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HONORARY ALDERWOMAN - PAMELA BALE

On Tuesday 21st January 2020 Pangbourne Parish Council was pleased to be able to help host a special West Berkshire Council Ceremony held in recognition of Pamela Bale's many years of service as District Councillor for Pangbourne.

Pamela had been unable to attend the main ceremony for retiring Councillors across the District which had been held at Newbury. As a result Graham Pask, Chairman of West Berkshire Council, and Alan Law and Rick Jones, Ward Members for Basildon and Tilehurst & Purley respectively, travelled to Pangbourne to present Pamela with her title of Honorary Alderwoman of West Berkshire.

Many local residents who have worked with Pamela over the years were in attendance for the ceremony.

Pamela joined Pangbourne Parish Council in the late 1990s where she served as a Councillor and then Chairman until 2005 when she was elected District Councillor in a 2006 by-election until she retired in April 2019 after 14 years. Pamela was instrumental in creating Pangbourne's Village Plan, the first in West Berkshire. As District Councillor she held the portfolio for Transport and Highways and served a period as Deputy Leader of the Council. Pamela was also a School Governor for three schools in the local area.

The Local Government Act 1972 allows Local Authorities to introduce the title of Honorary Alderwoman within its governance structures. The title of Honorary Alderwoman is bestowed on a Councillor who is deemed to have provided eminent service both to the District Council and also for the work and support they have provided within their local community.

Any former Councillor nominated for this title must have given eminent service to the Council over and above a Councillor's normal duties. In particular they must have become the advocate of and for their communities, effectively representing the interests of their ward and of individual constituents as well as maintained the highest standards of conduct and ethics. For such a title to bestowed on an individual, a resolution must be passed by two thirds of the Members of Council.

We congratulate Pamela Bale on this well deserved award and wish her well in her retirement.

I would like to thank the Parish Council for organising the presentation of this award on 21st January.

I was only expecting to see the Chairman of West Berkshire Council, and two of my ex colleague Councillors – so was surprised – but very pleased – to see local residents and businessmen in the Village Hall.

NINO SET TO RUN LONDON MARATHON FOR SUE RYDER

Local businessman Nino Bartolomei, who owns Nino's Trattoria Italiana in Pangbourne, will be running the London Marathon on Sunday 26 April to raise vital funds for the Sue Ryder Duchess of Kent Hospice in Reading.

Nino, who has no previous running experience, will be taking on the 26.2-mile challenge in memory of his father, who was cared for at the hospice before he passed away in March 2018.

Nino said: "I am extremely proud to be representing Sue Ryder at this year's London Marathon. It will be a huge challenge for me but I passionately want to support the charity so that they can continue to be there for all other families in need, like they were there for us when we needed them. Every penny raised will go directly to support the amazing work they do and I would be grateful for any donations – however big or small."

In 2019 Nino raised over £4,500 for the Sue Ryder Duchess of Kent Hospice through running charitable menu dishes in his restaurant and hosting fundraising coffee mornings.

The Sue Ryder Duchess of Kent Hospice in Reading provides expert care and compassion to people over the age of 18 who are dealing with life-limiting conditions, and offers support to their families. Sue Ryder also operates from two other sites in Berkshire – Sue Ryder Wokingham Day Hospice and Sue Ryder Palliative Care Hub Berkshire – offering Day Services and Hospice at Home for those who prefer to receive care at home.

Last year Sue Ryder Nurses and Duchess of Kent Hospice provided 130,000 hours of support to patients and their families across Berkshire. However, Sue Ryder relies on supporters and their fundraising efforts to continue to provide expert care to the local community, which costs £4.5m per year.

'TALES FROM THE SHACK' BY ROB

(Rob is a volunteer at Beale Wildlife Park who writes a regular blog on the changes in nature around the estate throughout the year.)

Daylight hours are now lengthening and down on the rookery things are happening a pace. Rooks are one of the first birds to start nesting, this usually means spring cleaning last years nests. The older more experienced birds will be in the middle of the rookery giving them every opportunity to steal twigs from nests towards the outside that are occupied by the younger, less experienced birds.

