

Prepare for the 40 days of Lent:

Fasting & Abstinence

What are the actual rules/requirements and the meaning behind it?!

What are the minimum fasting rules for Catholics during Lent?

Catholics are required to do two things during the Lenten season: fast on two particular days (**Ash Wednesday and Good Friday**) and to be abstinent from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during the Lenten Season.

First of all, during each of the two days where Catholics are asked to fast, this has specific minimum requirements: the fasting requirement only applies to Catholics that are between the ages of 18 and 59. On the other hand, if someone has any health conditions or illnesses that could endanger health, then these requirements are automatically lifted or dispensed for those situations. When it comes to age, if someone is 17 or 61 or close in age to that required age for fasting, it is still obviously a good thing to try to fast if they are healthy and able to fast in this way.

Overall, the rules for fasting are as follows:

- (a) Only required on two days during the Lenten season Ash Wednesday (March 5th) and Good Friday (April 18th)
- (b) no red meat or poultry {fish is ok, but try to make it simple not extravagant},
 - a. technically, this first point refers to abstinence...see below
- (b) you are asked to have only one regular sized meal, and if you need it...
- (c) then you can have 2 snacks, when added together, don't equal the regular sized meal
- (d) there is no limitation on drinks, but please consider drinking only water if possible

What does it mean to be abstinent during Lent?

This is referring explicitly to eating meat, and the rules are very simple. Any Catholic who is 14 years or older, should refrain from eating meat on all Fridays during Lent as well as on Ash Wednesday (and even Holy Saturday if possible).

What is the purpose/meaning behind fasting and abstinence rules?

The entire season of Lent is meant to be a reminder to us of our complete dependence on God for everything good that we possess, and these little sacrifices can remind us of that dependence, keep us growing in self-control and discipline for greater freedom, and help us offer our sacrifices to God as a prayer. Friday is the day that Christ died for our sins, so try to remember His closeness, mercy, and love for you during the day when you are participating in these ancient practices of the church! Next week, I will discuss the big three in general – prayer, fasting, and almsgiving – and hopefully, I will shed some light the meaning of these this Lent!

The Word of God Alive:

Discussing the Readings with your children.

In today's Gospel, Jesus challenges us, as his disciples, to go the extra mile.

What does it mean to go the extra mile?

Going the extra mile is when we do more than what is expected of us, or when we do more than just the bare minimum. When we go the extra mile, it usually makes us happy to know that this extra effort will make someone else happy. We do not do it for our own benefit and we do not expect anything in return.



Instead of saying, "Go the extra mile," Jesus says, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Then he explains that we must

love our enemies, give generously without expecting anything in return, and not seek revenge,

How can we love our enemies?

We show love for our enemies when we resolve disagreements peacefully or when we listen to the other person's point of view. Often when we stop arguing and begin listening, we find out that we share some of the same viewpoints.

Jesus tells us that when someone strikes us on the cheek, we are to offer the other cheek to be slapped as well.

Is Jesus teaching us to let people hit us?

No, he is teaching us not to be violent. Jesus wants us to be peacemakers. When someone is violent or a bully, Jesus



teaches us to respond peacefully. Reacting with violence or seeking revenge is not a peaceful response.
