## YOUR ADDRESS AND 9-1-1

The Borough recently received a letter from the Berks County Department of Emergency Services regarding new addressing standards put out by NENA (National Emergency Numbering Association) and the United States Postal Service. The letter indicated that some addresses may need to be changed in order to comply with the standards to implement NextGen 9-1-1 services.

While most addresses in the borough will remain unchanged, there will be a few that may need to be changed to comply with the new standards. The Borough realizes this will be a hardship, but keep in mind that the change will allow emergency services to find your house in a timely fashion. Please be aware that in the event of a medical emergency minutes matter, in a house fire the fire doubles in size every minute.

On the topic of addresses, please be sure yours is marked clearly on your house in numbers at least 4 inches high and preferably a reflective material. If your house number is clearly visible from the street it will be easier for responders to find your house in an emergency. It will also allow passersby to give a good address to 9-1-1 call takers if an emergency occurs on or near your property.

## PLAYGROUND SUMMER SEASON JUNE 18<sup>th</sup> - AUGUST 10<sup>th</sup>

The Borough staffs the municipal playground, located at 3500 Jacksonwald Avenue, 8 weeks during the summer. Staffed hours are Monday through Friday from 9:00 AM to Noon and 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM. The Playground is closed on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. **Please be advised that children are free to leave the playground at any time (No sign in or sign out).** We require that children 6 years of age and younger have a babysitter (at least 16 years old) or adult present to monitor their activity.

There are no charges to attend the summer program, though some specialty arts & crafts projects may have an additional cost of 50¢ to \$2.00 and will be posted at the playground.

If you are new to the neighborhood, the playground offers a mixture of sports activities: tennis, basketball, bombardment,

## SO YOU WANT TO HAVE A SWIMMING POOL AND IT IS DEEPER THAN 24 INCHES!

### Here are the facts! (including inflatable pools)

Installing a swimming pools requires two separate approvals in the Borough. First, you must get zoning approval. The zoning approval process determines if the pool will comply with the regulations for the particular zoning district of your property, a determination is made on impervious coverage, placement and open space. The second approval is a UCC Building/ Electrical Permit, **required by Pennsylvania State Law**. Any pool greater than 24-inches deep must meet safety requirements. **All pools** must be fenced on all sides with a structure at least 48-inches high.

For above ground pools - the sides of the pool, if 48 inches, may be considered the fence. A removable or locking ladder is

# Lyme Disease

Lyme disease is caused by bacteria called *Borrelia burgdorferi* and is transmitted to humans through the bite of infected blacklegged ticks. Typical symptoms include fever, headache, fatigue, and a characteristic skin rash called erythema migrans. If left untreated, infection can spread to joints, the heart, and the nervous system. Most cases of Lyme disease can be treated successfully with a few weeks of antibiotics. Steps to prevent Lyme disease include using insect repellent, removing ticks promptly, applying pesticides, and reducing tick habitat.

## How ticks spread Lyme disease

Lyme disease bacteria, *Borrelia burgdorferi*, are spread through the bite of infected ticks. The blacklegged tick (or deer tick, *Ixodes scapularis*) spreads the disease in the northeastern, mid-Atlantic, and north-central United States. These ticks are usually found in wooded areas and have complex life cycles. In some regions, blacklegged ticks can spread other diseases in addition to Lyme disease. In general, ticks need to be attached for 36 to 48 hours before they can transmit Lyme disease bacteria.

Most humans are infected through the bites of immature ticks called nymphs. Nymphs are tiny (less than 2 mm) and difficult to see; they feed during the spring and summer months. Adult ticks can also transmit Lyme disease bacteria, but they are much larger and may be more likely to be discovered and removed before they have had time to transmit the bacteria. Ticks crawl onto animals or people as they brush against them; ticks cannot jump or fly. Ticks found on the scalp usually have crawled there from lower parts of the body. Ticks obtain blood by inserting their mouth parts (not their whole bodies) into the skin of a person or animal. As ticks feed, their bodies slowly enlarge. The risk of exposure to ticks is greatest in the woods and in the edge area between lawns and woods; however, ticks can also be carried by animals onto lawns and gardens and into houses by pets. Campers, hikers, outdoor workers, and others may be exposed to infected ticks in wooded, brushy, and grassy places. People who spend time in heavily wooded areas where infected ticks are common are at higher risk for exposure.