Rooks and crows are quite similar in appearance and easily misidentified leading to inaccuracies in common phrases, a 'scarecrow' is there to keep flocks of rooks away not the more solitary crow and 'as the crow flies' refers to the rooks daily sojourn from their roost to feeding grounds and back (up to 40 km), not the crow in its localised territory. Doesn't quite have the same ring though does it, 'scarerook', 'as the rook flies' . . . no!!

Nature's calendar: February

The last official month of winter but the coldest in England and Wales due mainly to the Atlantic ocean being at yearly minimum temperature, February is however usually drier and less windy.

Most Blue Tits will have partners by the end of the month and frogs will start emerging from hibernation with just one thing on their minds, you got it, breeding! Sweet violets will be flowering along with Mistletoe. Grey herons are early breeders and will now start nesting in earnest. Towards the end of the month the first butterflies may be seen, look out for the Comma, Peacock, Small tortoise shell and Red admiral.

And finally, the first Blackbirds can be heard singing . . . is spring just around the corner! Let's hope so.






Apart from Lucy Perring (trumpet), soloists will include Vanessa Bowers (Soprano).

After a brief business session Judy, our President, welcomed Les Peters and several ladies from the Pangbourne Circle Dancing group. Les began by telling us about how the Circle Dancing movement has evolved. In 1976 Bernhard Wosien, a retired ballet dancer and teacher, was invited to Findhorn, which is a commune in the north of Scotland, to talk about and show the residents folk dances that he had collected in the Balkans. Some of the commune decided to share what they had learned and in the 1980's took them out to the rest of the UK. The name by this time had changed to Circle Dancing and there are now hundreds of groups in the UK and around the world.

Les went on to explain that Circle Dancing is a collection of dances and music from around the world, varying from slow and meditative to energetic and celebratory, and is welcoming and suitable for people of all ages. He outlined the benefits, which included improved joint strength and balance, ease of movement, social interaction and feelings of well-being. He assured us that there are no wrong steps – just variations!

Chairs and tables were moved out of the way to create a large area for dancing and a lighted candle was placed in the centre of this area. The candle represents light and darkness, as in life, and also provides a focal point which helps to keep the circle in shape.

We formed a large circle with people from the Circle Dancing group placed at strategic points to assist us. Les walked us through the steps for each dance before starting the music, which came from many different countries around the world. Altogether a most enjoyable afternoon which was appreciated by both participants and audience alike.

WINNING IMAGES FROM DIGITAL COMPETITION NO. 2 – FLOWING WATER

Member David Belcher produced two very different but equally stunning images. Given the popularity of the subject he knew he had to produce something very different to have a chance of success. I give you *Why are my Feet Wet?* – the river captured is the Tregeseal that flows through the Kenidjack Valley near Cape Cornwall. The image of camera image was home produced. The two images were then merged in Photoshop by placing the camera image on top of the water image and then erasing parts of the top to allow the bottom image to show through.

Just a Splash — with an Evian bottle (other waters are available) David wanted it to achieve a 'just thrown' look with the top flying off. He achieve this by hanging bottle on two lengths of fishing line, a third length of line came from the bottom of the bottle and was fixed to the wall to stop swing. The cap was hung separately. With the bottle half filled with water, it was swung from the left coming to a sudden halt, ejecting the water. The image was taken using a flash to freeze the action. Photoshop was then used to remove the fishing line and give the image a general clean up.

The images came JOINT first! Needing help with Photoshop, just ask.

PANGBOURNE'S TWINNING ADVENTURE

While the twinning movement has its main origins in the years of rebuilding peace and understanding in Europe after World War Two, it was given real impetus following the United Kingdom's admission to the European Common Market in 1973. It was in September 1979 that the first mention of Pangbourne being twinned with a European town was made in the minutes of Pangbourne Parish Council (PPC).

The current Pangbourne Twinning Association management committee (none of whom were around in the early days!) is conducting some research into the history of Pangbourne's twinning adventure. This article is the first in a series which will appear as the story unfolds. We are looking into all available sources, and we invite contributions from those who were involved in the early days.

