The Clifford Township Supervisors are pleased to acknowledge and thank the community for the efforts at improving and expanding the Township Park and Recreation Area including the "Children's Garden". Over the last year we have seen numerous donations of time, effort, grants, and park benches to make Clifford an even better place for families. It is rewarding to see people at various times of the day walking our trails, children playing on the "jungle gym", and of course to see the active use of the baseball field.

We want to also thank the members of the Park and Recreation Committee for their efforts at securing grants, and guiding the further development of the facility. For our part, we have developed a "mini" soccer field behind the baseball field, continued to improve the grounds in general, and as many of you are aware, secured a lease with the Endless Mountain Learning Center to begin operation in our building in January 2016. We also added additional acreage in the form of a future entrance to our property off State Route 2012. This will enable vehicles to access the "back of our property" without mixing with joggers or others on our walking trails. As a service to our residents, we have instituted a pilot program for recycling on **every** Saturday of the month, not just the third Saturday.

The Township Supervisors are committed to improving the quality of life for current and future residents of the township by utilizing grants and ACT 13 "gas money" to fund our projects, not taxpayer dollars. Once again we are gratified at the community pride, which we are seeing demonstrated by volunteer work.

First, a thank you to our community and then some important safety reminders.



Some fall season safety reminders: Be sure to have working smoke detectors in your home and replace the batteries.

CO alarms – if you already have them, replace the batteries. If you do not, please make every effort to purchase and install them. As most know, CO is created by combusting fuel – wood, coal, propane, gas, etc. Carbon monoxide is colorless, odorless and tasteless. It can be present in your home due to a malfunctioning or incorrectly installed system and cause severe injury or death. CO alarms are life-saving devices for your home. Chimneys – be sure to have your chimneys in your home inspected and cleaned prior to use this heating season.

With our call volume once again on a record setting pace, it is more important than ever to support the Fire Company both in volunteering your time and through your generous financial support during our fund drives. Volunteer departments around the nation are experiencing a significant decline in volunteers to staff emergencies and handle administrative duties, we are no different. Staffing levels in the volunteer ranks are reaching "crisis" levels in our region. This has been another busy summer for the Clifford Township Historical society (CTHS). The Agricultural Museum the society put together at the Volunteer Firemen's Picnic was very well received. Operating the bone grinder, corn sheller, wash tubs, and sausage press was fun and educational for visitors of all ages. Thanks to Adams Cable Service, Jerry Lewandowski and Ray Swingle for helping to make the Agricultural Museum a reality. The firemen have offered us more space to expand, so make sure you stop by next July during the firemen's picnic. The historical society will again be arranging for Kevin Treat to show his chain saw skills at the picnic. An antique and carvings auction will be held Saturday evening.

A beautiful sign painted by Pat Wildenberg was installed by the Yarns Cider Mill at the Suraci Farm. Richard Suraci has put in long, hard hours clearing the land across from the mill. Work will commence on the Cider Mill renovation as soon as grant funds from the Endless Mountains Heritage Region become available. This project is a major undertaking for a society as small as ours, but progress continues.

Last fall the Clifford Township Supervisors purchased the house and an acre of land next to the Community Center. The historical society presented the idea of using the land as a Children's Garden. The supervisors leased the land to the CTHS, so the development of the Children's Garden began in late spring. Modeled roughly after the Ithaca Children's Garden, this special place incorporates local history with unique play opportunities, so kids can run free in a safe environment and LET THEIR IMAGINATIONS GROW while their caregivers relax!

Our work efforts this season have resulted in the near completion of a butterfly garden, four doors of history, the Clifford coal mine shaft, the willow tunnel, the flag-

stone maze, several items in the play area and the exterior fence. As weather permits, work will continue on the Music Mountain, the dinosaur nest and the early settlers farmstead, as well as a bathroom inside the house.

Greenfield Township Bicentennial Book

There's a new local history book coming out soon. Pat Peltz, a director in the Clifford Township Historical Society, has compiled a book on the early history of Greenfield Township for its historical society's bicentennial celebration in the summer of 2016.

Previously, Pat and Sally Fischbeck worked for two years to produce a book for the 2006 Clifford Township Bicentennial titled *Clifford Township 200 Years*. That publication has been very popular, selling copies to folks with connections to Clifford Township from across the entire United States. It also won an award for excellence from the *Pennsylvania Federation of Museums and Historical Societies*. In 2010, Pat dipped into her fifty year collection of family genealogies to produce her second book, the *Beechwood Settlers*, written for Herrick Township as a requirement for their comprehensive plan.

Since being asked in early 2014 by the Greenfield Township Historical Society to tackle writing her third book, Pat has been hard at work producing yet another fabulous local history publication! Greenfield Township was much larger when established in 1816. It included Fell, Carbondale, and Scott townships, plus parts of several others. The new book will include maps, historical facts, and family histories as well as photographs of the graduating classes of Greenfield High School from 1919 to 1959.