## What you can do to protect yourself

You can decrease the chances of being bitten by a tick with a few precautions. **Avoid tick-infested areas.** This is especially important in May, June, and July. If you are in tick-infested areas, walk in the center of trails to avoid contact with overgrown grass, brush, and leaf litter at trail edges. **Use insect repellent.** Spray repellent containing a 20% concentration of DEET on clothes and on exposed skin. You can also treat clothes (especially pants, socks, and shoes) with permethrin, which kills ticks on contact, or buy clothes that are pre-treated. Permethrin can also be used on tents and some camping gear. Do not use permethrin directly on skin. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions when applying repellent.

Recognize the signs and symptoms of Lyme disease and act quickly. The early diagnosis and proper treatment of Lyme disease are important strategies to avoid the costs and complications of late-stage illness. As soon as you notice a characteristic rash or other possible symptoms, consult your health care provider.

**Early Lyme disease:** The early stage of Lyme disease is usually marked by one or more of the following signs and symptoms:

- a characteristic skin rash, called erythema migrans
- fatigue
- chills and fever
- headache
- muscle and joint pain
- swollen lymph nodes

Erythema migrans is a red circular rash that often appears at the site of the tick bite, usually within 3 to 14 days after the bite of an infected tick. The rash then grows larger. Sometimes many rashes appear, varying in shapes and sizes. Common sites are the thighs, groin, trunk, and armpits. The center of the rash may clear as it enlarges, resulting in a "bull's-eye" appearance. The rash may be warm, but it usually is not painful. Not all rashes that occur at the site of a tick bite are due to Lyme disease, however. An allergic reaction to tick saliva can also occur and be confused with the "bull's-eye" rash of Lyme disease. Allergic reactions to tick saliva usually appear within hours to a few days after the tick bite, usually do not expand, and disappear within a few days.

**Late Lyme disease:** Some signs and symptoms of Lyme disease may not appear until weeks or months after a tick bite: • Arthritis is most likely to appear as brief bouts of pain and swelling, usually in one or more large joints, especially the knees. Erythema migrans (bull's eye) rash. • Nervous system symptoms can include numbness, pain, nerve paralysis (often of the facial muscles, usually on one side), and meningitis (fever, stiff neck, and severe headache). • Rarely, irregularities of the heart rhythm may occur. • Problems with memory or concentration, fatigue, headache, and sleep disturbances sometimes persist after treatment. Different people exhibit different signs and symptoms of Lyme disease. Some people never develop a bull's-eye rash. Some people only develop arthritis, and for others nervous system problems are the only symptom of Lyme disease. Many of the symptoms of Lyme disease are similar to those of other diseases. The fever, muscle aches, and fatigue of Lyme disease can be mistaken for viral infections, such as influenza or infectious mononucleosis. Joint pain can be mistaken for other types of arthritis, such as juvenile rheumatoid arthritis, and neurologic signs can mimic those caused by other conditions, such as multiple sclerosis. Other infections, arthritis, or neurologic diseases can also be misdiagnosed as Lyme disease.

#### **How Lyme disease is treated**

Several antibiotics are effective for treating Lyme disease. These are usually given by mouth but may be given intravenously in more severe cases. Patients treated with antibiotics in the early stages of the infection usually recover rapidly and completely. Most patients who are treated in later stages of the disease also respond well to antibiotics. A few patients may have persistent or recurrent symptoms and may require an additional course of antibiotic treatment. Longer courses of antibiotics have not been shown to be beneficial in patients who have been previously treated and have chronic symptoms. Varying degrees of permanent damage to joints or the nervous system can develop in patients with late Lyme disease. Typically these are patients in whom Lyme disease was unrecognized in the early stages or for whom the initial treatment was inadequate. Lyme disease is rarely life-threatening.

Registration packets can also be picked up at the playground **All children attending the playground program must be registered.** If your child(ren) are dropped off at the playground, make sure they are picked up in a timely fashion when the playground closes or in inclement weather. To ensure their safety, a leader remains at the playground until all children have left. If it becomes an issue, parents will be contacted. Be aware, the playground buildings don't provide sufficient protection from lightning.

