Your Historical Society and Orcas Island Historical Museums celebrated the Pioneer Museum's 60th Birthday in a grand way on May 14. Dozens were on hand for cake and ice cream, root beer floats (all courtesy of Island Market), tug o' war, egg runs, and the gunny sack races.



There were plenty of laughs and smiles all around while more than 100 people signed our time line noting when they or their ancestors moved to Orcas to live. Brittney Maruska, our new administrative assistant, did an excellent job on the graphic design. If you haven't seen and signed the time line yet, come into the Pioneer Museum during open hours and sign your name while you visit this year's feature exhibit: WINGS OVER ORCAS ISLAND - An Aviation History.

All our Board members, many Society members, our volunteers and community members sang Happy Birthday to the Museum and Society. The day's festivities culminated in the burning of the mortgage by former Society president Bill Buchan. This is a major accomplishment for a small Museum such as ours. When I came aboard more than three years ago the Society owed over \$40,000 on a mortgage loan for the new addition. Everyone on the Board and folks in the community have worked hard to retire this debt and it demonstrates the strength of unity, a shared vision and teamwork. When you consider the price of everything such as utilities,



phone, internet, grounds-keeping, exhibit materials, office supplies, etc. has increased since 2008 when the debt was incurred this is a noteworthy achievement. 60 years is quite a milestone and here's to another 60!

These and many other stories of Orcas ghosts and gremlins will be told this summer at the Pioneer Museum and the Crow Valley School Museum by Master Storyteller, Antoinette Botsford. The Museum's historical pictures and documents will bring you back to a time when students walked to school and brothers and sisters sat side by side in grades 1 through 8. Docents provide a fascinating narrated tour.

Wings Over Orcas Island Opens to Great Reviews

Former Naval Aviators, general aviation pilots and the public toured the Pioneer Museum's newest exhibit and gave it strong reviews: "excellent", "very well done", "we very much enjoyed."

The Museum's 2016 featured exhibit covers some of the earliest flights over and to the island. The exhibit traces the history of San Juan Airlines, founded as Orcas Island Air Service by Bob Schoen; one of the first scheduled air taxi commuter airlines on the West Coast.



The exhibit also includes information on a number of women pilots who flew and continue to fly on the island as well as our own Mercy Pilots of Orcas who provide wonderful service to islanders needing medical treatment off island.

Orcas has been home to many pilots with extraordinary flying experiences who have contributed to the exhibit. These include Bob and Harry Patton, Bob Foulk, Bob Waunch and others.


The Store has had a makeover and is brimming with new merchandise. There is a new section filled with toys and stuffed animals for kids.

It's official! There will be a Listening Station set up in the Oral History Room of the Pioneer Museum this summer. Thanks to contributions from the community for this project, Hearing Orcas Voices received a \$3,680 grant through the Orcas Island Community Foundation. We received donations from nearly 50 different sources! We appreciate that show of encouragement in this project.



While less than the total funds needed for the project, the money raised will allow us to purchase the equipment and software needed for the touch screen Listeners Station. All of the voices in our collection and the related photographs have been digitized, so we can program the computer to make them accessible to visitors very quickly.

Orcas Voices is an ongoing project, so If you have historic photographs we could copy, or old cassette tapes of your family in your storage, bring them in and let us see if they are suitable for use in our new listening station.



Passport Into History

Have you stood in the old jail on San Juan Island whose inhabitants included the murderer, Leon Straub, the only person to be hanged in San Juan County? Have you viewed the restored gillnetter, the *Sally J*, on Lopez Island? Make 2016 the year you visit all of the historical museums in the San Juan Islands. Not only will you have fun and learn more about our history, but you can also qualify for a chance to win one of three island getaway packages.



The Orcas Island Historical Museums have joined with the historical museums on Lopez and San Juan Islands and the San Juan Visitors Bureau to create the *Passport into History* program. The Passport offers visitors and residents an opportunity to learn more about each island's unique history. Passports are available at any of the four participating museums:



Crow Valley School Museum (Orcas Island)

Lopez Island Historical Museum

Orcas Island Pioneer Museum

San Juan Historical Museum

Passport holders will have their Passport stamped when they visit a participating museum. Once Passport holders have visited museums on all three islands during 2016, they are eligible to be entered into a drawing for a getaway for two, which includes two nights' lodging at a local inn, hotel or bed and breakfast, dinner at a local restaurant and fun local extras, like whale watching or kayaking. The museums on each island are putting together their own package so you could enter to win the San Juan package, the Orcas package or the Lopez package. The details of each island's package are available at that island's museums.



How does it work? Its as easy as one, two, three.

1. Pick up your Passport at the Pioneer Museum or the Crow Valley School Museum and have it stamped.
2. Visit the museums on the other two Islands before the end of 2016 and have your Passport validated at each one.
3. After you are finished, complete the raffle ticket in the back of the Passport book and return it to the museum whose getaway package you would like to win.

The drawing will be held at the end of the year and winners will be able to claim their prize in 2017. Blackout dates may apply.

WA Rural Heritage Project

And, the latest addition to this collection is an album of photos that Jim took in Alaska during the Gold Rush. These date from 1909 to 1913. He built a Road House for stage coach passengers to stay overnight, planted a garden and preserved food to feed them, and hunted to supply all their

meat. You'll see all that and more!

Our **June 12 History Matinee** at the Eastsound Fire Hall at 3PM will feature Magicair Tour's Rod Wagner. Rod is an artist. His chosen medium is pretty unique. He uses wind, clouds, the San Juan islands, and his plane, a rare 1929 Curtiss-Wright Travelair bi-plane, to make magic.

The many happy customers who have flown with Rod since he bought his plane in 1991 will attest that he is an artist and the trips are magical.
