, the team that had given the Comettes their only loss during the 37-1 state runner-up campaign of 1985. Winkleman's other state runner-up was the 33-3 team of 1984 which lost the only five-set final in state history to Elmhurst Immaculate Conception. She also coached third-place teams in 1978 (32-2) and 1979 (33-2). After 14 years as coach, Winkleman stepped down prior to the 1988 season never having had a losing season en route to a 349-49 record. Sadly, she passed away in 2018 at age 65. Another successful volleyball era arrived with Coach Cathy Wenthe, who made three straight state





trips ending with a 37-4 third-place finish in 1995. Winning ways resumed in Class 1A not long after Ronda Schlechte became coach in 2011 as she guided teams to second in 2013 (28-13) and 2017 (34-7), and third in 2016 (35-6). In the 2013 final, the Comettes fell to Rockford Keith, 25-18, 25-17. In 2017, the victor was Payson Seymour, 25-12, 27-25. Schlechte's biggest star was her 5-11 daughter, Megan, who still holds the Class 1A state tournament record for kills in a match with 29 against Durand in the 2017 semifinals. Megan Schlechte went on to play for Lewis University.

Schlechte named Coash of the Year by volleyball coaches association

WSS volleyball coach Ronda Schlechte was named the Illinois Volleyball Coaches Association Coach of the Year!

Schlechte was recognized with this award at the fall state volleyball tournament finals at Illinois State University.

Schlechte began her coaching career in Junior High at Trinity Lutheran School, Stewardson, IL where she collected four State Championships and three 2nd Place finishes between the LSA and SIJHSAA seasons. During the 7 years of her reign, she ended with a 251-43 record.

She was named head coach of Stewardson-Strasburg High School in 2011. In 2013,



she led her team to a 1A State Runner Up finish. In 2015, Stewardson-Strasburg High School joined Windsor High School for a sports co-op that became the Windsor/Stewardson-Strasburg (WSS) Hatchets. She went on to guide her team to back-to-back 1A State appearances in 2016 and 2017, placing 3rd and 2nd respectively.

In her 14 year career, she has accumulated 379 wins, 12 Regional Titles, 5 Sectional Titles, 3 Super Sectional Titles, and 3 State trophies. She was named NFHS 2017-18 State Coach of the Year and 2013, 2018, and 2019 Decatur Herald & Review Area Coach of the Year.

Schlechte comments on Stew-Stras being named #16 in the top 50 volleyball programs in the state during 1974-2024, "I was so excited to see we made it to #16. What an accomplishment! Stew-Stras has been known for its strong volleyball program since I can remember. I am proud to be part of that history by striving to keep the tradition alive. I am grateful to have been able to work with such amazing athletes over the past 14 years."

Three Generations of Volleyball at Stewardson-Strasburg High School

The IHSA first offered volleyball as a state competition in the 1974-75 season when Karen (Lading) Kull was a senior. She and 15 other girls were participants on the team with first year teacher Jarielle Harner as coach.

Karen's daughter, Shannon (Kull) Wascher, followed in her footsteps at Stew-Stras, participating for Coach Cathy Wenthe's teams from 1995-1998. Shannon's daughter, Zaida Wascher, (Karen's granddaughter) began her high school volleyball career in 2023, making it the first time in school history that three generations have competed in volleyball at Stew-Stras. Zaida's other grandmother, Beverly (Warner) Wascher was also a senior on the 74-75 Team.

The first team was called Comettes, which eventually evolved into Comets, and finally after a sports merger with Windson into Hatchets. Three generations of volleyball excellence in our communities deserves to be recognized and is a tribute to the many victories and dedicated coaches that it represents.




Fifty Years Later - Memories from the 1974-75 Volleyball Team

It was the 1970s and girls' sporting activities were limited to cheerleading in those days. Title IX was passed in 1972, setting the stage for girls' sports to be offered. "Power Volleyball" was introduced at Stew-Stras during the '74-'75 school year by Coach Jarielle Harner. Offering volleyball gave girls at Stew-Stras a chance to compete and participate in the comradery of organized sports.

IHSA volleyball was a one class system in 1974-75 and no NTC Tournament held that year. The Stew-Stras JV team finished with a record of 6-2. The varsity team was successful in post-season play, winning the District Tournament (now a Regional) at Windsor, defeating Mattoon High School. They advanced to the Sectional Tournament at Mattoon, defeating Tuscola in their first match before falling to Champaign Central in the championship match. The varsity finished their season with a record of 11-2.

Memories of the 1st year from team members:

Elaine Carter Ohnesorge (Senior): I remember loving this sport and getting to play with friends. It also taught me teamwork and sportsmanship. Having fun was an added bonus! I think our record was amazing considering it was our first year and we had to learn the skills in such a short time. I'm proud that I played on our "74-75" Comettes team!