In early 1980, following some research by the PPC into what twinning entailed, the idea that Pangbourne should find a partner community in Europe developed some momentum. It was felt that twinning had merit in terms of benefitting "many parts of the community including children and the band". However, it had to be self-financing and should be no drain on parish resources (it remains so to this day).

A number of towns were considered before, in December 1980, the Chairman of the PCC received a letter from Guy Heckendorn, the Mayor of Houdan, instigated by Kate Richards, whose mother lived in Pangbourne. Kate was working for a year at the Collège François Mauriac, the secondary school in Houdan.

There were a number of exploratory visits following which mutually favourable impressions were formed. To this day the educational theme remains strong, and there have been recent requests by the French for renewed sporting links.

At the request of the PPC, Parish Counsellor Rev. John Spriggs, a fluent French speaker and Chaplain of Pangbourne College, wrote an article for the Pangbourne Magazine which proposed the idea of twinning. Later, he hiked from Pangbourne to Southampton and from Le Havre to Houdan to underline his commitment and raise support for the twinning idea.

Tony Hampton, proprietor of The Copper Inn (now The Elephant), responded to the article and in June 1981 was asked by the PPC to form and chair a committee, actively supported by the PPC, to take the project forward.

An ad hoc committee was formed, including four members of the PPC. A public meeting was called, and a further article announcing this appeared in the Pangbourne Magazine.

The public meeting was held in February 1982, chaired by Deirdre Lomer, Chair of the PPC, and attended by 30 people. It was agreed that an official Twinning Association be formed, to manage and support the twinning arrangements. A Management Committee of twelve was elected, chaired by Howard Paynter, Head of Modern Languages at Theale Green School. He had been instrumental in arranging school exchanges via the English teaching staff at the Collège François Mauriac.

Tony Hampton, who saw potential business benefits to Pangbourne, became the first Vice-Chair. He served until 1999 and remains a great supporter of Twinning. John Spriggs was appointed President of the Twinning Association, a position held by the Chair of the PPC to this day.

However, not everybody in Pangbourne was convinced that twinning with (in particular) a French town was a good idea. With curious pre-echoes of recent events, some local businessmen waged a press and leaflet campaign against it. The Reading Evening Post headline read "Red twinning plan splits true-blue town", and the Daily Mail had "Entente cordiale runs into a spot of trouble".

Some 2,000 copies of an unsigned leaflet were distributed which read "Populace of Pangbourne: are you aware your village is to be twinned with a nondescript hamlet in socialist France?" There were even calls for a referendum.

Clearly, the authors had never bothered to visit Houdan, which is a prosperous market town some 40 miles west of Paris (in similar juxtaposition as Pangbourne is to London), with a population at least the size of Pangbourne and with beautiful medieval buildings, an important 17th century church, and an imposing medieval donjon (castle keep). It is also an important administrative centre with its own hospital and tourist information office.

The PPC and the pro-twinners successfully rebuffed the initial opposition, making the point, among others, that twinning is not a political matter.

In June 1982 a delegation from Houdan visited Pangbourne and confirmed their intention of partnering with us. In September, a group of 18 from Pangbourne visited Houdan, at their own expense, over the weekend of the annual St Mathieu fair.

Membership of the Twinning Association was invited (annual subscriptions were £1 for individuals, £3 for families and £10 for corporate bodies). The Berkshire Mercury reported that "The Pangbourne Twinning Association is now active, and membership is increasing despite the initial opposition in the village".

These days, subscriptions have been abolished. Membership is now much more informal, being only interested individuals who want to be kept informed of twinning activities, such as our successful French film evenings and twinning visits, and who allow us to hold their contact information.

The formal twinning ceremony took place first in Pangbourne over a weekend visit in May 1983. It included the signing of the twinning documents by PPC







Chair, Deirdre Lomer, and by the Mayor of Houdan, Guy Heckendorn. There was also a service of unity at St James the Less and a tree-planting ceremony in the churchyard.

