NATHAN HOCHMAN IS ANGELENOS' HOPE FOR A SAFER CITY

On December 3, 2024, Nathan Hochman was sworn in as the 44th Los Angeles County District Attorney, defeating the incumbent DA by getting almost 60 percent of the vote. Nathan vows to improve public safety by pursuing appropriate sentences for violent and serious offenders, while offering counseling and rehabilitation to those whose crimes were motivated by addiction or mental illness.

A lifelong Angeleno, DA Hochman served as Assistant US Attorney General for the Tax Division of the Department of Justice in 2008. Prior to that, he was an Assistant US Attorney for the Central District of California from 1990 to 1997, serving in the Criminal Division. He has had an extensive career in the private sector, as a partner of several nationwide law firms and as a leading expert in tax law, criminal defense, and environmental law. Nate previously served as President of the Los Angeles City Ethics Commission. He graduated magna cum laude from Brown University and earned his law degree from Stanford Law School.

MOTHER NATURE EVICTS LOS ANGELES

In recent weeks LA has experienced shocking impacts of the power of Mother Nature. No rain. No humidity. High winds. All a recipe for the disaster we experienced last month. We must have every reason to believe that this will happen again and again. We have cultivated and inhabited an ocean-front desert. Mother Nature is blind and harsh, and she seems pissed.

It's said that "homelessness is an ocean fed by many rivers." An endless river of poverty, mental illness, domestic violence, sickness, addiction, and the collapse of the family keep tens of thousands on the streets of Los Angeles. However, this past month we were reminded that Mother Nature can be and now has been the most powerful force to cast tens of thousands of us into "homelessness."

Anyone want to count the number of homeless in LA during the fires? Nope. The LA Annual Homeless count was rescheduled to mid-February due to the fires. A wise move. Whatever housing gains LA experienced were wiped away in 72 hours. We can expect LA's number of homeless to jump significantly. This, as we head towards hosting the World Cup this summer and the Olympics in less than four years.

How many Los Angelenas who lost their homes remain in temporary housing, hotels, rentals, or couch surfing with friends and family? Thousands! It will take years to rebuild. Mother Nature evicts its tenants without regard for title, economic status, age, color, faith, or ability.

Clearly, the newly homeless (like mostly all homeless) find themselves so due to no fault of their own. No one asks to be homeless. To be sure (and unlike most homeless) some of this group can afford to rebound from such a catastrophic event. Many more cannot and will struggle for years to come.

We can and should expect more fires in the future. We are going to need bold leadership to help guide LA through the changes in our climate. Whatever the cause (a debate for another time), the changes in the weather are readily apparent to anyone with a pulse. As our weather continues to be "weird" to the extreme, Mother Nature will continue to force Los Angelenas out of their homes. This is our new norm. Sure, we get an average of 284 days of sunshine a year in LA. We do live in paradise. But just like any paradise, it's not all good. We have our trifecta of natural disasters – earthquakes, fires, mudslides – that will continue to fuel the homeless problem in LA for many years to come. Not an uplifting message I know. But its real and we need to face it.

We are going to need a bigger boat (see "Jaws", 1975).

RISING TO NEW CHALLENGES - NOT TO DESPAIR

As we all begin to recover from the devastation of the recent fires, we must take a moment to express our gratitude to the first responders that gave their all to protect our communities.

In the first week after the fires, Sherman Oaks Homeowners Association provided meals to fire station crews that serve Sherman Oaks. We also helped coordinate the delivery of food to other stations citywide by activating the network of communities that make up United Neighbors.

We want to thank everyone that helped in this effort, but especially to our many restaurants. Despite facing their own challenges, they stepped up – preparing nutritious meals, offering steep discounts, and even donating food. Special thanks go to Valley Inn, Bone Yard Bistro, Maria's Italian Kitchen, Carnival, Cava, and Casa Vega for being partners with us in this effort. Many other restaurants volunteered on their own and often partnered with other groups and organizations. Now more than ever, we need to support these restaurants that are very much a part of our community.

Looking ahead, we recognize the growing concerns of the Palisades and Altadena residents where large investment firms may attempt to acquire distressed properties and take advantage of new state laws to increase housing density, changing the character of these neighborhoods. Currently the city, county, and state have put in emergency measures that will protect residents from this scenario by allowing only the rebuilding of housing within a similar footprint as was allowed before. The county is even reaching out to the state to pause some of the state housing bills that could enable overdevelopment in fire-affected areas.

We must remain vigilant. Pro-development groups continue to push for increased density citywide using the fire as an opportunity to advance their agenda of eliminating single-family neighborhoods.

We continue to support the city's Housing Element that was meticulously crafted and put into place in December with our support. Our city should build with purpose and care. We do not need to end single-family neighborhoods to provide more housing. We need to concentrate our efforts on our major corridors that can handle more density and create more community benefits. We must not lose our focus because of these fires. We have the capacity to build what we need within the commercial corridors we have.

Building new housing while replacing destroyed housing will be challenging, but not because we don't have the space, but because we now need more labor, materials, and funding all at the same time.

We have some pretty impressive councilmembers that see the challenge ahead as an opportunity to build better and more thoughtfully. We will stand with these councilmembers as we move forward to rebuild.
