→ From the Pastor →

Bless the Lord, O my soul. O Lord my God, you are very great. You are clothed with honor and majesty, 10 you make springs gush forth in the valleys; they flow between the hills, 11 giving drink to every wild animal; the wild asses quench their thirst. 12 By the streams the birds of the air have their habitation; they sing among the branches. 13 From your lofty abode you water the mountains; the earth is satisfied with the fruit of your work. 14 You cause the grass to grow for the cattle and plants for people to cultivate, to bring forth food from the earth. 19 You have made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting. You make darkness, and it is night, when all the animals of the forest come creeping out. 21 The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God. 22 When the sun rises, they withdraw and lie down in their dens. 23 People go out to their work and to their labor until the evening. Psalm 104: 1, 10-14, 19-23



What does it mean to be weak? It depends in who is doing the defining, and what comparison is being made. If you are an ordinary person, even an ordinary athlete, and comparing yourself to an Olympic star, you may think you are weak because you have not accomplished the same thing. Is that necessarily true? No. If you had the same opportunities as the Olympic athletes, to train over many years, to the exclusion of everything else, you might be in the same position. But, would have wanted to have given up everything else in your life to achieve that goal? Maybe not. Does that make you weak? Of course not.

Paul talks about a thorn in his flesh in this passage. It was never defined any more clearly than that. It troubled him; because he felt he couldn't do his best with it nagging at him. The answer he received from God was that through his weakness, God was made stronger.

We all have weaknesses. We are human, we are not perfect. Perhaps our weaknesses are physical. As we age, we can no longer perform the same tasks we could when we were younger. Our bodies just don't work as well as they did. We may not have the dexterity we once had, or the endurance. These limitations may make us think we are weak. We are not. We are simply aging. It is a process that cannot be halted. We will not get any younger, only older. We can accept the process, or fight it. Neither option will change what is. Aging is just simply a fact of living.

But, in that aging can come wisdom. We can learn from our experiences, all our experiences. We can ask God to help us learn from them, and to show us that His strength is made perfect in our weaknesses. We can turn to Him and listen as He reveals his strength. One of the opportunities we have in our aging is (perhaps) more time to just be...to sit and listen to God's voice. What an opportunity to grow closer to God!




