Yes! Tu B'Shevat occurs in January and is celebrated at In 16th century Israel, Rabbi Yitzchak Luria of Safed and his disciples created a Tu B'Shevat seder, somewhat like the Passover seder, that celebrated the Tree of Life. The earliest published version of this seder is called the P'ri Eitz Hadar, which means "The Fruit of the Beautiful Tree." Welcome to 2021, a year that we hope will be better than 2020. But making this year better than last year isn't going to magically happen with the purchase of a new calendar. There's a lot of work to be done to repair the damage that has been

done to our world – in many spheres besides fighting the pandemic. While trying to stay safe from a deadly virus, we have also been dealing with civil disorder, a teetering economy, a contentious presidential election, and rising racism and antisemitism.

This makes for a rather awkward segue to our next Jewish holiday: *Purim*, which begins at sunset on Thursday, February 25th. Given that it may take a few months before we all are vaccinated against COVID, it seems likely that we will be celebrating another holy day as remote participants. But maybe that's okay. Maybe it's for the better that we have to skip the noise and frivolity of the typical *Purim* observance in favor of

some quiet, personal reflection. Can the story of Esther provide insight into the problems we're still experiencing today?

Even the name of Esther can give us some insight into the Jewish experience. Her birth name was Hadassah. Hadassah assumed the name Esther (which is a Persian name meaning "star") as a means of hiding her Jewish identity when she was to be presented to the king. Downplaying your Jewish identity to get ahead has not much changed in modern times. And are people who attack synagogues so very different from Haman (cursed be his name) who extrapolated his anger at Mordechai into an excuse to exterminate all Jews?

Is there truly nothing new under the sun? Is homo sapiens a doomed species incapable of ever doing better? I have no answers. This past year has been trying on so many levels, with so many people refusing to think of the greater good. But there also are many people who have shown so much goodness that I think there's a chance for our species. But only if we keep it together in 2021.







15 Shevat 5781 - 27 January 2021

Tu B'Shvat is a Jewish holiday occurring on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat. It is also called Rosh HaShanah La'llanot, literally 'New Year of the Trees'. In contemporary Israel, the day is celebrated as an ecological awareness day, and trees are planted in celebration.

The seder ended with a prayer which states, "May all the sparks scattered by our hands, or by the hands of our ancestors, or by the sin of the first human against the fruit of the tree, be returned and included in the majestic might of the Tree of Life."

It is generally customary to eat dried fruits and nuts. Figs, dates, raisins, carob, and almonds are especially popular. Many people also incorporate into their seders the Seven Species associated with the Land of Israel. *Torah* describes them in Deuteronomy 8:8 as wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives and dates.


New Memorial Plaques

Cemetery plots are for sale in our unique, historic resting place. The Cemetery Committee, chaired by SEYMOUR BIRNBAUM, has prepared the appropriate documentation for the purchase of gravesites.

Call the temple (843 325-0389) and request copies of Burial Rights, Rules and Regulations, Fee Schedule, and a schematic of burial plot locations. All plots include perpetual care. Plots are only available to current members of Temple Beth Elohim and to their families.



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