Formalities were completed in France at the end of May 1984, when 32 people from Pangbourne visited Houdan. The Charters, one in English and one in French, were signed by Guy Heckendorn and Ben Warner, the then PPC Chair. They included the words of hope that the partnership would "enrich the lives and bring friendship to both communities". There was a tree-planting ceremony, a celebration mass at the church and the placing of a wreath on the graves of the seven allied airmen killed when their Lancaster bomber was shot down near Houdan in June 1944.

The latest tribute to these RAF and Royal Canadian Air Force men was in May 2014 on the 70th anniversary of D-Day, during our visit to Houdan.

In July 1984, reflecting John Spriggs's earlier endeavour, a marathon runner set out from Houdan to run to Pangbourne, supported by a cyclist and a car. Unfortunately they got lost in Hampshire and had to be rescued by the police! No satnavs then!

Later, after some disagreement a decision to erect twinning signs at the entrances to the village was taken by the PPC. The vote was 6 to 3. The signs are visible to this day. The framed twinning document is visible above the entrance to the Village Hall, and there are many other twinning artefacts on display at the Hall. Very soon, there will be a model of the donjon at Houdan on view (given to us during the visit from Houdan in May 2019).

The Twinning agreement includes include the oath "to maintain permanent bonds between our two municipalities", and these have been successfully continued ever since. For example, the French sent a party of over 40 to Pangbourne last year. Firm friendships and mutual respect have been a lasting legacy of the twinning adventure.

Times have changed and twinning with them. Within Pangbourne, our community has been strengthened by Twinning Association events, such as quiz nights, barn dances, antiques roadshows, French film nights, the French café at Pangbourne Fête, art cafés in Whitchurch, jazz concerts and many more. They have created real friendships and community bonds.

The money we raise is used purely to host our visitors from Houdan on their visit every other year. There is no financial drain on the PPC – in fact, with our numerous

Village Hall event hires we are a net contributor to parish funds.

The only cost to those who visit Houdan is the coach fare; and for those who host French families the only cost (or should it be investment?) is their bed and board.

No knowledge of the language is necessary, and twinners come in all shapes and sizes! Twinning is not about some sort of private club or French-speaking elite. We would, however, particularly welcome some younger enthusiasts.

Twinning is not political and never has been. It is about spreading friendship and understanding and cultural ties – something even more crucial now with the decision to leave the EU. It reminds us that we will always be European.

Twinning activity is open to absolutely everybody and contributes hugely to Pangbourne's community and cultural life. The Twinning Management Committee operates on the behalf of the PPC. Anybody who gets involved is able to join in and influence what we do or just come along and join the fun. Our AGM will be held on Friday, 27th March. Look out for notices round the village.

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



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PANGBOURNE COLLEGE EXCELS IN ISI INSPECTION



Pangbourne College recently underwent a full Regulatory Compliance and Educational Quality Inspection carried out by the Independent Schools Inspectorate. The College is delighted to announce that the resulting report rated Pangbourne 'excellent' – the highest rating available – across all Educational Quality judgements, as well as meeting all standards for the Compliance criteria.

The school last had a full inspection in 2014, and the results of November's visit from the ISI are the best that the College has had overall, with improvements in several key areas.

The Educational Quality inspection reports on the quality of the College's work, focusing on two key outcomes. The first is the achievement of the pupils, including their academic development, and the other is the personal development of pupils. The College was

The Regulatory Compliance element of the inspection ensures that the school meets the requirements of the Independent Schools Standards Regulations and the National Minimum Standards for Boarding Schools ('boarding NMS'). All of these standards were passed, covering areas that include: quality of education provided, welfare, health and safety of pupils, suitability of staff and proprietors, premises of and accommodation at schools, and quality of leadership in and management of schools.

The Headmaster of Pangbourne College, Mr Thomas Garnier, commented on the report, saying: "This is a testament to the hard work of all of our staff and pupils. Since our last inspection in 2014, we have worked tirelessly to improve all areas of the College and I am delighted that the inspectors recognised this in the excellent outcomes for pupils and found that parents are overwhelmingly satisfied with the education and care offered to their children. We continue to focus on maintaining high academic standards, but as important for Pangbourne is developing character, confidence and the skills to succeed in life after school. For the inspection to show we are doing this to an excellent level is incredibly pleasing."

