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MAYOR	Discussion occurred regarding movies in the park. Trustee Howard will contact someone from the school to talk about collaboration between the School and the Village. Proposed dates would be Saturdays during the summer. 	Trustee Howard thanked James Schuler for organizing the unity festi- val. She thanked the police for being there.
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TIME FOR THE PUBLIC	Doug Forgue of 121 Trout Run expressed his concerns about the signs being taken down for the Historical Society, Library and Clock Muse- um and visitors not knowing that they are there. The Village Board said they were taken due to reduce sign clutter and the use of today's tech- nology people can use to locate those buildings.
	Christine Shove of Phelps Street, Lyons; Shannon Davenport of Silver- hill Road, Newark; Anne Meyers of Trout Run, Newark; brought up their concerns over teenagers that attacked Shannon Davenport's son. Officer in Charge Jim Thomson gave an update that the investigation is ongoing. There has been an arrest made. He stressed that community involvement was needed. Casey Carpenter suggested that police reform meetings resume as they have been waiting for the appointment of a new police chief. These meetings are open to the public. Joe Edwards suggested a more powerful camera with night vision that is put on top of the municipal building.
	Chris Avery of 116 Church Street, Newark asked for an update about the NY Main Street Grant, Mayor Taylor said they just contracted with LaBella to take of the LPA of the project as the prior LPA stepped down.
	Toni Avery of 116 Church Street, Newark expressed concerns about the relevy of their tenant's water/sewer bills onto their taxes. She dis- cussed that there was not enough time and notice given to both her and her tenants. They also inquired about water shut offs which would have prevented water/sewer bills from increasing. They requested that their tenant water/sewer bills be put back on their accounts so they had time to apply for assistance or pay for it themselves. They also requested that water shut offs be reinstated. Attorney Art Williams said he would look into the updated regulations.
