- 1. Man has communion with God
- 2. Man lives in a paradise
- 3. Man has access to the tree of life




- Genesis 3-10
 1. The serpent leads Adam and Eve into sin.
- 2. Rebellious angelic beings left their proper domain and produced offspring with women (the nephilim).
- 3. Nimrod, the Hunter, leads all men into rebellion.
- 4. Sin runs rampant.



Genesis 11-Malachi

- 1. God promises Abram the land of Israel
- 2. God promises Abraham that his seed would be
- 3. God establishes King David's dynasty forever.





- Matthew -John
 1. Jesus Christ is both God and man. He is a descendant of King David. 2. Jesus preached the good news of the kingdom of God.
- 3. Jesus Christ is crucified, but rises again. He establishes the church.




Acts- Revelation 7

- 1. Christians are also of the seed of Abraham.
- 2. The Church is a wild branch grafted onto the tree of Israel.
- 3. The Church is the embassy of the kingdom of God.



Revelation 8-20

- The Dragon is the serpent of old.
- 2. Rebellious angels are cast out of heaven.
- The Anti- Christ is the new Nimrod.
- Jesus Christ returns and defeats them.
- 5. Jesus Christ rules the world from Jerusalem for 1000 years.
- 6. Eternal Judgement.



Revelation 21-22

- 1. Man has communion with God again.
- 2. Man lives in a paradise again.
- 3. Man has access to the tree of life again.

This view of salvation history is based upon the RHETORICAL/ NARRATIVE structure of the Bible. The result of this analysis is a chiasm. While it is compatible with it, this view is NOT DISPENSATIONALISM! This view has a pre-millenial eschatology, but it is not tied to a pre-tribulational view of the rapture.
