

DEADLINE SET FOR MISS DORVAL CONTESTANTS

The 1961 version of the annual Miss Dorval contest sponsored by the Dorval Junior Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with Dorval Day celebrations, is well underway, with a number of entries already received. On June 17th Miss Beverly Edmonds will relinquish her crown when the newly selected Miss Dorval will commence her year of representing the city as its reigning Queen. Preliminary judging will take place during the week of June 12th and the selection of a new Miss Dorval will precede the actual parade and festivities.

"Combo One" C. D. Exercise This Sunday

An appeal is being made by George Goodale, Chairman of Dorval's Civil Defence organization, to all citizens, asking them to help make the Civil Defence exercise this coming Sunday, June 4th, appear realistic by assisting in any way possible those taking part in the operation, which will be called COMBO ONE.

Said Mr. Goodale, "If a citizen is asked to carry a stretcher, telephone one of the command posts, or do any other small task, his help would be appreciated. By helping out in this way, it will assist us to impart an air of realism to the overall exercise."

Plans have now been finalized for the exercise, the first of what is hoped to be a series to be carried out from now until the autumn in co-operation with the Canadian militia.

A casualty clearing station is to be set up in the vicinity of Dorval Gardens School, while City Hall will be the focal point for the local organization. The column support manned by army personnel will be established at the municipal garage.

Many weeks of planning have gone into the program and it is expected that very useful lessons should be learned from the operation as a whole.

Starting approximately 9:00 a.m. Sunday morning, the exercise will continue throughout the day.

PROTESTANT SCHOOL BOARD ANNUAL SURVEY

The annual real estate assessment survey by the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal reveals that the level of assessment in general for the City of Dorval is comparable to that of the City of Montreal and, generally speaking, current municipal assessments will be used as the basis for calculating school tax on the Protestant and Neutral panels. The only exception is that a minimum assessment value has been placed on land by the Board and any land assessed at less than \$3,500.00 per acre will be increased to this figure for the Board's purposes.

PARENTS APPLAUD CHAIRMAN

Guy Pager Defends Position On Bi-Ethnic High School Issue

An audience of well over 100 interested parents and taxpayers gave Guy Pager, Q.C. Chairman of the Dorval Catholic School Commission a warm ovation Monday night as he refused, point by point, a public advertisement opposing the establishment of a bi-ethnic Catholic High School in Dorval and condemning his support of the project.

The \$1,000,000 proposed structure would be located on the southern half of the old Elm Ridge Golf Course and would accommodate both French and English speaking boys and girls in separate classes, with all having access to common library, gymnasium, auditorium and laboratory facilities, etc.

Although approved unanimously by the Dorval Catholic School Commission some time ago, the plans have been held up at Quebec, "... due," said Mr. Pager, "to the delaying


tactics of a small minority groups claiming to fully represent the French speaking population of this city."

Strangely enough, the executive of "L'Alliance des Associations Paroissiales" have not identified themselves to the public and if any were present at the meeting Monday night, they apparently did not have the courage of their convictions to stand up and state their case before the local citizenry.

"It is regrettable," said Mr. Pager, "that a small group of individuals have seen fit to make statements that may effect the unity of the French and English speaking people in Dorval."

"The individuals behind this Association are either ignorant or..."

TWO WEEK EXTENSION FOR LAKESHORE HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN

Enthusiasm is running high throughout the Lakeshore communities in support of the \$3,500,000 Lakeshore General Hospital campaign now underway. With two weeks of the month-long campaign completed, Hospital Fund officials report that Lakeshore residents from Hudson to Dorval, and from Pierrefonds to the shore of Lake St. Louis are responding generously to the appeal.

While a record of all gifts and subscriptions to date is not yet available, due to a delayed start by the canvass groups in some areas, there is an indication that more than a casual interest is being taken by business and industry, and by the

general public alike.

To date, a total of \$902,375, has been recorded, representing approximately 36% of the \$2,500,000 objective for industrial and general public support.

General Chairman John M. Wells reports that several sizeable gifts have been received from Lakeshore and Montreal sources. Some industrial concerns after discussion with campaign leaders, have doubled the amounts they originally intended to give. Mr. Wells hastened to point out, however, that the real success of the campaign will depend on the response of the Lakeshore residents, and that reports to date indicate that they are responding to the challenge. However, he stated that the campaign was being extended for a further two-week period to enable more complete coverage of the area.

On the average to date, subscriptions over a three-year period are approximately the Fund's objective per family. In many cases, the contribution exceeds this amount - in others it is less, depending on financial means and personal circumstances. It is evident however, that each individual is considering his or her contribution, not in terms of averages, but with a real sense of personal responsibility insofar as the Hospital is concerned.

TRANSPORT Ports

The greatest Port expansion program in the history of Canada is underway.

At Montreal, expansion of sheds, wharfs, and equipment to meet the increasing demands of inland and overseas shipping is nearing completion. An additional 5.5 million bushel capacity grain elevator will be undertaken this year.