EXCELLENT RESULTS FOR SENIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

A number of Pangbourne pupils picked up excellent results in the Senior Maths Challenge, which took place last term.

The challenge is mainly pitched at pupils in the Sixth Form, but Pangbourne gained some fantastic results with the addition of two Year 11 students to the team. Several pupils from the lower year group achieved bronze, and even silver certificates.

For those achieving the 'Best in Year Group', certificates went to:

- Jackson Song Best in Year Group (also gained silver)
- Andrew Mullins Best in Year Group (also gained silver)
- Norah Yang and Frank Zhang Gold certificates
- Frank Zhang Top in Year Group and Best in School

Norah and Frank scored extremely highly and also did well enough to be entered into the follow-on rounds which they have already taken part in. They were awarded certificates of participation in the Mathematical Olympiad.

I am very grateful to Ian Nash for the photographs of the Sot's Hole site, and for the following information. Ian tells me that it is not clear when the cottages, in fact two with a small yard between them, were built. The architectural style suggests the late 1920s or early 30s, and yet, being so close to the railway, especially with the noise,



Nowhere in Pangbourne will you find a name-board marked Sot's Hole, nor yet will you find a signpost for it, although it is marked on a large-scale map. It is indeed a hole, and a large one, but on the very edge of the village, along the A329, halfway between the derestricted sign and Child Beale. It is the tiny bridge under the railway, on which is marked the distance of the bridge from Paddington, in miles and chains, an old measurement of 22 yards most easily recognised in the

length of a cricket pitch. Sot's Hole gave access to the river from the land behind, and was the landing area for the big Thames barges which were loaded with timber from the estate above.

oil lamps for lighting, and no running water, which had to be drawn from a pump in the yard. They were pulled down in the 1960s, leaving just the empty wooded space of today.

The main interest for me is in the name itself, and what it can tell us about nicknames in Medieval England surviving through to Modern English as surnames. In what follows I am pleased to acknowledge my debt to the very readable "English Surnames" by Mrs CM Matthews, but I must admit to taking liberties with the names I use. These are

the actual forms of names on a map in 2020. Most of these names will go back to the names in Medieval English that they appear to, but not all, for personal names easily change in form over the centuries.

The criterion I have used is to assume that where a place-name has an 's in the genitive ("of" or "belonging to") it is likely to be a personal name. Thus

Nightingale's Green, Bucklebury, is likely to refer to a person who sang sweetly, whereas without the 's the bird is probably referred to. I grew up in the 1950s in a Nightingale_Road - and regularly heard nightingales there, to prove it.

Also, many of the names that follow are associated with only minor features of the landscape. The individuals whose names survive on these features through to the 21st century probably received their nickname in the period between approximately 1200-1360. The nickname stuck to the individual then, and became hereditary within the family at that period, reinforced by the social intensity of a tightly-knit village community.

The Sot of Sot's Hole is a Norman nickname, bestowed on the original recipient in unknown circumstances. The word survives into Modern English to refer to a habitual drunkard. David Ambler tells me that the popular derivation of the name – since Sot's Hole is on the parish boundary with Basildon – is that it was where the two parishes would put their drunks for the correct, i.e. the other, parish to deal with. However, the actual derivation is more complex, and several hundred years older.

People in love can be 'besotted', and the basic idea is foolishness. As a nickname, Sot might have had the friendly flavour of 'You silly old fool'. In contrast and more dire as a nickname is **Upton Nervet**, held

in the 13th century by Richard Neyrnut, who for whatever reason was considered 'black (Neyr – Modern French noir) as night (nut, changed by clerical error to -vet)'.

The nickname Basset was usually applied by Normans to those 'of low stature' (bas), like their canine counterparts. However, the family of Ralph, who came over with William the Conqueror, is recalled, not for its stature, but its social status. Of very humble origins and referred to as bas by Henry II, Ralph's descendant Alan did very well for himself, acquiring Berwick Bassett, Wiltshire, in 1194, Wootton Bassett before 1211, and Winterbourne Bassett in 1212. How proud (and insufferable?) he would have been when Wootton Bassett became Royal Wootton Bassett in 2011, in recognition of its role in the 21st century, honouring the military funeral corteges passing through the town.

