# juror's statement

What an honor it was to serve as the juror for the 2019 Blanche Ames National Art Exhibition. With the incomparable setting of the majestic library of the Ames Mansion as a backdrop, I could almost sense Blanche's artistic presence delighting in the fact that soon, this very room would again be transformed into a gallery, marking the 16th anniversary of the show.

Over 400 entries, including both 2D and 3D works in a variety of media, were submitted by artists from across the country. So, the enormity of narrowing down that impressive volume to a slim 45 lay ahead. As I began the daunting task of reviewing the entries in reproduction form, I was secretly hoping that Blanche, the take-charge woman she was, would somehow communicate guidance in making painful decisions. There were many excellent pieces that just couldn't be included.

Ultimately, the criteria that took precedent in the selection were:

- •Resonance and communication that reaches the viewer at first glance
- •A sense of uniqueness and authenticity (often referred to as the artist's voice)
- •A perspective, point of view or composition that enhances the narrative
- •A compelling mood or lighting situation
- •Confidence and competence with the chosen media
- •A conveyance of emotion
- •Imagination
- •Strong art that stands alone, yet meshes well with the entire grouping

A few weeks after the initial jurying, I returned to the Ames Mansion to view the actual selected pieces in order to choose the award winners. The experience of



seeing the artwork as a collective body of work exceeded my expectations and I immediately felt uplifted and inspired in its presence. I hope others will too.

To each artist who entered, I congratulate you. As Albert Einstein said, "Art is standing with one hand extended into the universe and one hand extended into the world, and letting ourselves be a conduit for passing energy." Sharing your vision and passion for making art is of the utmost importance. Art is essential in this world.

A sincere thank you to Norma Urban and Robert Bendt, initiators of the exhibition, for the privilege and pleasure of having been part of this great annual tradition. This show is their labor of love! And, it continues to thrive and provide exhibition opportunities for artists locally, regionally, and nationally due to their selfless dedication, professionalism and hard work.
