

¹⁵ The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. ¹⁶ This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." ¹⁷ Then the Lord replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. ¹⁸ I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. ¹⁹ Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. ²⁰ But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die."

Mark 1:21-28 Rosemary Dawson

²¹ They went to Capernaum; and when the Sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. ²² They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. ²³ Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, ²⁴ and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God". ²⁵ But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him." ²⁶ And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. ²⁷ They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." ²⁸ At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

This form must be signed and notarized. Your license and registration, please. Wear a mask, wash your hands, keep 6 feet apart. These are all the words of authority. From parents to presidents we live with the realities of authority. Sometimes we may need it and appreciate it. But there are other times when we resist it and resent it. But what we can't do is simply ignore it.

Today in our gospel lesson we are confronted with authority. Jesus comes to the synagogue of Capernaum and is welcomed into the mix of worship and teaching. There's nothing unusual about that. But it soon was to become anything but ordinary. Jesus' message was not the usual boring sermon. Jesus' words were astonishing. They were compelling.

Jesus spoke with certainty and conviction. As Mark describes it "he taught them as one having authority, and not like the scribes". While the teachers of the law did the seminary thing, relying on expert commentaries and theological precedents, Jesus spoke in a different manner... and with a different message. He spoke as someone who knows the truth, regardless of what others may have said. When people heard him they knew that Jesus was speaking the truth.

So what is this teaching that so astonished Jesus' hearers? We don't know. Not a word of Jesus' teaching here at Capernaum was written down for us. We have no clue about what he said that made people sit up and listen. Now that may seem strange, but Mark did not tell us what Jesus said for one very simple reason. He did not want us to get distracted. Mark is not interested in the preaching. Mark wants us to recognize the preacher. Mark highlights in big bold silence that Jesus' authority did not come from what was said but from who he is. Jesus had the authority of God. He had been ordained directly at his baptism when God said "you are my beloved son." Jesus did not speak for God; he spoke as if he was God. And that simply astonished people.

And almost as a proof of his authority, suddenly a crazed man within the synagogue interrupts Jesus' words with a statement of his own. "What have you to do with us, Jesus... I know who you are- the Holy One of God." Immediately Jesus silences this unclean spirit and frees this man. We are tempted to get distracted again and ask all sorts of questions about demon possession. But that is not at all why Mark shares this part of the story. Mark points us once again to the authority of Jesus. The people were even more astonished and wondered "What is this? A new teaching! And with such authority! He commands even unclean spirits, and they obey him."

The simple truth is that as wise and knowledgeable someone may be about Scripture it does not amount to a hill of beans if there is no power behind it. Jesus spoke with authority and Jesus acted with authority. When Jesus cast out this unclean spirit he was demonstrating the power that made his words valid. And as good as Jesus' words were that day, they became great when the people saw the power that stood behind them.

Mark shares this story with us because he wants us to join the crowd; to see who Jesus really is, and to wonder what meaning Jesus has for our lives. Very often we are willing to acknowledge Jesus as a good teacher, a good man who was wise and compassionate. But Mark is saying Jesus is a whole lot more. Jesus is someone to be reckoned with. If the story is true, if the authority of Jesus is real, if he speaks with the voice of God, and acts with the power of God, then what does it mean in my life? How am I to respond? Mark doesn't tell us; he simply lays before us the claims of Christ and the evidence of His authority and then waits to see what we will do.

What will you do? Our world is filled with voices of authority, each bickering for our obedience. Gods, you might say, longing for our devotion. But there is only One in this world who has been acknowledged as the Holy One of God. There is only one who has proclaimed eternal truth. There is only one who has the power to reign. There is only one who has the right to our devotion. And he leaves it for us to decide how we will respond. What will your response be?