A nickname picks out a characteristic peculiar to an individual, especially in a small community. An easy way to do this is appearance. The Old English equivalent of the Norman bas is sceort, as in Short's Border, Kintbury, and the closely related Small's Farm, Brightwell. Grubbe, as at Grubb's Wood Cottages, Brightwell, recalls a man considered as 'small as a grub', and at Grigg's Wood, Goring, he was a 'dwarf' (grigg). In contrast, one could be tall, as at Long's Farm, Bessels Leigh, large as at Bigg's Cottage, Enborne, or twig-like, as at Sprig's Alley, Chinnor. It was sharp perception indeed that saw the man at Primsdown Farm, Chipping Norton, Prenesdone in 1217, as being like a pin (praen) – a thin man with a small head, perhaps?

Hair colour can be a distinctive feature. Anglo-Saxons were predominantly fair-haired, so that other colours stood out. At Colley's Ladder, Radley, the man's hair was 'coal-black', and of the intense black of the bird at Rook's Copse, Hampstead Norris. Morrell's Shaw, Ashampstead, recalls a little man (-ell) who was as black-haired and swarthy as a Moor (Morr-), whereas the hair of the men at Whitelocks Farm, Bracknell, White's Green, Swallowfield and Snowswick Farm, Buscot, was snow-white. Intensely brown (Burn-), probably of both hair and skin, were the men recalled at Burnell's Farm, Thatcham, and Burnett's Copse, Aldworth. Incidentally, in each of these names the -rhas slipped across the syllable. Thus, the names are more recognisable respectively as Brunel (of railway fame) and girls who are brunettes. However, if gentlemen are said to prefer blondes, the Anglo-Saxon equivalent was 'gold', as at Gould's Farm, Streatley.

One's actual head of hair could also prove significant. The men recalled at Lock's Moor, Stanford Dingley, and Lock's House, Wokingham, probably had luxuriantly growing locks of hair – or possibly it was all a cruel Medieval village joke, and they in fact had no hair at all. In that case they would have been like the men at Cave's Farm, Sandhurst, and Ballard's Copse, Ardley, Oxfordshire, who were quite simply 'bald', either in Norman French (cauf) or Medieval English (ballard).

In a village community where only the upper classes travelled on horseback, how a man moved was carefully observed, with speed particularly valued, for passing messages and similar. He covered the ground speedily at Quick's Green, Upper Basildon, and could run like a hare (levre) at Lever's Piece, Binfield. At Chiver's Gully, Cold Ash, he was as agile as a female goat (chievre), and at Wheat's Farm, Stratfield Mortimer, he was 'active, bold and brave' (hwaet). On the other hand, at Steptoe's Farm, Grove, he 'walked or stepped on his toe', and so 'on tiptoe', in other words lightly.

Qualities of mind and character that were admired include strength, at Streeks Copse, Ashampstead, and wisdom, at Wise's Firs, Sulhamstead. The man recalled at Froud's Farm, Aldermaston, was 'wise or prudent' (frod) and quickwitted at Smart's Copse, Aldermaston. At Spark's Farm, East Hendred, he was lively.

Nicknames stick, even if they are not always complimentary and the family has tried to shake them off. Was the man recalled at Pocock's Copse, Binfield, and known as the 'peacock' handsome, or was he also inclined to be haughty and arrogant? Did the man nicknamed 'bear' at Bear's Farm, Waltham St Lawrence, live in isolation, or was he just

considered savage, unapproachable and unsociable? At Raggett's Lane, Swallowfield, why was the man deemed 'ragged', and at Chuff's, Bray, what had the man done to be nicknamed the 'jackdaw' (ceo), a bird known as a thief? It is a mistake to think of the Medieval village mind as any less perceptive or ingenious than our own.

Nicknames become surnames are legion, and I could go on . . . and on. All the nicknames and their variants that I have mentioned from early Medieval England live on in the names of modern Englishmen. What regularly amuses me is how the features described in nicknames sometimes do too, having travelled in the genes down the generations.

