

ANTON PFLF

1915 - 1996

Anton Pflf, 81, who became a U.S. citizen in 1967 after 45 years as a "man without a country," passed away Thursday, Aug. 16, at Hills and Dales Hospital, Cass City. He had been visiting, driving in the Cass City area, when he was stricken with a heart attack.

Mr. Pflf achieved broad recognition after, with the combined help of Harry Truman at his adopted town, Sennerville, he took his oath to uphold and defend the U.S. Constitution in Detroit Federal Building on March 16, 1967.

He was born in Yugoslavia on July 24, 1915, the son of Nicholas and Wina (Kolling) Pflf. On Nov. 11, 1940, he was united in marriage with Elizabeth Schwartz in Stephanstfeld, Yugoslavia, and she survives him.

Mr. Pflf fled Yugoslavia during the Communist takeover, moving first to Germany, and then to Detroit in 1957. He worked in the auto and the industry in Detroit until his retirement to Sennerville in the late 1970s.

Surviving Mr. Pflf with Elizabeth are two daughters, Barbara (Owen) Richardson of El Paso, TX, and Lois (Chuck) Saylor of Howell; seven grandchildren, Cheyenne, Sonya, Diane, Dennis, Toni, Crystal and Charles; seven great-grandchildren, Lee, William, Herman and Joseph Pflf, both in Germany, and several nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by several brothers and sisters.

Funeral services were conducted at 11 a.m. Monday, Aug. 19, at First-METHODIST Funeral Home, Sennerville, with Father George Serour, pastor of Holy Family Catholic Church, Sennerville, officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.
