This museum was founded by zoologist, Dr. Harold S. Colton in 1928 and focuses on preserving the



history and cultures of northern Arizona and the Colorado Plateau. We learned that there are 10 Native American tribes



in this area. The museum gave each tribe final say in how their story would be told with ancient artifacts representing their history, their everyday life and their art. Mickey pointed out the subtle differences between the tribe's jewelry, textile weaving and basket making. We learned that in the Navajo tribe the women were the weavers and jewelry makers and in the Hopi tribe the men took on these traditions. Although the museum is small it is filled with interesting pieces and is highly recommended by all who went. Fun Fact: Dendrochronology which is



the science of tree- ring dating was developed from the work of the astronomer A.E. Douglas, who studied ponderosa pine trees in the Flagstaff and Prescott areas. Now you know.

We headed back to the downtown area for lunch on the patio at Fat Olives - a true Italian wood fired pizza experience.



They are the first certified VPN (Verace Pizza Neapolitan) Certified restaurant in Northern Arizona and 1 of only 4 in the state making true Neapolitan Pizza. They have even been visited by the infamous Guy Fieri. The owner says they make over 500 lbs. of fresh Mozzarella each week. The dark clouds rolled in and we were greeted by a lovely rain and even cooler weather and we moved inside and enjoyed great company and a yummy lunch.



With the overcast sky, gentle rain and cool weather we all returned to rest and enjoy the afternoon.

Recipe from the Weekend

Slow Cooker Chicken Alfredo

2 Jars Alfredo Sauce
1 Cup Water
2 tsp Garlic, Minced
1 Tbsp Italian Seasoning
1lb Penne Pasta, uncooked
1 - 2lb Cooked Chicken Breast, bite size cubes
16oz Mozzarella Cheese, Shredded
½ Cup Parmesan Cheese, Shredded

- In large bowl combine Alfredo Sauce, Water, Garlic, Seasoning, and uncooked Pasta.
- Spray crockpot with non-stick spray
- Spread 1/2 of sauce/pasta mixture, layer 1/2 of the chicken, cover with 1/2 of the cheeses and repeat.

Cover and cook on high for 2-4 hours until pasta in middle of crockpot is tender. Sprinkle with a little more Italian seasoning before serving.

Safety Reminder

As we get ready for the RV season this fall and winter – a few reminders:

Road Conditions

Truckers have a saying: "There are only two seasons, winter and construction." If you're traveling in an RV, plan on running into construction.

Save time and frustration by checking one of several websites that report road conditions, closures, and construction.

The US DOT Federal Highway

Administration website shows a map of the states. Click on the state you will be traveling in and choose a link that shows current road conditions.

Electrical Load

It's easy to put our electronics and appliances into our RVs and just plug them in. But unlike our homes, RVs are not wired to run them all at once. Most RVs are wired for 30 or 50 amps.

For example, if a toaster is 1650 Watts (14 amps) and an egg cooker is 600 Watts (5 amps), you can't run the 1800 Watt (15 amp) air conditioner when making breakfast in a 30 amp RV.

Campgrounds

Confirm your reservations when you are within a couple hours of your stop. You may be stuck if you arrive after the office closes unless your campground has a 24hour check-in.

Keep a list of nearby <u>campgrounds</u>. It's maddening when reservations get lost. But if the campground is full when you arrive, or if you can't get there due to weather or bad road conditions, you'll be glad you have a list of alternative RV parks on hand.

Call as soon as possible if you are not going to make it to your reservation. Not only is it courteous, but you might prevent a night's camping from being charged to your card.