PANGBOURNE AND WHITCHURCH SUSTAINABILITY NEWS

I am writing this article as we prepare for Storm Ciara forecast to hit the whole of the country in the next 48 hours. We have had more intense weather experiences in the UK over the last few years, but still nothing on the scale endured by people in many parts of the world whose property and livelihoods have been destroyed by fire, floods, drought and hurricanes. We do not dwell on the pain of losing family and friends and the impact this has on the lives of children and vulnerable people, but throughout the world particularly in developing countries people are suffering as a result of climate change. How can we help to change these devastating events?

By the time you read this article PAWS will have conducted a vigil in support of the millions of people enduring the effects of climate change. We hope that each public expression of concern reminds us all of the urgency of the situation and continues to put pressure on Government to prioritise climate change strategies into every aspect of governance. An information event will take place outside Garlands Organic shop in Pangbourne to celebrate Earth Day on Saturday 25th April.

PAWS works to give information about the science of climate change and keep us up to date with the science and strategies needed to combat the impact of global warming. This is now seen as so important many new people joined us in our planning event in January offering ideas and being prepared to talk to those in local government who have the power to put sustainability at the forefront of all decision making. It is not enough to simply raise consciousness about the issues; our whole community needs to engage in lowering our individual carbon usage and our community carbon footprint.

CALCULATE YOUR CARBON!

The Environment Committee of St James Church, all members of PAWS, recommend Carbon Independent.org.

It is an easy-to-use calculator and is quite revealing as to where our 'hidden' carbon emissions lie! If you want to join in and need any help to fill in the on-line calculator, Cliff Thorne will be available in the library between 12 and 2 pm on Tuesdays 3 March – 7 April.

Members of St James will be doing this during Lent at the same time as conducting audits of buildings, land usage etc to look at their overall carbon footprint.

PAWs representatives are already working with the local Parish Councils and West Berkshire Council. Unfortunately our representations to West Berkshire regarding waste disposal and recycling continues to fall on uninterested ears – the Council continues to contract with Veolia and has no ambition to create better recycling facilities. What do we have to do to have a service that at least matches that of South Oxfordshire?

With our focus on recycling PAWs will be again at work at the Pangbourne Fete ensuring a plastic free fete and contributing to the litter collection days in Pangbourne and Whitchurch.

PAWS representatives are researching the possibility of being part of a localised energy consortium helping to provide a community energy scheme which helps to install solar panels on public buildings. A new sub group has been formed with Rob Hill as liaison officer.

Action for Pangbourne Toilets will be opening a Drinking Water Fountain on the west wall of the toilet block on Sunday 15th March at 2pm. This project was led by PAWS with the intention of reducing single use plastic and litter. It is jointly funding by PAWS and the Drinking Fountain Association.



PLANNED TREE WORKS

Trees – we love trees – and Pangbourne has lots of them. From the moment they burst into life in the spring to providing shade in the summer right through to giving glorious colour in the autumn, they encourage birds and are a haven for all sorts of bug life, help clear the air we breathe and are a source of pleasure to all. Who doesn't enjoy watching the squirrels scampering around from branch to branch.



We are told we need more trees and Pangbourne is lucky to have so many. Pangbourne Parish Council alone is responsible for over 550 trees quite aside from all others on West Berkshire Council, Public Highways and private land.

However – trees need looking after.

The Parish Council have recently employed a firm of arbiculturalists to survey the trees that belong to the Parish and is about to embark on it's first fully comprehensive program of tree works in a number of years.

The first stage of the work will begin immediately for all the trees identified as needing urgent work in the next three months, followed

by a programme of tree husbandry to maintain the health of the existing tree stock and ensure sustainable growth. In other words general maintenance to ensure the trees remain healthy. Only dead or diseased trees will be removed.

Please do not be concerned if you see this work being carried out around the village, it will be taking place to ensure the safety of everyone. We are fully aware that we will be moving towards the bird nesting season and our contractors have assured us that all measures will be taken to protect the nesting birds. Wherever possible, a proportion of the small branches, leaves and cuttings will be left in situ to create nature piles.

