PASTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT 2020

Aloha Dear Friends of CLC,

"Grace, mercy, and peace from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (1 Timothy 1:2)

My father used to say those words at the beginning of every sermon he preached. Since I have been reflecting on them these last few months, I think it is a good way for me to begin writing this my most unusual Pastor's Annual Report ever. Because we could all use a good dose of grace, mercy, and peace right now.

Usually, I review the past year and write about aspirations, intentions, and plans for the coming year.

This time, however, it is different.

The coronavirus pandemic and the disease it causes, COVID-19, has turned everything upside down and inside out. Probabilities, metrics, and risk assessments are out the window and radical uncertainty prevails everywhere. Including with our faith and family, our work and play. "Anxiety" is the word of the day, every day. What's coming next? We just don't know.

Before I speculate on 2021, however, I do think I should give a recap of what has happened this year with CLC. In consultation with other experts – pastors, bishops, and government and public health officials - as the pandemic approached, we took tentative steps to be more hygienic, safer. Asking for masks, washing hands, keeping our distance. Adjusting our communion practices – no grape juice, no intinction, finally no common cup.

And then, with a sudden, quick lockdown in mid-March no in-person worship, no communion, no in-person singing. Service of the Word became the liturgy of the day. The chancel changed shape with the table pushed back and the lectern front and center. Sound Cloud came just before the lockdown, then, we Zoomed – we tried. We got better at it. Facebook livestreaming came along. The Jans and Sikkinks leaned into refining the audio-visual production. Chieko sanitized everything in sight. YouTube uploads. Sound levels, visual acuity and waiting rooms became the concerns of the day. The classrooms were zapped and misted. The sanctuary was professionally scrubbed from top to bottom – some thought for the first time ever.

Emergency funding arrived. High-definition cameras, directional mics, processors, and a laptop that idled at two hundred miles an hour appeared. Everything we did by rote had to be remembered and reconsidered—was it safe to still "do it this way"? Learning curves abounded.

The holidays, holy days – Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter Sunday - without anyone but me and the Jans running Zoom and FB Livestream in the sanctuary was a first. It felt surreal.

Then, in July back to limited in-person worship with Service of the Word while we pondered how we might celebrate communion. A few persons returned carefully, cautiously to the sanctuary with its rolled-back walls, sparse, spaced seating, and hand-sanitizers beside every offering plate. Most still Zoomed, FB'd, YT'd, or SC'd.

In August we resumed in-person communion. At the same time because it appeared that we were in a long, drawn out marathon with the virus and that we weren't fully coming back together in-person anytime soon, we decided to offer communion online to those worshiping from home. Chalices and "real" bread went on hiatus. Wafers and individual, disposable plastic cups made a return appearance. (There's a reason we keep our individualistic Lutheran Pietism on the backburner and at the ready!)

Because we live joyfully ever after, even, and especially, in the midst of tragedy and sorrow, we decided to belatedly celebrate our Fortieth Anniversary in September. Every former pastor (a first!) and our current bishop, Andy Taylor, joined us in person or online to celebrate, pray and give thanks. Twenty-two worshipers (another record!) came in person and many more joined us online. We YouTubed a talk story with earliest of members.

Christmas Eve we had forty in-person and forty-four online worshipers. There we learned that forty is about the capacity of safe seating in the sanctuary. We didn't celebrate communion that evening because we didn't want people moving around much. So, we focused on the carols and the candles. Christmas Day we had a communion service for those not wanting to go out at night. And that way we could have communion at Christmas.

We are most blessed, encouraged, and resurrected by your ongoing care of each other and commitment to CLC. With Zooming, worshiping, dropping food and cookies by for IHS, online church council meetings, lawn-mowing and upkeep, and continued financial offerings you have remained faithful. We have only had a small, four percent drop in giving, which was more than made up for with outside, emergency funding and increased volunteer work.

At the end of May, our longtime Office Manager, Collette Wiedemann, retired. Carolyn Koehler, recently retired from another parish, came on as what I call our "Permanent Interim Office Manager." Mahalo nui loa to both for their service and making a smooth transition in difficult times.

I also worked closely with the Kidney Foundation regarding its donation pod, one of the busiest on island, and with the Rainbow Schools before, during, and after the lockdown. We had to carefully rethink everything in terms of public health and safety for the sake of the staff, the KF donors, the pre-school students and in-person worshipers.

That's the gist of it. Amidst chaos and uncertainty, tragedy and sorrow we are still here. God in Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit is still here in Word and sacrament, amongst the communion of saints, grieving with us, encouraging us, resurrecting us.

We know circumstances for any and all of us may change in an instant. So, no big changes are planned for this year of 2021. Worship, both in-person and online, will continue as-is for the foreseeable future. Maybe we could explore ways to incorporate singing back into the in-person liturgy – but safely so!