At Quebec, a new wharf will be constructed in the St. Charles estuary and the existing wharf and sheds will be reconstructed. A program of land reclamation for oil storage sites is underway.

Work will begin shortly on the first stage of a three year program of reconstruction of a long wharf and sheds at Saint John, N.B.

An extensive dredging and wharf construction project is presently underway at Churchill, Manitoba.

At Vancouver, the opening of a new shed on Centennial Pier will complete the facilities available to ocean and coastal shipping. In the past three years, \$10.8 million has been spent for capital million will be spent in 1960-61.

Railways

The construction of new railway lines to assist in the development of areas rich in resources in the last three years exceeds railway construction undertaken anywhere else in North America.

Almost 300 miles of rails were laid in Quebec to assist in the development of large mineral bodies in the northern part of the province. Between Beattyville, Cache Lake and Chibougamau, a total of 161 miles was completed in 1957 and the 133 mile section between Cache Lake and St. Felicien was completed in 1959.

The cost of construction totalled \$34.5 million and \$7.4 million of this sum was contributed by the federal Government.

A second branch railway lines, to assist in the development of large mineral deposits in northern Manitoba, was built from Optic Lake to Chisel Lake. The 51.2 mile branch line was completed at a total cost of \$7.5 million.

Freight Rates

The problems of railway transportation and inequalities in freight rate structures

are presently under examination. The Progressive Conservative Government has taken direct action to relieve substantially the effects of the increase in non-competitive freight rates.

The sum of \$35 million provided by the Conservative Government will reduce freight rates by 9% - making the effective increase in freight rates 8% instead of 17%.

Safe Railway Crossings

The Progressive Conservative Government is providing \$5 million a year and an additional \$10 million during each of the next three years in order to speed up the completion of safe railway crossings.

This was the largest graduating class in the history of the young college. Thirty-four candidates were awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree, fourteen the Bachelor of Science.

Commencement exercises opened with the baccalaureate mass in the Church of the Ascension of Our Lord, Westmount, on Sunday, May 21, at 11 o'clock. Reverend Henry Hall, curate of St. Kevin's Church and professor at Marianopolis, delivered the baccalaureate sermon. A faculty reception for the graduates and their parents was held in the administration building on Peel Street on Sunday afternoon.

Degrees were conferred by the Right Reverend Irenée Lussier, Rector of the University of Montreal, in the ceremony which was held on Tuesday, May 23, in the Montreal University Auditorium with His Excellency the Most Reverend Lawrence P. Whelan presiding. The Commencement address was given by Dr. Muriel V. Roscoe, Warden of the Royal Victoria College, McGill University.

Home And School International Conference

Nuclear disarmament, an international conference of parent groups, the value of "streaming" in schools, the effectiveness of television as a teaching medium -- these are a few of the many topics that will concern some 80 delegates from across Canada attending the annual meeting of the Canadian Home and School and Parent-Teacher Federation at Macdonald College next week from June 4 to 9.

Gathering in Montreal for the first time since 1953, the Home and School representatives of some 325,000 parents in Canada's 10 provinces will follow a busy schedule of meetings, discussions and special events during the six-day sessions.

Two functions will be open to Montreal area Home and School members and to the general public. The first of these is the official opening at 8:30 p.m. Monday, June 5, which will feature brief talks by representatives of several educational bodies and an address by the national president, Douglas Walkington, of Hudson. "Home and School Meets the Press" will be another open meeting with a panel of Home and School leaders being questioned by press representatives, from 8 to 10 p.m. Wednesday, June 7. Both of these events will be held in the main Macdonald College auditorium.

Other highlights for the delegates will be a supper at St. Helen's Island tendered by the City of Montreal on Monday, June 5, and the annual banquet Thursday evening, June 8 when Hon. Paul Gerin-Lajoie, Quebec minister of youth and welfare, will be the speaker on behalf of the host Province of Quebec.

On of the most significant proposals to be considered by the conferees is a recommendation that Canadian Home and School should sponsor an international conference of pa-

rent groups in 1963, with delegates from 25 countries meeting for three days in Ottawa followed by one day at the United Nations. A decision to move into the international field would be a historic one for the Canadian body.

Other resolutions to be considered would have Federal income tax exemptions for children under 16 increased from \$250 to \$350, would make illegal the import or sale of plastic bags in Canada unless clearly marked as dangerous, would allow as deductible expenses from income tax the cost of text books required by school authorities and not otherwise provided by schools, and would establish effective controls -- at the national distributor's level -- over obscene and pornogra-

phic publications. Other subjects getting close scrutiny will be the question of "streaming" in modern education, the inadequacy of school library facilities in many locations, the effect of television on children and its positive use in education, the education of Indian children, and participation in the 1962 Canadian Conference on Education.