Finally, please make sure that your child is properly attired, especially footwear. Arts and crafts projects include: glue, paint, glitter, markers, etc. Also, you can't play kickball in flip flops or sandals. If you have any questions, please contact the Borough Office.



#### **EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM**

**Changed your cell number?  
Just moved into the Borough?**

The Borough uses the CODE RED EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM to keep residents and interested parties informed about emergency situations (snow emergency, etc.) and general notifications (trash changes, etc.) via telephone calls, emails and text messages.

If you are signed up for CodeRed, please verify that all your contact information is correct. If you have made any changes to you email, cell number and/or landline, it must be changed or removed from the CodeRed system.

If you are new to the Borough please sign up for notifications with CodeRed. Access the CodeRed system through the link on the home page of the Borough website @ [www.stlawboro.com](http://www.stlawboro.com). Any questions, please contact the Boro Office.

If you no longer wish to receive calls, texts or emails and/or are moving out of the Borough, please call the Borough Office and provide all your contact information so we may add it to the DO NOT CONTACT list.

This is the quickest method we have for contacting the Borough residents in Case of Emergency.

**NO APPLIANCES, TV'S, STEREOS, COMPUTERS, ETC. IN THE TRASH**

The municipal trash hauler, J.P. Mascaro, will not pickup any electronic devices (e-waste) with the trash collection. It is illegal to do so in Pennsylvania. You have 24 hours to remove items that the hauler refuses. **DO NOT PLACE E-WASTE ITEMS AT THE CURB FOR COLLECTION**, you will receive a letter from the municipality requiring you to remove the object. If it is not removed you will be charged with littering.

**TRIM YOUR TREES AND SHRUBS**

Please remember to trim your tree branches, overgrown bushes, and any other vegetation that extend over sidewalk s and streets. Overgrowth hinders the passage of pedestrians and/or vehicles. Ord 325 - Nuisance Ordinance.

**FIRE PITS, CHIMINEAS, OUTDOOR FIREPLACES, ETC INFORMATION**

Outdoor open burning (including incinerators, barrels or similar items) is banned in the Borough except for agricultural purposes with a permit issued by the Borough Office.

**Fire pits, fire rings, outdoor fireplaces and chimineas are permitted so long as :**

1. Used in a safe manner
2. Have a SPARK ARRESTOR in place during use.
3. Burn only dry wood.
4. NO TRASH IS BURNED, especially plastics.
5. **DON'T CAUSE A NUISANCE.** Your neighbor doesn't want to smell your fire pit.
6. Before lighting your fire, check weather conditions.

**HAVE A U.S. FLAG THAT NEEDS TO BE RETIRED**

The P.O.S.of A (Patriotic Order Sons of America) Camp #230, which meets in Borough Hall, placed a drop box inside the rear entrance of Borough Hall to receive any U.S. Flag you need to retire. The retired flags are burned during a special ceremony.

required and it must be removed or locked when the pool is not in use. For in-ground pools - all fence gates must be self-closing and self-latching. If a house is used as the fourth side of a fence, all doors leading to the pool area must have an audible warning device if no other gate or door is between the house and the pool.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), "Every day, about ten people die from unintentional drowning. Of these, two are children aged 14 or younger." Children ages 1 to 4 have the highest drowning rates. Among children of this age, most drownings occur in home swimming pools. Drowning is responsible for more deaths among children 1 to 4 than any other cause except for birth defects. Lack of barriers, such as pool fencing, prevent young children from gaining access to the pool area without a caregiver's awareness.

**WANT TO ADD A SHED TO YOUR PROPERTY? THINKING ABOUT ADDING A DECK OR A PATIO? YOU NEED A ZONING PERMIT!**

Whether you are building a new home or just adding a patio, there are guidelines that need to be followed. A plot plan needs to be submitted indicating the dimensions of the property, size of all buildings, accessory structures and impervious surfaces and the distance of structures from the property lines.

Two reviews are performed on a zoning application: one for stormwater and the other for zoning compliance. The State requires that the Borough track the addition of impervious surfaces to a property for determining a threshold of coverage prior to require the implementing of stormwater control solutions. Zoning compliance reviews the submitted information comparing the request to what is permitted in the zoning district in regards to size and location.

The process sounds complicated but it is fairly simple. Contact the Borough office if you have any questions about zoning requirements or help with a zoning application.