Beverly Warner Wascher (Senior): Memories include our uniforms, old boys' basketball jerseys over our white P.E. shirts. I don't imagine anyone had any idea that we would be successful. I also remember thinking that finally we were able to participate in a sport and not just sit on the sidelines cheering on the boys. It was a great time. We had no idea what was just beginning – a volleyball dynasty. Jarielle taught us and many more to come so much. She was an exceptional coach and person.

Karen Lading Kull (Senior): After having played backyard volleyball my entire life, it was very strange when our new PE teacher and volleyball coach taught us "power volleyball" and showed us how to bump the ball on our arms. We did so many drills before she would ever let us play the actual game. Once we got going, I lived, breathed and dreamed about volleyball. We had a great coach and I got to play with my friends. It doesn't get any better than that. I was proud of our team for beating Mattoon (a much larger school) and winning the District Tournament that first year! After our season ended, our team attended some of the state tournament games at EIU, which were being played in Lantz Gym. It was a one-class state system back then and the teams playing were large schools with really tall girls. They hit the ball really hard. I remember thinking "so that's what Coach wanted us to do"! We were so fortunate to have had a recent college graduate for a coach that first year. Coach Harner had played the sport at Greenville College and was a great athlete herself and person. We loved the game because of her. My only regret is that I was only able to play one year.


Donna Moomaw (Senior): Playing volleyball was so much fun! We were so fortunate to have Coach Harner come to us with her drive and passion to promote girls volleyball at Stew-Stras. The excitement and fun of playing with friends was the best. Even though the uniforms were less than awesome, I was still proud to wear it. I think I even put my uniform number on my license plate after that year. I remember the bus rides, the singing and laughing together. There may have been somber rides, but I don't remember any of those., only the good ones! I too remember watching the game at EIU and wishing we had seen the game played that way earlier in the season, oh what we might have done then. Comettes forever!

Janice Ruff Moomaw (Junior): I loved volleyball and playing with friends was the BEST! I'm so glad Miss Harner came to Stew-Stras. Think of all the fun and experiences we would have missed.

Diane Tabbert Jack (Junior): I fell in love with the sport of volleyball the second Miss Harner started teaching us the skills in PE class! Playing a sport was so much fun but also a lot of teamwork! It was an interesting season playing the larger schools. I was blessed with great teammates and a coach who wanted us girls to be successful on and off the court. When I came back home after college and had the opportunity to be Coach (Harner's) assistant, it was a great learning and giving back situation. I so enjoyed working with her and helping other girls improve their skills for the sport!

Jill Vogel (Junior): Jarielle had quite the task trying to get our crew to embrace the concept of power volleyball, but I think we did a pretty good job... she was a patient woman! She was just a kid herself. We were so lucky to have gotten such a great coach. She set the foundation for years and years of great volleyball teams at Stew-Stras, and it's pretty cool that we were all part of that foundation. I also remember going to Eastern to see some of the top state teams play. I thought those girls looked pretty silly standing up at the net with their hands raised when their team was serving...it all looked pretty foreign to us. I think my primary memory of playing was getting to play with good friends and having a boatload of fun. We couldn't get enough of volleyball. It was the first school sport that girls got to play at S-S and I feel very fortunate to have gotten to participate in the inaugural season.

Sheryl Kirchhofer (Sophomore): "Take a lesson" ...Miss Harner's catch phrase. That still pops into my mind now and again while maneuvering through life. (Editor's note: No one else can remember her saying this. Could be most of us weren't paying attention.)




(Left) Senior Kinley Quast signs to play college volleyball at SIU-Edwardsville after graduation.



Stewardson-Strasburg schools ranked in top 10% in state

We remember Captain Kirk of the starship Enterprise declaring that the mission was "to boldly go where no man has gone before." The Stewardson-Strasburg school district has accomplished that.

Illinois public schools have received their 2024 Illinois State Board of Education report cards which give an annual account of how each public school stands. The State Board considers several academic indicators including proficiency and growth in English Language Arts, Math and Science, as well as student absenteeism, and graduation rates.

Both the Stew-Stras high school and grade school have received the "Exemplary Status" on the State Board of Education's Illinois Report Card, a feat that the district hasn't achieved before. In order to be considered exemplary, schools need to be in the top 10% of schools in the state.

School enrollment has increased 14.5% in the past decade and now has 400 students in pre-kindergarten through

12th grade. Along with career and technical education(CTE) and ag programs, Stew-Stras offers students the opportunity to earn 26 college credit hours of dual credit as well as other electives.

Deters feels that everyone involved in the growth of local youth is part of the Stew-Stras Family. In a letter he posted on the school's Facebook page he stated, "It take EVERYONE. From our teachers and staff that educate day in and day out, to high schoolers helping mentor our grade schoolers, to parents helping students instill strong educational values at home, to our bus drivers greeting students in the morning and say goodbye at the end of the day, to our community that supports programs and extra-curriculars, and the rest of the list of individuals that could continue on and on and on. I want to personally thank each and everyone of you for your valuable time for our students."
