Biography

Kenneth J. Krug, 67, of Bad Axe, MI, died peacefully at his home under hospice care on Tuesday, March 23, 2021, after a short battle with cancer. Ken was born on June 9, 1953 to Vern and Martha (Briolat) Krug in Bad Axe. He married Janis Wyrick on May 7, 1971. Ken and Janis lived briefly in Bad Axe before moving to Xenia, OH, and then Mt. Victory, OH. They moved back to Bad Axe after Ken's father's death to help run his family's dairy farm. Janis preceded him in death in June, 2002. Ken married Beth (Moses Halifax) Krug on May 15, 2008. Ken was a farmer and a truck driver for many years, owning and operating his own trucking company, Ken Krug and Daughters, Inc. He figured that he drove more than 1 million miles before he finally (reluctantly) retired from trucking. He was proud to be a farmer and considered it a joy to work the land. Ken loved to work, but he also loved being with friends, sharing a drink with them in his garage, helping his neighbors, and watching the sun set from his front porch.