- ◆ Please obey the posted speed limits. Also, it is illegal to park against traffic on a public street.
- ◆ All vehicles must have current registration and inspection in order to park on a public street; otherwise they are considered abandoned and are subject to towing and fines.
- ◆ **Going on vacation?** Notify the police department, and the officers will be sure to patrol the area while you are away. Tell your neighbors to report anything suspicious immediately.
- ◆ **SOLICITATION IS PROHIBITED WITHOUT A PERMIT.** If someone knocks on your door trying to sell you anything, ask them if they have a permit. If they don't, send them away and call the police immediately.
- ◆ Keep your car doors locked. Do not leave valuables in your car and make sure items like GPS systems and MP3 players are out of sight.
- ◆ Please keep music and televisions at a volume that will not disturb others.
- ◆ Getting an alarm system - two permits from the Borough are required: one for the installation of the alarm system and another for the operation of the alarm system.
- ◆ **Remember that School's Out - Drive Carefully. Especially watch for children walking to and from the playground.**
- ◆ Some other services provided by the Police Department are fingerprinting, Notary seal services, passport photos, and security services. Inquire at the office.



**KEEP YOUR GRASS CLIPPINGS OUT OF THE STREET**

Please keep your yard waste and grass clippings out of the street, curb and sidewalk areas. During rain events, the clippings and yard waste enter the storm drains system, sometimes they block the storm basins resulting in flooding. The storm drains in the Borough discharge to Antietam Creek. The addition of debris from organic waste adds nutrients to the water speeding growth of plants and algae which reduce oxygen as they decompose leaving less oxygen available for fish and other organisms.

**WASHING YOUR CAR AT HOME?  
DO IT ON YOUR YARD!**

Outdoor car washing causes large amounts of dirt, road grime, oil and heavy metals to enter local waterways. Soapy water flows down the street into the storm drains, eventually to be flushed through the system to Antietam Creek and the Schuylkill River. If you can't use a commercial car wash, wash your care on the lawn or other pervious surface so the wash water can soak into the ground and be filtered out.

**POOPER SCOOP YOUR YARD**

Regularly pooper scoop your yard. It is a violation of Ordinance 399 - International Property Maintenance Code 2009 to allow your yard and property to be kept in an unsanitary condition.

**USE LAWN FERTILIZERS AND  
HERBICIDES SPARINGLY**

Fertilizers add nutrients to Stormwater causing the same issues as grass clippings and yard waste. Herbicides and pesticides contain toxic contaminants that are harmful to aquatic organisms, humans and other animals. Use the minimum amount needed to achieve the desired result and follow the directions precisely.

**ADOPT A STORM DRAIN**

Have you noticed a storm drain clogged with leaves or trash? Have you seen how clogged storm drains can cause street flooding? Your help is needed to prevent the debris from blocking the storm drains or flowing into the Antietam Creek. Please contact Borough Hall if you see a clogged storm drain.

**Spotted Lanternfly Quarantine**

The **Spotted Lanternfly (*Lycorma delicatula*)** is native to China and was first detected in Pennsylvania in September 2014. Spotted lanternfly feeds on a wide range of fruit, ornamental and woody trees, with tree-of-heaven being one of the preferred hosts. Spotted lanternflies are invasive and can be spread long distances by people who move infested material or items containing egg masses. If allowed to spread in the United States, this pest could seriously impact the country's grape, orchard, and logging industries.

You don't want to move any living stage of the Spotted Lanternfly. This includes egg masses, nymphs, and adults. They can be found on: outdoor household articles including recreational vehicles, lawn tractors and mowers, mower decks, grills, grill and furniture covers, tarps, mobile homes, tile, stone, deck boards, mobile fire pits, any associated equipment and trucks or vehicles not stored indoors. Also found on: brush, debris, bark, or yard waste; logs, stumps, or any tree parts; firewood of any species; and landscaping, remodeling or construction waste

What you can do:

- Inspect your trees and plants for signs of this pest, particularly at dusk and at night when the insects tend to gather in large groups on the trunks or stems of plants.
- Inspect trees (in particular, tree of heaven), bricks, stone, and other smooth surfaces for egg masses.