As this work is taking place, we are also digitally mapping all our trees for the first time so that they are easily identified in the future (by age, species, health etc) so that we can more easily maintain this programme into the future. We will also be planting new trees where we can and in consultation with Pangbourne Parishioners. If you have any further proposals for a planting scheme please do get in touch.

For those that are interested and would like to see more detail of the works, we will be putting the tree survey onto our website, however be warned, it's a fairly lengthy document.

PARISH PRECEPT 2020/2021

The Parish Precept is the amount collected by West Berkshire Council on behalf of Pangbourne Parish Council from local residents in order to deliver services within the Parish of Pangbourne.

This year's Precept for 2020/21 has now been set at £113,194.00 although the spending budget for the council for the year is £297,679. The remainder of the funds required to meet this budget are made up of income from the Village hall and so on plus the monies apportioned to the Council as Developers Contributions (CIL funding) and some spending from reserves. Currently the Council is in receipt of a significant amount of CIL, although this fluctuates from year to year depending on what development takes place.

CIL monies are apportioned to be spent on restricted activities related to delivering infrastructure and it is planned to deliver a number of projects around the village over the next year.

The Precept equates to an <u>average</u> £72.24 for a BAND D Property or £1.39 per week although actual bills may vary slightly.

GRANT APPLICATIONS 2020

The Parish Council have limited funds available each year for grants to groups, charities and organisations within the Parish that meet certain criteria.

The Parish Council would like to invite applications for 2020 Financial Year from local groups that meet these criteria to fund projects for the benefit of the residents of Pangbourne.

Applications should be received by 1st April 2020, although it is possible that applications received after this date may be considered in a second round of grants if there are funds remaining.

In 19/20 Year the Parish Council was able to help fund a number of projects including new school playground equipment for Pangbourne Primary School and support for the continued operation of the Public Toilets at Station Road Carpark.

CCTV

Work is taking place to install CCTV equipment at the Recreation Ground to cover both that area and the Meadows track and parts of the Meadows.

It is hoped that this will be in place by the time the playground is fully operational.

PLAYGROUND - UPDATE

Thank you to all families and residents for your continued patience while the playground repairs are arranged. The replacement equipment was ordered before Christmas and we are now waiting both for its arrival and for the ground to be dry out sufficiently that conditions are suitable to lay replacement surfacing. PANGBOURNE RECREATION GROUND

Pangbourne Recreation Ground - a potted history

You may not be aware but the Recreation Ground is formed of two parcels of land, one of which is held in Charitable Trust. One of the things that the Parish Council have been doing over the last year or so, has been to resolve issues around Pangbourne Recreation Ground and updating the Trust so that the council can move forward with plans to invest in this area. The following is a short summary of the history as well as where we are now and what we still need to do.

The Rec consists of 9 acres of land in total made up of two parcels, one of 6 acres and the other of 3 acres.

6 Acre Parcel of Land

On 3rd July 1923 this parcel of land was purchased for the princely sum of £840, with the funds raised by public subscription. The land was sold with several restrictive covenants on its. At the same time the land was put into a charitable trust with 5 Trustees to include:

 Chairman of the Parish Council, Rector of Pangbourne, Chairman of the Council School and two other persons to be appointed by the remaining trustees

A big focus has been on updating this Trust so that it can be properly administered and we have worked with the Charity Commission to agree that the sole trustee of this land is now Pangbourne Parish Council as the former structure is outdated.

Included on this land is the car park, the playground, zipwire, football club, football field as well as the public toilets.

3 Acre Parcel of Land


On 18th April 1931 this parcel of land was purchased for £150 by Durham Stokes, with similar restrictive covenants to the 6 acres.


On 12th May 1931 the land was gifted to Pangbourne Parish at no cost. The land does not fall within the charitable trust although can only be accessed over the charitable trust land. Current users are the Bowls and Tennis Clubs and this area contains the pavilion.

The Future

We think there is much that can be done with the Rec and now that the Charitable Trust has been updated we would like to set up a group of perhaps five or so Parishioners who can help us develop a vision of the future not just for their individual interests and clubs but for the Parish as a whole.
