Report on SED President's Conference with Congregational Leaders

On Feb 27, I attended a Zoom Conference with over 100 congregational leaders and Pastors from the SED. The theme was: *The Great Sending: You are Sent to Serve.*

John Denninger led the meeting and reported 37,563 COVID deaths within our District. Most of the conversation was around COVID and how it has exposed underlying conditions within our congregations. Many churches are pivoting to meet the needs, but we must look outward to reach our communities that are in need.

Focus on your strengths and refine what you do best. Many churches received grants (as we did) to begin live streaming. Some reported that while in-person attendance dropped, they were picking up additional views online. One leader noted that his Sunday School had grown significantly since they started putting the classes online. Another person mentioned that they mailed out children's Bibles and SS materials to each student, then did a short blog on that topic via video on Sunday, asking the parents to help with instruction.

Budgets were all over the place. Some, like us, managed to maintain or stay ahead of budget, while others struggled. Also, churches with schools found it hard to keep or find teachers.

Some other items of note: It was predicted that 1/3rd of previous attendees will not return;

- Families with young children were not coming back yet – possibly because their children are too young to follow social distances rules;
- * Many older members are suffering with isolation;
- * Pastors may be struggling as well remember to care for your Pastor.

The District is working on more resources for neighborhood ministry training.

Also, the referendum vote among all LCMS congregations to allow the National Conference to be pushed back 1 year was passed, for which they were thankful. The District Convention is being moved to May of 2022 in the Richmond, VA area.

Meeting of the Voters' Assembly

Immanuel Lutheran Church — Preston, Maryland

February 7, 2121 (postponed from Jan. 31, 2021)

- I. Open in Prayer The meeting was called to order by Ruth Thomas, President. Rev. David Casey-Motley offered prayer.
- II. Voter Sign-in was completed. 28 Voters were in attendance. No new Voters were present.
- III. Approval of Minutes Marsha Kenton moved to approve the minutes of the October 11, 2020 Voters Meeting as written. Rex Rosebrock seconded the motion. The minutes were approved.

IV. Committee reports:

- A. Treasurer Janice Isenberg presented her report. A copy of the written report is attached.
- B. Financial Secretary Dee Lambert presented her report. A copy of the written report is attached.
- C. Pastor Pastor David Casey -Motley presented his report. His written report is attached.
- D. Board of Elders Richard Wheatley reported that the Elders continue to work on COVID-19 procedures. They will be announcing the Holy Week service schedule in March.
- E. Board of Stewardship Lynn Faulstick reported that 40 pledge cards were returned.
- F. Board of Evangelism No report
- G. Trustees Dale Kenton reported as follows on a several issues:
 - a. reviewed the renovations that would be addressed by the proposal to be voted on later in the meeting. Renovations to the Sacristy, including additional shelving and storage; to the Men's and Ladies restrooms in the Undercroft are included. The church would purchase the paint, to include the Geiger Hall upstairs restroom.
 - b. noted that the boiler is 68 years old and reaching it maximum usage. He will be securing proposals for replacement.
 - c. review the issue of the continuing water seepage into the basement undercroft. He will be working with the Town to divert water runoff from the room to the street, rather than downward to the basement.
- H. Board of Education Rene Langwost reported there are between 2 and 10 students in Sunday School. Teachers have a rotating schedule. Sunday School Superintendent Karen Lyons is leading the weekly opening. Donations of individually wrapped snacks for Kids Worship are requested.
- V. Unfinished business

Dembowski Estate update – Ruth Thomas noted that the Estate is now settled, and Immanuel has received \$23,651.76. The amount was lower than previously expected due to the extended process and legal fees.

VI. New Business

The Council moved that the congregation accept a bid for \$10,010 from CE Baynard and Sons to renovate the church downstairs men's and women's restrooms and improve several items in the Sacristy, to be funded through Special Funds. Hugh Smith seconded the motion. After discussion, the motion was approved.

The Council moved that the congregation grant the Treasurer the authority to send an additional \$5,000 from the General Fund to the Southeastern District Office. Rex Rosebrock seconded the motion. The motion was approved. (Later in the meeting it was agreed that the Treasurer should delay sending the money until it

is ascertained if the congregation will be assessed a share of the penalties incurred for moving the date of the District and Synod Conventions. The \$5,000 would then become a part of that payment. See Section D below.)

The Council nominated Ruth Thomas as Lay Delegate to the February 7, 2021 Virtual District Forum (which has been rescheduled for later date.) Richard Wheatley seconded. The nomination was approved.