The Quebec Federation of Protestant Home and School Associations, headed by John N. Parker of Notre Dame de Grace, is host body for the meeting. Jack W. Chivers of Town of Mount Royal and Mrs. J.C. Portnuff of Westmount are co-chairmen of the committee on local arrangements.

WINNIE ILLE PU, a later version of A.A. Milne's Winnie-the-Pooh, translated by Alexander Lenard, McLelland and Stewart; \$3.50.

If, in your erstwhile struggles through the Gallic wars or Virgils' Aeneid, you gained the impression that Latin was a humourless tongue, Mr. Lenard's translation Milbe's classic for children is here to disabuse you of any such notions. "Winnie Ille Pu" has swept the cocktail party set in Boston, Philadelphia, and New York and has now, so says this week's Maclean's, become a "status item" in Montreal's leading book stores.



The recounting of Eeyore's tail which Pooh finds is used as a bell-pull at Owl's house, "because nobody wanted it" is as delightful in Latin as in English.

May we quote?
"Owl," said Pooh solemnly, "you made a mistake. Somebody did want it."
"Who?"
"Eeyore. My friend Eeyore. He was fond of it."
"Fond of it?"
"Attached to it," said Winnie-the-Pooh sadly.
And here are the last two lines of Lenard's translation --
"Iori. Amico meo carissimo Iori. Tenuit eum."
"Tenuit?"
"Ei vinculis adstrictus erat," dixit Winnie ille pu, maestus.
Can the economy of Latin be more charmingly illustrated? There could be no more pleasant way of spurring your teenage Latin student than with a copy of Winnie Ille Pu!

Ward Commemorates R.F. Kelso

A four-bed maternity ward in the new Lakeshore General Hospital will be known as the R.F. Kelso ward, commemorating the 47 years of

service of a beloved Lakeshore general practitioner.



AT MONTREAL AIRPORT: A dispute which has not been publicized is brewing up between the Department of Transport, Major Oil Companies and the Airlines with regard to the fuel dispensing hydrant system. The system appears to have been built by D.O.T., designed by oil companies and operated by a consolidated refueling company. And not one of these wishes to accept ownership of the fuel in the airport storage tanks. At the present time it seems that the pressure is being applied most heavily in the direction of the airlines.

LADY GUEST SPEAKER, A FIRST FOR LITTLE METRO: A sign that the Status of Dorval stands high in Safety matters was shown when Mrs. Mary Godbeer, Chairman of the Dorval Safety Council, was invited to speak on Traffic Safety at the meeting of Little Metro last Friday at Larry Moquin's Hotel. The theme of Mrs. Godbeer's talk was the opportunity which is inherent in a group like Little Metro to discuss mutual safety matters common to all the communities. 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

rant of the facts and ignorant of the law, or are past plain dishonest," he continued, and promised that their falsehoods would be rebutted.

"I assume, I know, that their motives are personal, selfish and political," Mr. Pager went on, "and I hope that the adult population of Dorval will see through their scheme."

To confirm that the members of the Commission were still unanimously in favor of the combined high school Mr. Pager then asked each member of the Commission if he would again indicate his support. All members (L. Decary, R. Angrignon, G.M. Audette and Dr. Peter Paré) answered in the affirmative.

Mr. Pager reviewed the history of the plans leading up to the proposed new high school and commented on the progress made by the Commission over the past six years.

"Six years ago we had a deficit of \$300,000," he said. "Today we have a surplus of \$250,000. In addition Dorval boasts one of the lowest school tax rates in Quebec, yet its Catholic teachers are among the highest, if not the highest paid in the province."

"It is also interesting to note," he added, "that seven of the eight points outlined in Mr. Gerin-Lajoie's new Education Bill are reflected in programs already put into effect by the Dorval Catholic School Commission."

In announcing his decision not to run for re-election when his term expires next week, Mr. Pager said that his dream of a fine new school equal to the best, had become a nightmare.

"I am for harmony," he concluded, "and by stepping down I may render a service to the Board by stopping all these unfounded accusations."

A vote of thanks for Mr. Pager's past services was then moved by a member of the audience and adopted amid strong applause.

In a telephone conversation with The Dorval Reporter, Mr. Pager revealed that a delegation from the Commission had been granted an audience with Cardinal Leger this morning (Thursday) to discuss the matter further.

NOTICE is hereby given to all the taxpayers of the Catholic School Board of the City of Dorval, that Section 125 of the Education Act (Revised Statutes 1941, Chapter 59) has been amended for our School Board, by replacing the first paragraph by the following:-

Section 125: - "To have a right to vote at any election of school commissioners or trustees it shall be necessary to be of the age of majority, a Canadian citizen, the owner of real estate or of a building erected upon land belonging to another, provided that the real estate or building be valued on the valuation roll in force at not less than fifty dollars for owners residing in the municipality and at not less than two hundred dollars for owners residing outside of the municipality, to be entered as such upon the valuation roll, and to have paid before the first juridical Monday of June all school contributions."
