Stew-Stras Seasoned Citizens meet Comfort Dog

The March 27th meeting of the Stew-Stras Seasoned Citizens group was held at the Strasburg Community Building with 26 people attending the "Spudfeast". They enjoyed baked potatoes with a wide variety of toppings along with many salads and sweet treats.

Our special guest was Rachel, a Comfort Dog, and all were amazed by the calm relaxed character of this golden retriever. Paul Stranz and Chuck and Rhonda Lowell of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Charleston shared the history of the Lutheran Church Charities program of training these special dogs to comfort people in hospitals or nursing homes and in times of disasters, illness, despair or other stressful situations in life. There are 135 dogs nationwide that are trained to give comfort. The team members from Immanuel had to be approved and undergo specific training to be handlers for the dog. The dogs themselves complete 2000 hours of training. Chuck demonstrated many of the commands Rachel then obeyed; we were impressed by her obedience. When Rachel is "working" she wears a vest that says "Pet Me". This gave many of us a chance to pet her and appreciate the comfort she can offer to people.

Linda Oakley, village clerk, told us of the community events in the month of April. Election Day is April 2nd from 6 am to 7 pm. SCAN is sponsoring a community Clean-Up Day on April 6th. Citizens of Strasburg can bring items they wish to dispose to the dumpsters in the park area. A list will be included in the April sewer bill of the items that cannot be accepted. 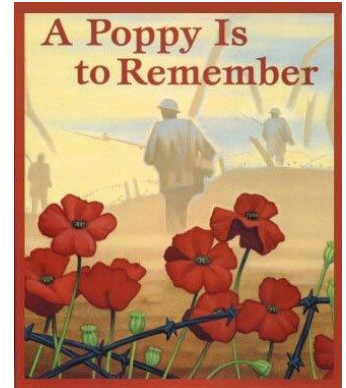

BRIEF STORY OF THE POPPY/POPPY DAY SCHEDULED

The Poppy was first chosen as The American Legion's memorial flower at the 1921 National Convention and was worn in memory of the men who lost their lives in World War I.

The one bright color on the shell torn fields and hills of these war-torn areas was the little red Poppy. On the edges of the trenches, in the ragged shell holes, brave little Poppies grew and bloomed on the graves of those men buried in the sacred plots of French soil, which was Flanders Field. Remembrances of the cheery bright red flowers returned to America with our boys. And so, the Poppy became the symbol of the dead, their memorial flower. It became the sign that the high ideals for which these brave young men gave their lives, still live, and are honored.



All money taken in over expenses is returned to the Veterans and their families through the Auxiliary's program. Each year millions of Americans wear little red poppies in memory of those who have died in all wars and to assist in the rehabilitation of those Veterans who are now hospitalized suffering from wounds and illness. They are distributed by unpaid volunteers on Poppy Day. Please remember by wearing a Poppy!

Friday evening, May 24th and Saturday, May 25th.

Volunteers will be located at the bank, post office and Marathon Station. Proceeds from Poppy Day have been used for the Honor Flight, Mattoon VA Outpatient Clinic, and Illiana VA (Danville).

Village of Strasburg mentioned in Policy Profiles February 2019 issue, published by Center for Governmental Studies at Northern Illinois University

The Village of Strasburg was recently honored in a speech given by Lt. Governor Juliana Stratton at the IIRA Rural Economic Development Conference in Springfield. The source of the words of praise were taken from a publication written by Dr. Norm Waltzer, senior research scholar at Northern Illinois University Center for Governmental Studies. The Policy Profiles report from February 2019 suggested ways that small rural communities can stem their population losses and improve their community's finances and lifestyle.

Lt. Gov. Stratton cited Strasburg's initiatives of gaining consensus, engaging volunteers, and celebrating successes. Gary Kull of Strasburg was a contributing author for the February report.

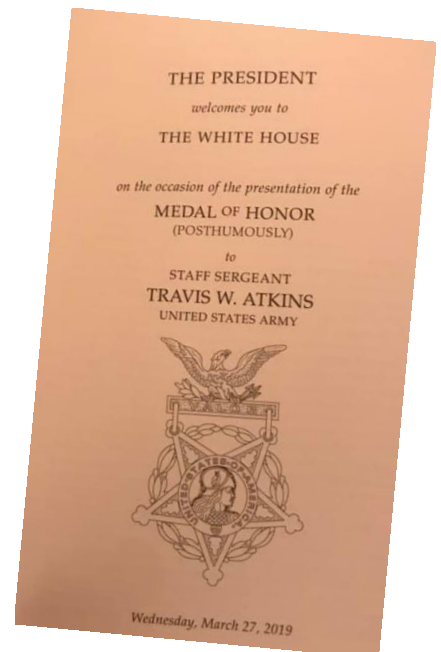

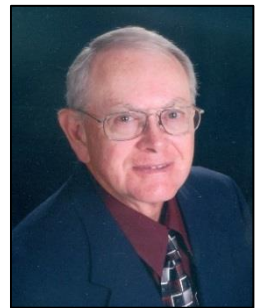
