


the Presidents Corner:

I am pleased to report that the owners of the Crow Valley School have agreed to proceed on a proposal to deed their property over to the Orcas Museum. If all goes well, the Museum will be able to continue providing docents for the School as in previous years. The ownership and some related insurance issues were clouding whether or not the Museum would be able to continue this relationship this summer.

Many, many thanks to Margot Shaw and her merry band of innkeepers for putting on our Spring fundraiser event, the 'History Lives Here' tour of historic lodgings, held Saturday March 26th. This event raised about \$2000 for the Museum, and was enjoyed by island visitors and residents who hadn't had an opportunity to tour these historic homes. Participating inns were: Kangaroo House, Turtleback Farm Inn, Blue Heron Inn, The Place at Cayou Cove, Deer Harbor Inn and the Outlook Inn. The Museum also participated, and we need to thank our Board member Denise Wilk for filling the Museum's exhibit room with a beautiful display of memorabilia from the heyday of Orcas resorts dating from the '20s to the '50s. If you happen to have missed the tour, this exhibit will be on display throughout the summer along with our first showing of the cast replica of our *Bison Antiquus* skull.

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The Crow Valley School Museum was originally built in 1888 entirely by volunteer labor, and it housed it's highest enrollment of 47 students in 1893. After the school closed in 1918 the building continued to be used as a meeting place and in 1929 was purchased by a women's club called "The Willing Workers". Many of the club's members had been students at the former school. In the 1960's Richard Schneider and Bud McBride bought the property and began caring for the old schoolhouse and it's contents and grounds. The building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1987, and the schoolhouse has been open summers as a Museum since 1989. One of the highlights of the current display is a collection of photographs of many of the County's original schools. We expect that the property will soon be deeded over to the OIHM and the CV School Museum will be open during the summer, Saturdays and Wednesdays, from noon to 4pm starting Saturday July 2nd.

Bison Antiquus has been "cloned"

It was a nail-biting few weeks after we shipped off our priceless and irreplaceable Bison Antiquus skull

along with a few other significant bones to a company in Los Angeles called "Bone Clones" who specializes in casting perfect replicas from ancient skeletal remains. The replicas and the originals finally arrived home safely and we are now busy preparing a 6 x 15 foot corner backdrop mural for the items, which will depict the grassland near Olga where this creature lived over 14,000 years ago, along with a rendition of the hunters who scientists believe caused the demise of this particular species of 'mega-fauna'. The completely intact skull was found during the excavation of Ayers Pond several years ago, and is considered to be one of the finest specimens of it's kind in the world. The original skull is kept in our archive room for safe keeping but the very beautiful replica will soon be part of our permanent natural history exhibit.

The newly engraved bricks are here!

Every year the Orcas Museum collects orders for custom-engraved bricks to be permanently installed into our entrance walkways, and during the following winter we send the complete order off. The 2010 order has just arrived and we are hoping to have them all laid by the Opening Day Party on Friday May 27th! A few bricks that had mis-spelled words or had somehow become damaged were also replaced with this order, so we're looking forward to getting them all in place. Orders for engraved bricks are taken throughout the year and order forms are available from the OIHM office or from the Bricks Page on our website at www.orcasmuseum.org. Prices are: \$50 for an 8x4" brick, and \$100 for an 8x8" brick. Gift certificates are also available. It's a great way both support the Museum and provide a special commemoration for a loved one, family, or business, or to immortalize a favorite quotation or sentiment.
