

24 has been cancelled. That drops the total races to 9 with 6 required for end of year awards.


Florence Cancelled: Frank Leivan mentioned that the MHSC race scheduled for June 4 at Florence MO has been cancelled.

Wilderness Rescue Vehicle

New rescue equipment in use by Ozark Fire Dept:

An innovative piece of equipment designed by Assistant Fire Chief Kevin Kelley and other members of the fire department and community will rescue fallen wanderers who've met with mishaps in the Missouri wilderness.

"I came up with the idea over a year ago." Kelley said. "I thought there should be an easier way to rescue people from wilderness areas."

The unique trailer carries a body-sized rescue basket equipped with safety straps, back-board, oxygen and other necessities that enhance a life-saving rescue.

Pulled behind Kelley's own four-wheel drive allterrain vehicle, the rescue carrier can go where no man should have gone before. Kelley said his ATV is big enough and tough enough to climb the steepest of inclines or traverse the most rugged of trails.

"The main reason it was built is because sometimes we've gone down to the Chadwick motorcycle area in the Mark Twain National Forest when people are lost," Kelley said. "We've had several people lost in that area. (The vehicle) is a good way to get the people out of the wilderness."

Kelley said the rescue trailer has been operational for almost three months and the cost to the fire department was only \$70.

"Jon Wardlow at Campbell Ford gave us the frame and back axle," he said. "Jerry Farmer of Farmer Cycles donated the tires. I contacted Robert Lynch of Tri-L Manufacturing and he did the welding."

Other bits and pieces plus the labor needed to make a workable design were all donated, Kelley said.

He and the fire department did not patent the design and said anyone who wants to take a look at the equipment is welcome to copy it for their fire and rescue departments.

"We're not interested in making money from this,"

Kelley said. "If it saves lives, that's what we're all about."

Kelley said anyone who needs that kind of assistance should call the Christian County Sheriff's Office at 581-2332 or 581-3536. "They know how to reach me 24-hours a day," he said.

Perch Jerk 2000




Linda and I and Dale and Judy Willis took the motocastle. Judy

And I thought, how can I be going wrong, I'm looking at a red arrow! Wayne Crosby, from the row in front of me, comes down the hill and I point to the arrow and he turns around and goes back up the hill. We went all the way up the hill and down the trail. We didn't see anymore arrows, so we turned around, went back down the hill and found the side trail. The photographer was jumping up (Continued from page 7)

and down trying to get people to notice the side trail. Crazy.

The first check was at the three mile mark; of course I was late, due to my excursion. It was the beginning of a test section, so I carried those points to the check out at just before the gas available at sixteen miles. The last six miles were at 24 MPH, causing everyone to drop points.

The course itself was excellent, a little dusty in places, but otherwise excellent. The second half of the short course, the speed average dropped to 18 MPH, but trails got me behind, but then things opened up with some washes and roads getting me back on

time. The speed average bumped to 24 MPH for a few miles before a check and a short reset in the middle of the second half of the short course. After the reset, the speed average dropped to 18 mph for nine miles and then a five mile sprint

at 24 to the finish of the short course.

Long course riders had an extended reset back at camp for refueling. The neat thing about this race is the gas available is right across the sand flat from the camp. So, even though I am a short course rider, I got another sixteen miles of trail in by riding to the gas available. It reused the same trail as the beginning of the race. The trail had opened up and was even more fun. The speed average was 18 MPH for the first six miles of the loop and then changed to 24 MPH for the rest of the day.

Most riders got to the reset at the gas available with time to spare. B-Loop riders took off for approximately 13 more miles before calling it a day and A and AA riders rode another 10 miles to end the long course.

Steve Leivan ruled the day, dropping 6 points for the overall win. Steve Vanzant showed that old guys can still go fast by getting second overall, dropping 9 points on his Gas Gas.



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The May OMTRA meeting was held at Buckinghams on South Campbell. Attendance was slim, less than 20 members.

Discussion included the upcoming BJEC event to be held at St. Joe State Park.

It was decided to hold the annual Night Ride at Chadwick the last weekend in June.