The Council moved that the congregation vote to approve the moving of the 2021 Synod and District Conventions to 2022, due to virus restriction, and elect Ruth Thomas (Lay delegate) and Pastor David (clergy) to so vote. Lynn Faulstick seconded. During discussion Pastor David noted that the Synod and District would likely incur major financial penalties and some of that could be passed to the congregations. Voting by a show of hands, the motion was approved 17-3.

Glen Plutschak noted that the outside coverings for the stained-glass windows on the Back Landing Road side of the church building have become clouded and unattractive. The Trustee will investigate replacement as cleaning has not solved the problem.

V. Adjournment and close with the Lord's Prayer. Being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

"Therefore, sing."

As we begin March 2021, we are reminded that it is one year since the beginning of the pandemic, which brought about the shut-down of in person church services. And when we returned, it was cautiously with limited congregational singing. While happy to be back in the Lord's house and singing a hymn or two and our liturgy each week, we continue to sing fewer hymns than previously due to virus transmission concerns. In addition, there are considerably fewer voices in the pews. How precious then, is the memory store of hymns and liturgy from past years of bountiful singing!

The hymns and liturgies we sing are a significant way to bring the Word of God to our hearts and minds and imprint it there for retrieval as we need it. Our children need many opportunities to imprint the Word of God in their hearts and minds. Singing the hymns and the liturgy at church and at home are ways for children to begin this process. It is amazing how quickly children pick up the repetitive tones of the liturgy. And in our Sunday School, we have recently begun using a new hymnal called, *One and All Rejoice* (CPH) to help children and youth learn Scripture and praise God through beautiful, age-appropriate song.

Whether you are just beginning your journey in hymns of the church or already have a bountiful store in your heart with our usual patterns disrupted, we need to be intentional about continuing to grow closer to God through singing. Keep on singing the songs wherever you are, and however you can. Singing does not need to be pitch perfect, God knows what is in your heart and invites you to sing.

Did you catch the article in the February Lutheran Witness, *Singing the Word* by Rev. Mark Preus? If not, it's reprinted here. (pp. 6-7) It's a great read on why we sing, the importance of singing and how we can keep on singing (with a special emphasis on singing with children.) Rev. Preus says, "Therefore, sing. You are not singing for fame or the approval of men. You are not singing for money, but to the Lord." He concludes by saying, "Let us hide God's Word in our hearts through psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, so that we might teach each other the truth we need to hear at all times." Amen!

SINGING THE WORD

By Mark Preus



God spoke to Israel through Moses (Deut. 6:6-7), "And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way and when you lie down, and when you rise." Fathers and mothers have a sacred duty first to hear and believe God's Word and second to talk continually of God's Word with our children and wherever we go.

One of the best ways we can commit God's Word to heart and talk about it with our children is through singing. The Holy Spirit teaches us the purpose of singing hymns in Colossians 3:16, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God." How does God's Word dwell in us and among us richly? By singing hymns. And what is the reason for doing this? To teach and admonish each other.

This is the great privilege of the royal priesthood of all believers. St. Peter says that God made us priests and kings so "that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9). To every poor sinner worn down by guilt and the heavy burdens of this earthly life the psalmist sings, "Oh sing to the LORD a new song, for he has done marvelous things!" (Psalm 98:1). God wants us to sing about what He has done. His right arm, His only begotten Son, has won the victory over sin, death, futility, the devil and all things that confuse us, break homes and give us sorrow. The new song is Christ's resurrection from the dead. He died with our sin and rose without it. He has done marvelous things, miraculous things, which we see by faith.

to sing or not to sing

Oh sing to the LORD a new song Psalm 98:1a

Therefore, sing. You are not singing for fame or the approval of men. You are not singing for money, but to the Lord. You sing to rejoice in the Lord. You sing to help you and your children be faithful and thankful. You sing to keep God's Word in your heart and in your home and in your church. Be gone with excuses like, "I don't sing very well." Your almighty Maker, who created your voice, invites you to sing, not lay an embarrassing burden on you, but to take your burdens away and help you take other people's burdens away. He has done marvelous things, and He wants your heart to rest in His work while you take up the sacrifice of praise.

The words matter the most. But music also has this special privilege: God allows it to enter your heart along with His holy Word. The world is filled with bad music, much of it devised to meet a specific taste or express some worldly concern or desire. But the hymns of the church are not so. They are not geared toward any individual's taste. They are written for the purpose of teaching the Word of Christ, so that we might obtain and preserve our faith and the faith of those whom we love.

