# **Main Topics Discussed**

## 1. FY2026 City Budget Overview – District H Council Member Mario Castillo:

Council Member Castillo briefed the group on the ongoing development of the city budget. He is vice-chair of the Budget & Fiscal Affairs Committee, and stressed the committee's focus on the capital improvement plan along with transparency in the development process. He has proposed evening public sessions once per month to accommodate residents who are unable to attend midday meetings due to work, school or caregiving responsibilities.

- Trash services funded at \$101M (down 5.5%)
- Library budget down 7.2%, Police budget \$1.1B (+3.4%)
- State appropriations added \$17M for parks citywide
- STR enforcement begins Jan 2026; \$150K funded for enforcement officer
- Consolidation and AI discussed to manage staff retirements and improve service
- 2. Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Transparency Council Member Mario Castillo:
- Proposed ordinance for monthly council updates and early project notifications
- Three CIP amendments referred to Committee of the Whole
- 3. Evening Public Session Proposal District H Council Member Mario Castillo:
- Proposal to move one monthly City Council public session to 6:00 PM
- Scheduled for July 8–9 for public comment and council vote
- 4. Transportation Committee Relaunch SN22 President Dexter Handy:

Dexter Handy briefed attendees on the plans and progress.

- Matt Tetlow and Mark Kosiara were cited as principal contributors; volunteers were solicited.
- Reestablished vision and mission for the SN22 Transportation Committee
- Civic survey conducted via Mentimeter to solicit input in real time regarding problems and projects on the committee's horizon.
- Topics: Washington Ave Corridor, pedestrian safety, speed limits, METRO Boost 85
- 5. TIRZ 5 Project Prioritization **Dexter Handy**:
- Survey identified top priorities: Washington Ave improvements, pedestrian bridges, sidewalks
- Committee will circulate broader survey and advocate based on resident input

#### **Actions Voted On**

Approved: Letter of support to METRO via Council Members Abbie Kamin & Mario Castillo requesting improvements along Boost 85 corridor with a copy to Mayor Whitmire:

- Mid-block crossings and pedestrian refuge islands
- High-visibility crosswalks
- Transit Signal Prioritization (TSP) reinstatement

## Approved: April 2025 Meeting Minutes

- These minutes were singled out for specific approval in order to provide documentation of the Rice Military Civic Club's financial support of SN22 admin expenses of \$214.92 for

reimbursement. The minutes were approved and the motion passed in advance of the July 1, 2025 deadline.

## **Key Takeaways**

The June SN22 meeting featured robust dialogue around the City's budget, prioritization of public safety and basic services, and the need for transparency in capital planning. The Transportation Committee has re-energized with fresh leadership, and community feedback is shaping priorities across both METRO and city-funded projects. Resident participation in upcoming council sessions and surveys is strongly encouraged.
