Keynote Presentation <u>Diane Maroney</u>

Execute Director & Founder, The Imagine Project

Dianne Maroney holds a Masters Degree in Psychiatric/Mental Health Nursing from the University of Colorado Health Science Center. She lives outside of Denver with her husband and has 3 grown children.

From the Imagine Project website:

"Life has knocked me down many times, but it has also taught me how to stand tall."

I grew up in a complicated family plagued with suicide, alcoholism, and very little money. My challenging, sometimes horrific upbringing has helped me discover what it takes to overcome obstacles and move forward.

In 2010 I traveled across the US meeting ordinary people who had also overcome extremely difficult circumstances and found that there are truly amazing, resilient people everywhere. I created a multi-award winning book about them. The book and Imagine format were so powerful I began trying it with children everywhere. I quickly realized that every child has a story—too often a story of a challenging life circumstance that they need help processing and moving forward from. In 2015, after traveling to meet hundreds of children and listening to their stories, The Imagine Project, Inc. was born. My work as a nurse and author has brought me to creating a project that can help hundreds of thousands of kids.

As a 501c3 nonprofit entity, our mission is to give kids the ability to overcome complicated life circumstances by helping them realize they have power to rewrite their own stories. Our nonprofit raises and uses our funds to bring The Imagine Project into schools and other youth organizations at low or no expense. Every child receives an Imagine Journal to keep. Through a 7-step interactive process they are given the opportunity to write about the challenges they face, and then write how they want their stories to unfold. The Imagine Project is now in 17 countries and all 50 states. Watching children and teens transform a once difficult life story into new possibilities is truly remarkable!"

A. Stress-Proof Your School

Stress is making us slow, stupid and miserable and it's time we got serious about getting it under control. It's not enough to just talk about self-care or even encouraging people to "relax" stress-proofing your school requires an intentional plan with a solid support system. Participants in this workshop will identify proactive and responsive techniques for managing stress for themselves and the school community.

C. Social Justice Solutions for School Social Workers

The profession of social work was developed from social reform movements and community organizing. We have an ethical duty to engage in social and political action in order to work alongside our students and families to promote social justice. In this session, participants will:

- 1. be informed about the history and complexities of social workers' involvement in social justice.
- 2. examine current data about social issues and explore how these issues affect our students.
- 3. delve into the legislative process and further understand how a bill becomes a law at the state and national level.
- 4. develop macro strategies to advocate for students and support them in advocating for themselves.