HYMMS IN THE CHURCH

Burst into jubilant song with music Psalm 98:4b

Pastors, choose hymns carefully. Jesus taught His first pastors to sing hymns so that they could teach others (Mark 14:26). The apostles quote hymns (psalms) to people to teach Jesus. It is the pastor's responsibility to teach good hymns and psalms to Christ's sheep so that they can teach and admonish one another in the home and elsewhere. Find the best singers in your congregations, and encourage them to sing clearly and loudly to guide those who are still too timid to sing. Ask them to sit in places where everyone can hear them. This emboldens others to sing.

Next, form a simple choir to teach simple, good hymns to the congregation. Choose good, simple hymns for the children to learn like "I Am Jesus' Little Lamb" (*LSB* 740) or the first stanza of "Salvation unto Us Has Come" (*LSB* 555). Use the beginning of Sunday school to teach a hymn to the congregation. Choose the same hymn for a

few weeks so that the parents and children learn to sing it together. Teach them just a few stanzas, so that these can be memorized and sing around the family altar.

But most of all, pastors, sing unto the Lord that new song which you need to hear, the song that never gets old. When you are discouraged because you cannot see the fruit of your labor, when your sins rise up to frighten you and they are too much for you, then take up a hymn and be filled with the Holy Spirit by singing God's Word. A good hymn joins soul and body to cast our melancholy better than any drug man has devised. Sing the devil away with hymns like "If Thou But Trust in God to Guide Thee" (*LSB* 750), "O Little Flock, Fear Not the Foe" (*LSB* 666) and "I Will Sing My Maker's Praises" (*LSB* 977) (this hymn can be paired to the tune of "Let Us Ever Walk with Jesus" [*LSB* 685]). Defy your own sadness and fear with the truth that God has preserved for you in hymns that attack doubt, false doctrine and spiritual lethargy. Join the chorus of prophets and apostles and martyrs. You are not alone, and even when you sing alone, your singing will help you teach fathers and mothers to sing at home.

HYMMS IN THE HOME

To you, O LORD, I will sing praise Psalm 104:1b

The only song our culture universally knows is "Happy Birthday." Parents, even if you think you cannot sing, you can sing that one. Is it not a shame that so few Christians sing hymns anymore? You only need courage. Why should you be embarrassed in front of your spouse or children for singing to the Lord the new song or for teaching your children what is good and true and beautiful? You will not get help from this culture, but you will from the Word of God. God says to you, "Sing!" Do not sing some old song that is sung only for worldly reasons. Sing the new song of Christ's Word. Take courage! What do you have to be afraid of?

Christ is Lord over everything—sin, death, shame, hell, devil. He is also Lord over your fear to sing what you know is true and beautiful. Sing in the shower, laugh at yourself if you and your family think it sounds awful. Singing is a joyful thing. And it does not sound awful to God and His holy angels who taught us to sing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace" (Luke 2:14). God hears what faith sings, and so does His church. It is like the picture our 3-year-old child colored that you framed and put on a wall because it is beautiful to you; your child is not embarrassed at all, and neither are you. So it is with singing to the Lord.

Start with simple hymns and parts of the liturgy. Sing "Create in Me a Clean Heart" (*LSB*, pp. 192-93) in the morning at breakfast, or "O Christ, Thou Lamb of God" (*LSB*, p. 198) at dinner. You likely know these simple little tunes well, and when you sing them at home, your children will sing them in church. I have heard a 5-year-old from the back row belting out "We praise Thee, we bless Thee, we worship Thee!" from the Gloria in Excelsis (*LSB*, pp. 187-89). He inspired the grown-ups around him to join. And it was the little children who sang sweet praises to Jesus when He entered into Jerusalem (Matt. 21:16). The Sanctus, "Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Sabaoth ... Hosanna ... blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord" (*LSB*, p.195) is a children's song.

For bedtime prayers, I recommend the hymn "Now Rest beneath Night's Shadow" (*LSB* 880). Choose just one or two stanzas. We often sing stanza 4, "Lord Jesus, since You love me" before bed. At a birthday or after a birth, it is a good Lutheran tradition to sing a stanza or three of "Now Thank We All Our God" (*LSB* 895). Before dinner you can learn to sing either "Feed Thy Children, God Most Holy" (*LSB* 774) or "Be Present at Our Table, Lord" (*LSB* 775). Fill your home with the name of Jesus. Demons with all their sadness, bitterness and temptations to sin flee from the voice of faith singing to the Lord.

Paul and Silas knew hymns by heart and sang them in prison. Let us prepare ourselves for every situation, whether prison or persecution, where we will need God's Word. Let us hide God's Word in our hearts through psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, so that we might teach each other the truth we need to hear at all times.

- 2. Set the egg in a spoon and cover it with the second spoon so the spoons are holding the egg.

- 5. Experiment with sounds by filling other eggs with coins, rice, and so on.