I grieve not being able to do more for keiki and youth. Twelve months ago, some of us were gearing up to have at ministering more to keiki and youth. That was totally derailed by the coronavirus. I feel sad about that and remain open to suggestions.

In 2018 we addressed issues of Women and Social Justice and then, in 2019 after some discussion voted to become a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation officially welcoming LGBTQIA+ persons of faith into our congregation. I had been thinking that in 2020 we might talk story about racism and white privilege. I would like to attempt that conversation in 2021, especially in the light of what the coronavirus has revealed about health, wealth, state violence, and race. Maybe begin with an online book group? Or open talk story session?

Finally, one exciting project that is under way as I write – the CLC Community Garden is on its way! In January, as part of his Eagle Scout Project, Hunter Spangler and troop will be constructing multiple four by eight garden beds in the space between the parsonage and the parking lot. This is his and CLC's response to the massive hunger insecurity Oahu is facing. Stay tuned for more as the project unfolds!

Mahalo nui loa, again, for your care and commitment. Your faithfulness has not been in vain. We – you and I together – have received grace, mercy, and peace from God our Creator and our Lord and Savior Christ Jesus in these uncertain times. Now, while still encouraging each other, let us bring grace, mercy, and peace to our neighbors in need.

I.H.S. ANNUAL REPORT 2020

Christ Lutheran Church,

Throughout the past year, CLC members served the community by working with the Institute for Human Services (IHS). The year began much like many others with our usual serving during the first Saturday of February. To our surprise, we would learn that this serving would be our one and only "normal" serving for the entire year due to the ongoing pandemic. Even with the struggles during the COVID-19 pandemic, we had many members show their unwavering support through cookie donations, food gathering, and words of encouragement.

We were able to support the shelters in several ways throughout the year. 2020 provided us the opportunity to serve in other ways than we had previously done. Some of those ways were through monetary donations and other times was through food support, but every time we provided the much loved cookies!! The shelters were always welcoming for the services and supplies we provided, but were understanding towards the precautions we made to not only protect our volunteers but to ensure the shelter remained as sterile as possible. We were pleased to have the ability to provide much needed food supplies during the height of the pandemic when food supplies were beginning to see degrading numbers. In the months of June and August we helped the shelter by supplying over 400 lbs. of rice that was in short supply throughout the island.

Even with the reduction in serving, we were able to assist the street dependent population of Honolulu with all of the donations that were collected. During the serving on the first Saturday in December the shelter reported over 330 meals provided which was one of the highest number of meals served in one evening. Throughout the year we even had an opportunity to serve law enforcement personnel who were in the area on one of the serving months. These individuals were an absolute blessing for the security of the shelter, and we were equally blessed to have the opportunity to support their efforts.

This year was definitely filled with unusual circumstances, but we were able to prevail through these unprecedented times with all the love and support everyone provided. We look forward to a new year in 2021 and are hopeful for normal operations to begin shortly. We would like to thank everyone who supported the IHS ministry, and we look forward to working with and volunteering to help support the many people who rely on this much needed outreach program.

2020 Rainbow School Annual Report

Rainbow School at Christ Lutheran Church has 45 students enrolled. There are two three-year-old classes and two four-year-old classes. Our services are intended to meet the needs of young children between two years and six years of age. The school runs year round from 7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and with a few exceptions follow the same holiday schedule as the local public schools, including Spring and Christmas break.

Rainbow School believes in a developmentally appropriate curriculum for all enrolled children as outlined by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). Our staff believes that children learn most effectively through a concrete, play-oriented approach to early childhood education, as opposed to an academic approach.

Rhiannon Guevara is the director and also teaches 5 children in one of the three-year-old classes. May Bolo is Rhiannon's aide. Jasmine Lehano-Boyce and Samantha Yuki are co-teachers in the other three-year-old class with 11 children. Kammi Kama and Jacqueline Ngyuen are co-teachers in one of the four-year-old classes of 14 children. Lailene Abalos-Calma is the teacher in the other four-year- old class with 16 children. JerriLynn Raymond Ayau is Lailene's aide. Jacqueline and Samantha are the teachers in the after school program.

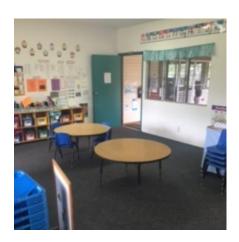
We are now re-accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). Our accreditation is valid for 5 years. Each year an annual report needs to be completed to make sure that we are upholding our standards.

Diversified Exterminators sprays around the buildings and yard for roaches and ants on a monthly basis. Our annual fundraiser is helping us update the playground structures.

Goal for the year 2021 is to continue to raise funds to finish our playground renovations. We would like to add swings and safety surfacing in the second phase. We would also like to strengthen our partnership in the community, by participating in events with the Mililani Town Association.

Our role is to amplify and focus the learning already taking place in children's lives by guiding them toward four goals: basic development, a deeper awareness of the world and their place in it, creative expression and the ability to make effective choices.

