From the Pastor's Desk...

Just as people are speculating about what the "new normal" in our culture will come to be, many are also speculating about what the Church is going to look like in the future. As you probably expect, a majority of those who weigh in on the question are betting heavily on a digital future for the Church. I don't agree.

The 2020 "me" was fully "onboard" with this train of thought, but the 2021 "me" thinks otherwise. I love that our worship services are broadcast on the internet and can be accessed whenever someone is available to worship. I love that I can record prayer services and Bible classes and upload them to the web so that our members and others can access them. I have every intention of expanding the content that I make available on the web to assist people in connecting with our Lord Jesus, however, going forward digital ministry is not going to remain at the center of my work as a pastor. The pandemic may have forced this focus upon us, but it doesn't signal a permanent change. While I will continue to make usage of every tool for ministry that becomes available to us, this will not become the object of my passion and best efforts.

Why? Because of the incarnational nature of the Church from its inception. I thought that perhaps I should use a complex sentence since I may be sounding to you like a dullard, in a culture that is enamored with the latest technologies. To speak of that which is "incarnational" is to speak of that which has a body or is "embodied." On Christmas, we celebrate our Lord's "Incarnation" which began with his conception by the Holy Spirit in blessed Mary's womb. We worship a God Who is not simply spirit, but is also a body. You are not a body possessing a soul, nor are you a soul possessing a body. Instead, you are both body and soul. Likewise, the Church is not simply an idea but a body.

As you read St. Paul's letters you will notice that he uses the phrase "body of Christ" in three ways: 1. Jesus' physical body, 2. Christ's body as it is truly received in the Lord's Supper, and 3. the Church (Romans 12, 1 Corinthians 12, and Ephesians 1 in particular). As Paul describes the Church as the body of Christ, he is speaking of the assembly, congregation, or community of believers. While I have no qualms acknowledging that community can exist on the internet, the lack of physical proximity of internet gatherings presents a disembodied community. Just as face-to-face communication is rarely inferior to what may be accomplished over the telephone or through email messages, there is a dimension to the physical gathering of the congregation that can never be replaced by gatherings over the ether.

Just as God declared in Genesis 2 that it was not good for the man to be alone, God has chosen to deliver His gifts of salvation through water, bread, and wine which have been joined to His Word in the Holy Sacraments. Can, and does, God save through the Word alone? - Absolutely! And yet, He has given to us for our assurance His Word through water, bread, and wine which can be seen, touched, tasted, smelled, etc.

While many things in our culture may become completely or primarily digital, many things will remain in-person. The ice-skating rinks, water parks, ice-cream shoppes, and other similar venues will remain in-person because what they offer cannot be truly experienced online. In the same way, **the Church is not simply a distributor of religious content, but a community gathered around the Gospel and the Sacraments.** In fact, as more and more American workers transition permanently to remote workspaces and other in-person social gatherings disappear, the embodied community of the local congregation will not only serve the spiritual needs of those who gather, but will also provide the human need for personal interaction that we all have.

An insistence upon gathering together in worship may perhaps seem outdated in our digital age, but only if one's understanding of worship is limited to consuming content. Worship is more than listening to a message or some songs, it is the gathering of God's people before Him to hear His Word, join their voices together in prayer and praise of Him, and to receive the body and blood of Christ AS the body of Christ. When you are absent from worship, one of the unintended consequences of your absence is that the body of Christ does not receive the Lord's gifts that He provides through you. Your sisters and brothers in Christ need the whole "you." If everything that we have to offer and receive could be accomplished through a mouse and keyboard, God would not have made us bodies. The disembodied church is hollow. The God Who made us body and soul deserves better from His Church and so does His people.
