

St. Thomas Aquinas

- "He was a philosopher, scientist, mystic, theologian, scriptural commentator, and, in all things, a saint." (Barron, II)
- "For many, Thomas Aquinas, whose writings are dry, recondite, often impenetrable, seems an unlikely candidate for the title of spiritual guide." (Barron, 12)
- Patron Saint of students and universities



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Thomas Aquinas

"Aquinas was a saint deeply in love with Jesus Christ." (Barron, 11)





Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Thomas Aguinas - Biography

- "Thomas was born in either 1225-1226 in the family castle at Roccasecca near the town of Aquino, situated between Rome and Naples." (Barron, 14)
- Dad Landulf, minor nobleman (Barron, 14)
- Mom Theodora (descended from Morna and Neapolitain gentry) (Barron, 14)
- Family involved in politics of day (Barron, I4)



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Thomas Aquinas – Biography (cont'd)

- Sent by family to Benedictine Abbey of Monte Cassino with <u>hope to become abbot</u> (Barron, 14)
 - There he learned <u>contemplative life</u> and <u>fell in love</u> <u>with Scripture</u> before leaving after nine years (Barron, 14)
- Studied philosophy in Naples (Barron, 15) and learned Aristotle
- Took to Dominican (mendicant) life (Barron, 16)
- "In becoming a Dominican, Thomas allowed himself to be swept up in the elan of this exciting movement, this back-tobasics evangelicalism." (Barron, 16)
- Family did not approve of him becoming Dominican, kidnapped him (Barron, 17)



St. Thomas Aquinas – Biography (cont'd)

- Sent by Dominicans to study in Paris and studied under St. Albert the Great (Barron, 18)
- "As a magister of theology, his purpose is never simply to satisfy the curiosity of the mind; rather, it is to change the lives of his readers, to transform their hearts, in a word, to move them to salvation." (Barron, 19)
- "The third and final responsibility of the magister was to raise and resolve those thorny questions that emerged from biblical commentary." (Barron, 20)

--> form of Aquinas' Summa Theologiae



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Thomas Aquinas – Worldly Influences

"One of the most significant blocks to appreciating Thomas as a spiritual master is simply the fact that we do not share some of his basic assumptions about the role and purpose of theology. Many commentators - including the Protestant Paul Tillich and the Catholic Hans Urs von Balthasar - have remarked that a great and problematic shift occurred around the year 1300. At that time, theology came to be seen as a formal university discipline and was distinguished from what we might today call spirituality" (Barron, 12).



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Thomas Aquinas – Worldly Influences "Their theology was not abstract speculation for its own sake; on the contrary, it was a sort of spiritual direction, an attempt to draw people into the imitation of Jesus Christ...Instead, they were writing, first and foremost, as pastors, passionately interested in the salvation of souls." (Barron, 13).



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Thomas Aquinas – Writings

"Though he differs with Augustine and the other Fathers on certain issues, Thomas Aquinas stands firmly in the patristic tradition that I have just described. As he says in the very first article of the Summa Theologiae, the entire purpose of theology is to raise believers outside of and beyond themselves to a union with the God who cannot fully be grasped." (Barron, 13)



St. Thomas Aquinas - Writings

- "Aquinas is fond of quoting the patristic adage that God became human that humans might become God." (Barron, 27)
 - There is a prayer spoken silently by the priest when water is poured into the wine at the offertory:

"By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity."

St. Luke the Evangelist - Biography

- "We" language in Acts 16:11-16, 20:5-16, 21:1-17, 27:1-28:16 suggests Luke accompanied Paul on some of his journeys (Harrington, 3)
- Paul's Letters (Harrington, 3)
 - · Identify a man named "Luke"
 - "Fellow worker" Philemon 24
 - "beloved physician" Colossians 4:14
 - Patron saint of physicians
 - "Luke is the only one with me" 2 Timothy 4:11



St. Luke the Evangelist - Biography

"The Evangelist whom we call Luke <u>knew the Greek language</u> very well and was capable of writing in various literary styles. While <u>probably a non-Jew</u> (a Gentile) by birth, the <u>author of Luke-Acts</u> certainly knew a great deal about the Jewish Scriptures, may have been a "God fearer" (a Gentile associate member of a Jewish synagogue), became a Christian perhaps under Paul's influence, and believe that the Jewish Scriptures were being fulfilled in Jesus and the early Christian Movement." (Harrington, 5)

St. Luke the Evangelist - Worldly Influences

- · Relationship of Romans and Jews
- Conflict between Jews and "Christians"
 - Name "Christian" not used until Acts 11:26



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Luke the Evangelist -How Little We Know

- Remember from Part I, "CCC 487 "What the Catholic faith believes about Mary is based on what it believes about Christ, and what it teaches about Mary illumines in turn its faith in Christ."
- In reflecting on how little we know about Luke, I offer that it's okay not to know much about a particular saint's biography. The point is to know Jesus.



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Luke the Evangelist - Writings

• The author of Luke's Gospel never identifies himself by name (Harrington, 3). Tradition identifies Luke as the writer of the gospel and Acts of the Apostles



St. Luke the Evangelist – Writings

- What is Luke's purpose?
 - Luke 1:1-4 "Since many have undertaken to compile
 a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled
 among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses from
 the beginning and ministers of the word have handed
 them down to us, I too have decided, after
 investigating everything accurately anew, to write
 it down in an orderly sequence for you, most
 excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the
 certainty of the teachings you have received."



Our Saints and Intercessors, Part III

St. Luke the Evangelist – Writings

- Luke wrote to share the gospel
 - Hence he is called the Evangelist
 - We are called to share the gospel, we are called to be evangelists in our own way.
 - How calling our parish, "St. Luke the Evangelist," should relate to our parish identity

St. Luke the Evangelist - Writings

- Luke writes from perspective of 3 phases of Salvation History (Harrington, 9)
 - From Adam to John the Baptist
 - Jesus (portrays him in world history and genealogy of lesus Luke 3:23-28)
 - Post-Ascension (age of the Holy Spirit/Church)

St. Luke the Evangelist - Writings

Ten themes Harrington pulls from Luke's Gospel (91-101)

- 1. Salvation History
- 2. Jesus the Prophet
- 3. The Twelve Apostles
- 4. Women
- 5. Prayer
- 6. Rich and Poor
- 7. Banquet
- 8. Eschatology
- 9. Jerusalem
- 10. Holy Spirit



Other Saints that are part of St. Luke's history

- St. Raphael, Piffard-"God heals"
- St. Maria de Mercede, Cuylerville mercy
- Assumption, Mt. Morris
- Holy Name, Groveland Station Philippians 2:5-11
- Chapel of Divine Compassion, Sonyea love thy neighbor (Craig Development Center)
