
Club Meeting Silent Action Information:

Last month was the annual Rockhound Retreat at Hancock field station in central Oregon. We had 5 members from our club participate this year. Jerry and Chris Sorenson, Wayne Larson, Bert Ke Je, and myself. The retreat is a fantastic experience for any rockhound. There are classes all day to learn various things and you get to meet new people from all over the northwest and make new rock friends. I also enjoy the walking trails around the station. It is the first week of September. When you arrive, you will be assigned a cabin where you stay with other rockhounders, unless you bring a RV but there are limited spaces. They feed you three meals a day and all the classes you can take. It's a great vacation for the price! Many people take one or two classes. I like to try new things and since I have been there before I took several classes. My classes were:

Lapidary, where I made cabochons.

Carving, where I made a small relief carving in alabaster.

Triplets, where I learned how to glue and work the stone to make a cabochon out of three slices of stone. Metal working where I did some metal etching to make a necklace and we used a rolling mill to make a bracelet in copper Also Wire wrapping and wire weaving.





Minutes – Junior Club Meeting, September 13, 2022

On October 11th there were several juniors in attendance: Echo, Aria, Jessy, Arthur, Ryan, Lilly, Calvin, Aly, Juni, Tate, Linus, Vivi, Davian, Ezra, Martin, Cinda

Several new members joined and learned a little about geologic time. Trilobites were shown and the way they were fossilized was described. Several specimens were shown to everyone. Some Utah trilobites from the Cambrian were shown as well as ones from other locations.

We worked together to create a geologic time scale, learned about what type of animal trilobites were, and took home materials to make trilobite masks. If any kids come trick-or-treating to your house dressed as a trilobite, they may be in the club! Juniors showed off some of the trilobites and other fossils they have collected, took home some homemade trilobite cookies, and pieces of petrified wood (perfect for Halloween!) Junior Rock Reports

Jessy wrote about an ammonite he obtained They are found sometimes in large water beds that are dry. They died 66 million years agao. They first appeared 450 million years ago.

Mineral of the month: Hematite by Davian

Hematite gets its red color from iron. It is one of the most abundant minerals on earths surface. It is an iron oxide with a chemical composition of Fe2O3. It is a common rock forming mineral found in sedimentary metamorphic and igneous rock formations throughout the world.

Mineral of the month: Prehnite by Juni

Prehnite forms in the veins and cavities of volcanic rock. Prehnite has a hardness of 6. Prehnite can lose it's color over time when exposed to light and air. It is the first mineral named after a Persian, Dutch mineralogist colonel Henduck Von Freun.

Poppy Jasper (by **Martin)** is also called Morgan Hill which all depends on who or were it was found at. The Original Poppy Jasper was found in 1935 near the city of Morgan Hill, in the county of Santa Clara on the back side of El Toro Mountain of Northern California. There are 4 different locations in this area, but 3 of them are on private property and the other is on State Park, which you are not able to dig on either places. Sometimes the owners of the private property will bring some Poppy Jasper out to sell. Also, near this area is Guadulupe Poppy Jasper.

Poppy Jasper got its name because of the orbicular dots (Orbs or Sphere shape) of color that reminds you of Poppy flowers. The orbs come's in the colors of Red, White, Yellow, Pink which is from Mexico, Orange, Brown and Black which all depends of the location of where the Poppy Jasper is found at. Similar patterns and colors are found in these countries like India, Russia, Egypt, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Uruguay, Madagascar and Kazakhstan.

This jasper is brecciated which means sun-dried and oxidized iron rich clay plus, filled in with other stuff. It's also a part of the chalcedony/quartz group. The hardness is 6.5-7 on the Mohs scale.





November Program "Rocking With the Stars" Annual Project of the Year Awards

Let's finally get together and share the year's rocks, projects, triumphs and tales with fellow club members. The more members that participate, the merrier the evening.

Time Period: Your entries must have been purchased, found or made between November 1, 2021 and October 31, 2022.

Remember: Only one entry per category per member. A member may enter one item in each category.

Category 1 - Best Color: This award is for the best or most appealing color in a rock or specimen – either rough or finished. You need to have dug it or found it yourself.

Category 2- Most Unique Rock: Do you have a rock with a story to tell? Can you see a picture in it, or does the shape remind you of something? Bring your unique piece and let us know what you see.

Category 3 - Best Fossil: Your fossil can be either found by you or purchased, and can be rough or in a finished presentation.

Category 4 - Jewelry: This category includes jewelry made using wire wrap, chain maile, torch on metal, lost wax or sand casting, Viking weave, or bead weave. It can be a pendant, ring, belt buckle, brooch, earrings or bracelet.

Category 5 - Faceter of the Year: Bring your bling and treat us to the sight of the best gemstone of the year that you have personally cut. The gemstone can be in a setting.

Category 6 - Cabochon of the Year: Show us your talent by entering the best-looking cab (intarsia and doublet or triplet included) that you personally cut and polished. This cab **should not be set** into a mounting so the judges can see your technique on the edges and back. **If your cabochon has been set, then it needs to be entered into category 4**

Category 7 - Silverpicker of the Year: Bring something (cab, stone, carving, rock, jewelry, etc.) that you have purchased at a rock show, rock shop, yard sale or from a hobbyist that will impress us.

Category 8 – Best Find: The best personal find of the year while out rock hunting. It can be a mineral specimen, gemstone or rock – either rough or finished. You need to have dug it or found it yourself.

Category 9 - Project of the Year: Show us your flair and skill by entering something that you have made between 11/1/2021 and 10/31/2022, and incorporates rock in some manner. It can be a sphere, bookends, a gem tree, a carving, an educational exhibit, or ??
