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DALLOY HOSTS

40,000 VISITORS

The Sacramento River Delta Historical Society celebrated the 40,000th visitor to the Dai Loy Museum in Locke on Saturday, September 27, 1980. Tena Gallagher of Brentwood, along with her infant son Karl, were recorded as representing this significant milestone in the museum's history. She was greeted by attendants, Robert Carmany and Clarence Pratt and Society president, Judy Merwin. Presentations included a set of the historical booklets published by the SRDHS and two complimentary dinners at Al's Place.

The museum was established in April, 1977, and has been open each Saturday and Sunday from March to November. Attendance has grown to over 11,000 guests per season, and the massum has grown in prominence as a source of information for writers, newspapers, and research students, as well as local and network television. The Dai Loy was given both the Preservation Award by the Conference of California Historical Societies and the Award of Merit for Restoration by the Sacramento County Historical Society.

Ms. Gallagher was both "delighted and overwhelmed" by her surprise honor and thoroughly enjoyed her tour of the restored gambling hall and the many displays, pictures, and artifacts from the Chinese heritage of the delta.

SENATOR SPEAKS

State Senator John Garamendi spoke at the September meeting of the Sacramento River Delta Historical Society to update members on the progress of projects being carried out by the state in relation to the historic town of Locke. The California State Park and Recreation Commission authorized the purchase of the site ground and two buildings—the Star Theater and the original hotel structure which pre-dates the founding of the Chinese community. The senator urged members to follow the progress of appropriation bills and to offer in-put at planning meetings.

MEETING NOTES

David Abrams brought a fascinating look at Old Sacramento to the September 15th meeting of the Society in Isleton. With slides and artifacts from on site explorations he detailed the work done by teams seeking to reconstruct the images of people and styles of pioneer Sacramento. Mr. Abrams gave an overview of his field of Historical Archaeology and the projects carried out by his classes at Cosumnes River College. Members were invited to join the excavation sessions which are held each Saturday.

Within the business meeting President Judy Merwin announced that preparations for the annual dinner are now under way. Invitations will again be sent for the mid-January affair. In a report from the Dai Loy museum it was noted that the attendance figures indicate that the exhibits continue to be of much interest to tourists and local residents alike. The three historical pamphlets now available are being well received. A number of new projects are being considered by the board and will be outlined shortly. Memberships are due to be renewed in February; pre-payment will reduce postage for notices. Both new and removal dues are welcome, and memorial gifts may be made to Treasurer Jennie Sheehan.

DID YOU KNOW ?

In light of the current emergency status on some islands and levees in the area, it is interesting to note that history records other instances of breaks and flooding in the Delta.

FROM: The Flood Engineers! Report—Night of March 21, 1907: Several breaks in levees on east side of Sacramento River between Clarksburg and Courtland, allowing water from Sacramento River to flow into Mokelumne River, thence into the San Joaquin River.

March 23, 1907: Ryer, Tyler, Brannan, Andrus, Boyldin Islands, Lisbon District have flooded—65,000 acres. Only islands not flooded are Districts 7h4, 545, Merritt, Grand, Randall, Locke, Sutter, Sherman, and North Union Island.