**NOISE ORDINANCE**

Be kind to your neighbors. Your taste in music is not necessarily that of your neighbors. Your music or any other noises, should not cross the property line or occur from 10:00 PM until 7:00 AM, this includes power tools, revving of engines, yelling, shouting, singing, etc.

You are not allowed to operate construction equipment at any time on a SUNDAY or HOLIDAY (which can be heard on neighboring properties.)

**UNIFORM CONSTRUCTION CODE (UCC)  
BUILDING, PLUMBING, ELECTRICAL AND  
MECHANICAL PERMITS REQUIRED FOR WORK -  
PA STATE LAW**

**Building a deck more than 30" off the ground? Rewiring or adding electric circuits? Changing fixtures (sink, toilet, bathtub or shower) in your bathroom? Replacing a roof? Installing an inflatable pool?**

Pennsylvania State law requires that you, if you are doing the work yourself, or your contractor need to obtain a permit **PRIOR** to having any work completed on your property.

Depending upon the type and the complexity of the work you may need to have plans submitted for review and approval prior to having a Permit issued to complete the work.

Permit applications are available online or in the Borough office. Permits are issued by the Borough's Building Code Official - State Inspection Authority Inc.

Additionally, all contractors and sub-contractors working on your property are required to obtain a **BOROUGH TRADE REGISTRATION** from the Borough office.

## How to Eliminate or Control Spotted Lanternfly Adults:

**If you find Spotted Lanternflies in a municipality where they are known to exist, you should try to kill them.**

The most effective way to eliminate these insects is to disrupt their favorite food and hang-out. In late summer and fall, Spotted Lanternflies prefer feeding on *Ailanthus altissima*, commonly known as the "Tree of Heaven." They can be found feeding on other plants and trees, but *Ailanthus altissima* is their favorite host. **If you have *Ailanthus* on your property:** please consider reducing the number of *Ailanthus* trees, then treat remaining "trap trees" with insecticides. This is a longer-lasting solution than simply spraying insects you see.

### **If you want to kill Spotted Lanternflies without controlling *Ailanthus*:**

When there are only a few insects, you can kill spotted lanternflies by swatting or crushing them. For large populations, two kinds of insecticides are widely available that will kill Spotted Lanternfly adults. **Contact insecticides** kill spotted lanternflies when the chemical contacts the insect directly. **Systemic insecticides** are absorbed by the tree and kill insects feeding on it. **ALL** insecticides must be used as directed on the label. Take the time to read the label carefully and follow the directions. This increases your safety, the safety of the environment, and the effectiveness of the insecticide.

Pennsylvania law requires that pesticide labels list the site where a pesticide (such as an insecticide) may be used. In Pennsylvania, insecticide labels do not have to specifically list the targeted insect. There are insecticides labeled for use on ornamental trees and around buildings. These products are legal to use on the sites listed in order to control Spotted Lanternflies in Pennsylvania.

Penn State Extension is currently testing to determine which insecticides are most effective in controlling adult spotted lanternflies. Preliminary results show insecticides with the active ingredients **dinotefuran, imidacloprid, carbaryl, and bifenthrin** are effective at controlling the spotted lanternfly. Neem oil and insecticidal soap provided some control, but results varied, and insects sometimes took several days to die.

Examples listed on the next page are some of the available insecticide products containing the most effective ingredients studied (**dinotefuran, imidacloprid, carbaryl, and bifenthrin**).

The products listed are registered for use in specific settings. Read the pesticide label and follow the directions, including application rates, methods, and appropriate protective clothing and equipment.



## TROUT RUN BRUSH DEPOSITORY

The Trout Run Brush Depository is a joint project of Exeter Township and the Borough and managed by the Township Highway Crew. The facility, located at the intersection of W. Neversink and E. Neversink Rds, accepts and chips brush, also grass clippings and Christmas trees.

The facility is monitored by cameras 24/7 and entry/exit requires an access card to open the gate.. There is a \$10 annual fee for an access card and are available by application at the Exeter Township Municipal Building. There is a limit of one card per household and proof of residency or ownership is required. If Access card is lost or stolen, please notify EXETER TOWNSHIP and the card will be deactivated. To replace a card, the fee is \$10 and the previously issued card will be deactivated.

Landscaping companies doing work on residents' properties are not permitted to use Trout Run. Dumping construction debris or trash of any kind is expressly prohibited and carries a fine of up to \$600 per offense.
