## City Electrical Inspector to Talk

Mr. Patrick Poloskey, Chief Electrical Inspector for the City of San Antonio, will be speaking on the revisions to the city code regarding electrical maintenance work.

As you have all probably heard by now, the City of San Antonio adopted a revision to its Electrical Code in May of 1997. The most important (and costly) provisions to us in the maintenance field are the new requirements for electrical maintenance permits and registration/licensing of personnel. This will have a direct effect on budgets and personnel management. Many of the jobs we have been doing for years will now require licensed personnel. Are you licensed? Do you qualify? What are the requirements? Will you have to contract to change a ballast, motor contactor, etc.? Is your building manager aware of the possibility of increased maintenance costs, licensing and liability?

Mr. Poloskey will be explaining the background of these regulations and the process to meet city code. He is a licensed master electrician with the City of San Antonio, certified as an electrical inspector with the International Conference on Building Officials (ICBO) and certified as a building official with the Council of American Building Officials (CABO).

Don't miss this meeting, and bring your building manager with you!


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## **Above the Ceiling**

## **Staying Ahead of the Game (Continued)**

Last month, we were merely trying to illuminate the terrain in which we are presently deployed. If this sounds like a military statement, it is - get ready for war! A favorite piece of equipment to be examined by the IAQ specialists is the air handling unit; the coils, pans, drains and filter system, to be specific. In one case, everything was cool until the access panel was determined to be caused by our own weight in which during quarterly cleaning, we would crawl into the unit without supporting or bridging the pan; thus our own weight deformed the pan. In this case, the solution was easily conquered. With the help of some cambered angle iron, all thread rod and some hangers, we simply added braces to the unit to support the pan and remedied this. Whether it takes bracing or floating the surface to achieve proper drainage, you must eliminate all standing water!

Now for the coils — if you thought your coils were so clean that you could eat off them, HA! Wait till you read your report! As mentioned last month, washing the coils with city water on a quarterly basis, using coil cleaner annually and using pan guards was not an adequate means of control. What did work, was to spray the coils, pan and drains with a diluted mixture of Clorox (an excellent oxidizing biocide). The second step was to change from a surfactant type oil cleaner (non-acid, non-foaming), to an acid-based coil cleaner. The third step is to coat all surfaces with an anti-microbial spray before closing the unit. Finally,

toss in a new pan guard to be replaced each quarter. Additionally, the anti-microbial filters now available are also an effective defense.

The reasoning behind the madness of using an acid base coil cleaner was that there was a "highly molecular weighted substance" left behind on the coils when the bacteria was destroyed with the Sodium Hypochlorite (Clorox). This supposedly waxy residue could not be removed with a coil cleaner. OK, you leave this type of cleaner on long enough, you will no longer have any coils left, but this waxy residue would still be there? Well! That's what the IAQ specialists will tell you, and they will further reccommend that the coils should be removed or cleaned in place with steam! Go figure. To avoid running a heated/high pressure line through the building and up the stairwells, we opted for the aggressive cleaning with chemicals as opposed to steam cleaning. Yes, the chemicals did a substantial job of eliminating the CFUs and there is no longer a need for the steam cleaning.

The documentation and labor will not be overwhelming in performing this task, however, the costs associated with testing the swab samples which were collected during each step of this procedure can cost as much as \$300.00 per unit.
