GROUNDED: FINDING GOD IN THE WORLD, A SPIRITUAL REVOLUTION

This past winter Inland West staff after reflecting on the mission center conference of 2023 thought it would be a good idea to have a book club in preparation for the summer camps and mission center conference 2024. We talked about various titles and settled on *Grounded* by Diana Butler-Bass.

We began the book club on January 30 and convened two gatherings a week every other week to talk about a chapter. The gatherings started off with very good participation and continued good throughout the duration of the book club. Overall, I have been very

pleased with the participation, the thoughtful responses to the questions and the insights that have been gained. We were blessed by the development of questions and a spiritually centering activity by Michelle.

At the upcoming World Conference 2025 the potential exists for several pieces of legislation to come before the body concerning climate and earth stewardship (I know of two pieces in formation as this is being written). As we have journeyed through *Grounded* my hope is that folks who participated in the book club have been able to either connect for the first time or to reconnect with the idea that God is evident in everything around us.

We are beginning to see in dramatic ways how climate change will alter our lives if not completely disrupt them. We see in the news daily the effects of climate change on vulnerable communities, especially in the developing parts of the world. Entire communities in Alaska, the Pacific Islands, and coastal plains are being displaced. Tidal flooding which was a common occurrence on Samish Island, for instance, is now becoming an annual thing and the likelihood is high that the lower property around Freestad lake will be covered in water in the future and all of

RECLAIMING FAITH: A JOURNEY OF HEALING

My journey of faith and self-discovery has been anything but straightforward. As someone who was excommunicated from the Mormon Church due to my sexuality and questioning of official doctrine, I faced a period of profound isolation and confusion. The church had been my community, my identity, and the lens through which I viewed the world. Losing that was akin to losing a part of myself. Yet, this loss also marked the beginning of a transformative journey. This excommunication was one of the greatest blessings I would ever receive.

I will never forget reading the first words from Emma Smith, after the schism: "I have been called apostate; but I have never apostatized, nor forsaken the faith I at first accepted; but was called so because I would not accept their new fangled notion." These words brought me great comfort.

It was painful to walk through those doors for the first time. I remember sitting in my car with tears running down my face

from pure terror. I came in. I sat down in the furthest corner, back in a pew. I sat through the service, then left quietly out of the back door. I wasn't sure what this place was or how I would interact with it. I had no idea if I would even go back. But then I reached out via Facebook, and Jason invited me to Seekers class.

In the moments of overcoming my initial fear, I learned the value of approaching others with open arms, free from the shadows of my past. This approach not only has facilitated my healing but also has allowed me to forge deep, meaningful connections based on present realities rather than past grievances.

Embracing others with an open heart and mind, without the baggage of previous hurts, opens the door to genuine relationships and a supportive community that can truly enrich your life. It's about giving yourself and those around you the chance to write a new story; one where trust, understanding, and mutual respect are the foundation.

I discovered a community that fosters love, compassion, and inclusivity. This community, unlike any I had been a part of before, was built on the principles of acceptance, love, and mutual respect.

the homes in that area will be flooded out.

Inland West Mission Center encompasses a geographic and climatic region that is very desirable for people wishing to escape the wildfires and heat of the southwestern USA. We are seeing climate migration happening in our neighborhoods as folks from other places become our new neighbors. Much of the crisis of immigration around the world can be directly tied to climate change that has brought on famine, war, and destruction of environments which becomes "unfit for (hu)man or beast."

It is undeniable that God loves all of creation—"God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good" (Genesis 1:31)—and that humanity has a place in that loving relationship. At one time I believed that humanity was special in our place on Earth. I still believe that, only differently than before. My previous thinking that we were special because of the story in Genesis two that grants to humanity dominion over the planet. Our ability to bend nature to our will because of our large brains and communication skills has had incredible results, good and bad. Our lives in the western world are more comfortable and longer than possibly ever before in history. The problem is that we have become addicted to comfort and much of that comfort comes from destructive behavior, something I participate in every morning during the winter when I set the thermostat on the furnace to 68 degrees and in the summer when I set the air conditioner to 77 degrees. This convenience comes as a result of fossil fuels. As does the comfort and convenience of digging a hole with a motorized auger instead of a shovel. My point in all of this is that we, as disciples of Jesus should be engaged in a regular practice of repentance. The continual process of self-examination and turning away from those behaviors that do damage to ourselves and others. The purpose of our book club was to get people to think and reflect, or in other words open the door for repentance. To make a better world we first have to make communities and better communities start with better people who are aware of what is happening around them and their part in the problems and the solutions. I think that Diana Butler-Bass has led us in the right direction.

Here, I was welcomed for who I am. This environment fostered a sense of belonging that I had longed for, without the conditions and expectations that previously governed my spiritual life.

In this new community, I have learned the importance of self-compassion and the strength that comes from vulnerability. I am encouraged to explore my beliefs, ask questions, and express doubts without fear of judgment. This freedom is liberating. This journey taught me that while we cannot change the past, we have the power to shape our future.

By taking responsibility for our healing and refusing to let past hurts define our relationships and beliefs, we can find peace and purpose. My experience has shown me that there is a place for everyone, regardless of where they come from or what they have been through. Finding that place starts with the courage to seek it out and the willingness to embrace a new narrative for our lives.

With this confirmation, I am reclaiming the narrative that I am not lesser than. I am reclaiming the church I always hoped I could have. I am reclaiming my faith and believing in the community that has helped make me whole once again. I can choose to suffer, or choose to have peace.

And I have chosen peace.