This past year has been challenging. With the COVID-19 pandemic happening, a lot of changes were made to our school. We made new policies and procedures to help keep our children, families, and staff safe at school. There were many adjustments that have been made as far as cleaning and sanitizing our school and facility. We had to shut down during the months of March- May due to the stay at home work at home order from the governor. Our enrollment dropped tremendously due to the pandemic. We slowly started picking up during the end of the year. There were a lot of changes made in regards to our curriculum with no visitors allowed on the school grounds that meant no visits from HPD, HFD, HTY or community workers. We also cancelled our field trips, this included the bus ones as well as all walking field trips. We have made many adjustments to keep our school safe.

2020 OPERATING RESULTS SUMMARY FOR THE TWELVE MONTHS ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2020

Christ Lutheran Church had total operating revenue and support of \$252,378.89 for the twelvemonth period ending December 31, 2020, \$28,140.21 higher than expenses of \$224,238.68. The actual operating gain of \$28,140.21 represents a \$64,740.21 surplus compared to the projected 2020 budget deficit of \$36,600.

Revenue totaled \$252,378.89 for the twelve-month period compared with \$206,033.14 the previous year, an increase of \$46,345.75 or 22.5 percent. This increase is largely due to another one-time bequest from a member's estate and \$26,837.00 from government grants. Worship donations decreased by \$2,781.31 or 10.2 percent compared to 2019. Simply Giving donations saw a decrease of \$1,037.35 or 4.1 percent. Pay It Forward donations fell by \$4,450.00. Numbered envelope donations decreased \$2,112.34 from \$27,772.06 in 2019, to \$25,659.72 in 2020. Tithe.ly saw another increase to \$18,273.03, signaling a trend in moving away from traditional giving mechanisms – numbered envelopes – to internet-based donation. Facility use and rental income fell by \$5,505.50 due to an agreement with Rainbow School to decrease rent during the first months of the pandemic and the recent vacancy of our rental unit. The planned cellular tower was not constructed in 2020, and rental revenues were not included in the 2020 budget.

Expenses totaled \$224,238.68 for the twelve-month period compared with \$228,712.12 the previous year, a decrease of \$4,473.44 or 2.0 percent. Expenses came under the 2020 budget by \$15,061.32.

Christ Lutheran Church is fortunate to be blessed by the tremendous efforts of Collette Wiedemann and Carolyn Koehler, who maintained CLC's QuickBooks account in 2020, and Audra Furukawa, an independent CPA providing pro bono accounting support and review. In the early verses of Ephesians 4, the apostle Paul writes to the Christians in Ephesus, a city on the Aegean Sea at the mouth of a river and at the intersection of three trading routes. The letter was written about ten years after the church had started. During the early years of this congregation, Jews and Gentiles from several ethnicities and nationalities had come together to form "one body." Paul was aware that they had done well and commended them for their faith and love.

The word "one" appears more than seven times in the first four verses. This reflects the importance Paul gave to being called into the "unity of Christ." He wanted to note that, although many of the church members came from far off, there is "one Lord, one faith, one baptism." This oneness reflects God's gift of reconciliation in Christ.

A second emphasis from Paul was that, as believers, they were to "bear with one another in love." This would require humility, gentleness, and patience as each of them practiced their faith. It would require tolerance to "maintain unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

A third emphasis was that each person had been given gifts by God and that these gifts were given to increase the whole. Because the Ephesian church was a young congregation and its members were just beginning in their faith journey, their understandings were often tossed to and fro. But as they grew in faith, each person contributed to building up the body of Christ.

The fourth and final emphasis was that by "speaking the truth in love," each person must grow into Christ. This means taking time to learn about one another and their gifts. Knowing these gifts, we can do God's work both within and beyond the faith community. When there are decisions to make or relationships to reconcile, we know to begin with prayer and reflection, always desiring to speak the truth in love — not for our own benefit but for God's glory, that we might become more complete.

As our members and friends gather today, whether face-to-face or online, we are reminded of our calling into "unity in Christ." We come from many places and work in many contexts, and yet we recognize "one Lord, one faith, one baptism."

Whether new to a worshiping community or further along the journey, we realize that humility, gentleness, and patience are required both in the good times and especially in times of uncertainty and struggle. God wants us to be more complete through our work. Christ provides the way. The Holy Spirit is with us for guidance and courage. Each of us has been given the gifts to be complete, and through our faithfulness we will grow stronger and work together as one body.

Let us pray: Lord, let the words of the apostle Paul dwell in us deeply. May we embrace the reconciling power of oneness with Christ. May this oneness guide our congregation as we live into the new realities of these times. As we meet new partners in ministry, may we take time to get to know them with patience, humility and love. Help us to see how sharing our gifts will make your work easier and more fulfilling while bringing all of us closer to Christ. May the blessings you give each day strengthen us to a living, daring confidence in your grace. Amen.
