Jacob Poole Returns from Rafa Nadal Academy

Thank you Mayor Bowser for providing me the opportunity to help a 16 year old see the other side of the world and learn and play tennis. That is what S.A.F.E. represents - education, recreation and cultural enrichment with an emphasis on reducing crime and destructive behavior in the community. We know what works and why!

We truly had a great time! As you can imagine, it was Jacob's first time out of the country and he played some unbelievable tennis in Spain. We spent two days in Barcelona, where he trained and played practice matches.

Then we were off to Mallorca - aka "Rafa Nadal's Island." Rafa is now my all time favorite tennis player mainly because of what he does for young people. His Academy is based on developing young kids ages 4+ to become good people even if they do not become tennis pros.

Jacob played 3 matches, lost 1 then played the No. 2 16 year old of the Academy. He lost the 1st set, then he got some encouraging words such as "all flights are cancelled" which means take your time, slow down, relax. "Rash-Rash" means get all over him like a rash, "1-point at a time" means move your feet/watch the ball. Then the light bulb came on, everything we have ever talked about such as 1st serve/returns, attacking your opponents 2nd serve and consistency came into play. He won the 2nd set and won 11-9 tie breaker.

I can honestly say, I think he has finally figured out making adjustments. It was so refreshing for me to witness. He definitely made us proud!

As a Certified PTR Pro and the PTR State Representative for WDC, with your blessing, the plan is to let everyone know we have a tennis "*Champion*" in the making and he is following in the footsteps of Frances Tiafoe, who has already given Jacob some good advice.

Rafa Nadal Academy did not have WDC on their radar, they considered WDC as being a part of Maryland. That has changed. Thanks for everything!

This is where she learned about Dr. Robert "Whirlwind" Johnson and how he became the benefactor of tennis legends Althea Gibson and Arthur Ashe.

In honor of Dr. Johnson, Gibson and Ashe (all three of whom were inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame), Corinne created a literacy project called the **Whirlwind Reading Challenge.** In two years time, Corinne collaborated with Dr. J's grandson, Mr. Lange Johnson, and raised over

\$4,300 for the Whirlwind Johnson Foundation.

"I was stunned to learn Mr. Lange Johnson passed away. When it came to my reading challenge, he really believed in me and encouraged everything I tried to do for his family and their foundation." This encouragement led to one of the highlights of Corinne's Whirlwind Reading Challenge: her receiving the USTA Mid-Atlantic Serve It Forward! Youth Leader Award.

Tennis at Banneker (T@B), uses volunteers mostly associated with Piney Run Foundation through enhanced offerings sponsored by DC Department of Parks and Recreation. T@B recently completed a spring, summer and fall instructional program teaching and drilling well over 500 tennis lovers in 2021. We were also successful with our 2020 program focused on safety during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. T@B has recruited 15 dedicated volunteers including three PTR certified instructors and four additional PTR instructors in-training.

In 2020 through 2021 Piney Run with DPR established regular weekly Wednesday junior competitions for competitive young players at the South East Tennis and Learning Center. It has become a go-to incubator for the next Frances Tiafoe's in our area. In the future we want to add a life skills mentoring feature to the junior competition program. T@B and Piney Run are also guiding two women's competitive teams which experienced considerable success in 2021.

Active Aces Super Senior Tennis Club (AASSTC) Junior Aces



The Active Aces Super Senior Tennis Club (AASSTC) Junior Aces is a group of under-resourced Washington, DC area youth coached by AASSTC seniors.

The program emphasizes providing youth with quality tennis instruction along with character building activities that are central to the sport of tennis. The club has a 20-year dedicated history of teaching children to play tennis. The program has created opportunities for them to compete in USTA Junior Team Tennis, on high school teams, at the annual ATA tournament and beyond into their adulthood.

Currently, we have 26 youth enrolled in our Winter Session at the Watkins Park Tennis Bubble. Since returning to courts after the difficult pandemic 2020 shutdown period, we had as many as 36 kids return to our program. We were successful in keeping student interest in tennis and in our program through a grant awarded from the USTA Foundation in our capacity as a NJTL member group.

With the grant we were able to provide youth with laptops to set up a virtual learning program to teach tennis and educational lessons. We are building on this success and now are holding three seasonal sessions per year, two indoors at Watkins Park and a Summer Session that is coming up in June at Flowers High School in Prince George's County.
