

Message from the Chair

The past is prologue. C. Bernard Jackson stated that "Art may be the only tool we have left to save ourselves from destruction."

The late Academy Award-winning actor Gregory Peck, along with others, was instrumental in securing the Inner City Cultural Center as a participant with the National Educational Laboratory Theater Project (ELTP).

In Inner City's second inaugural season, 1968, of the ELTP, Jack decided to direct and produce Thornton Wilder's OUR TOWN. Being true to his philosophy of color-blind and non-traditional casting Jack presented the play in Los Angeles with a multi-cultural, ethnic and racial cast. Since this had never been done, the news of this production reached the New York Times. The review's title read:

" 'Our Town' is integrated in Los Angeles.

In the 30 years since Thornton Wilder's 'Our Town' first saw the light of a stage there has been no production with casting so novel and startling...Emily Webb is being played by a Negro, her father by an Apache, her Mother by a Russian-American and her brother by a Mexican-American, her sweetheart and husband by a blond Caucasian, his father by a Japanese-American, his mother by a Negro and his sister by a Chinese-American."

"The concept is right," said Jeannie Joe, 'What's more, multiracial casting will provide a new perspective for producers. I won't have to wait for the next production of 'Flower Drum Song' before I get another chance to act."

- The New York Times December 14, 1968

If past is prologue, the Inner City Cultural Center foreshadowed events to come and established itself unequivocally and unapologetically as the original genesis, i.e., the "O.G." in the space advocating for diversity, equity and inclusion in the arts, culture, stage, screen and television industries.

Thus, Inner City returns with a redux of OUR TOWN to UCLA, where in the late 1950's and early 60's Jack Jackson, a music student and dance rehearsal pianist working with Dr. Alma Hawkins, doing dance movement classes in the Neuropsychiatric Institute, met Dr. J. Alfred Cannon, a mental health expert. Together Jackson and Cannon mutually agreed that the arts could be used as a bridge for cross-cultural communications among the so-called "minority" groups in the city. Joined by others in the UCLA Theater and Dance department faculty and Hollywood notables, the conversations took shape in the green room and people's homes. In contrast to the formation of the Inner City Cultural Center and its ultimate footprint anchored within the "urban cultural core" of Los Angeles, the Center Theater Group with the assistance and input of then Chancellor Franklin D. Murphy, was taking shape. These two cultural icons, one a student and the other a chancellor, helped shape the cultural landscape in the city of Los Angeles whose impact is still reverberating to this day. This is especially true when we look at the issue of diversity, equity and inclusion. As Jack opined, "Art may be the only tool left we have to save ourselves from destruction".

So, under the aegis of the 'Beloved Community' philosophy of UCLA's Josiah Royce, Namesake of Royce Hall, and the late Dr, Martin Luther King, Jr., who adopted Royce's philosophy, Inner City Cultural Center, the "O.G." of diversity, equity and inclusion, returns to the place of its conception with OUR TOWN to engage in a presentation and a discussion of what we thought was already adjudicated but it seems we have to revisit.

And even as we engage in a communal discussion, we also offer a bridge to the future and invite students, staff and faculty as Jack Jackson, Dr. Cannon, Gregory Peck and others did years ago, and ask you to join with Inner City's Cultural Legacy Project in association with the Performing Arts Legacy Project and our Committee of One Thousand, to move forward with the design and building of the new Los Angeles Inner City Cultural Center/C. Bernard Jackson Memorial Library so that we can preserve this cultural legacy.

The new Center Library is the vision we imagine in our mind's eye and see as a solution to build a better bridge overcoming the diversity, equity and inclusion gap that exists in our society.

The End? Not yet. Our present is prologue to what we are set to achieve.

Message from the Co-Founder/Director of the UCLA Beloved Community Initiative

Founded in 1919, today the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) is the #1 public Research University recognized for its medicine, performing arts & athletics. Since 1929, it is located in the Westwood neighborhood of Los Angeles, California.

A key goal of the UCLA Beloved Community Initiative is for our campus to become recognized as a place where Champions of the Beloved Community Are Made.

Here's why.

In 1927, a bridge became the first structure erected on the new Westwood campus. A few years earlier UCLA founders had made the decision to Westwood relocate from East Hollywood. The land purchased from the Janss brothers has afforded UCLA the opportunity to expand, becoming a world class institution and the most applied to college of university in the United States. The UCLA Bridge itself would become known as "The Avenue to the Future."

Born a few days after the UCLA Bridge was inaugurated in 1927, was C. Bernard Jackson, founding director of the Los Angeles Inner City Cultural Center which would also become known as an avenue to the future if you will for aspiring actors, directors, writers, etc. When the new Westwood campus finally opened for academic instruction to begin in the fall of 1929, the founders had expressed that they named the first main classroom building Royce Hall in hopes that the new campus would come to represent the thinking and tradition of Josiah Royce.

It is popular belief that Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., gave the world the noble ideal of the Beloved Community. Dr. King has certainly come to be recognized as the Beloved Community's greatest champion, investing the ideal with a deeper meaning and a higher purpose. However, as it turns out, it is actually Josiah Royce, a late 19th, early 20th century philosopher and educator from Grass Valley, California, who first coined the phrase.

Thus, what the UCLA founders were saying in 1929, is that they wanted UCLA to become the place where Champions of the Beloved Community Are Made.

So what does any and all of this have to do with C. Bernard Jackson and the cultural legacy of the Los Angeles Inner City Cultural Center?

I'll tell you.

C. Bernard Jackson would himself grow up and become a Bruin. And it is on the Westwood campus, in response to Watts exploding, that Jackson gave birth to idea of the Inner City Cultural Center.

As co-founder and director of the UCLA Beloved Community Initiative I am honored to be a part of this worthwhile effort to steward the legacy of C. Bernard Jackson - a true Champion of the Beloved Community if ever there was one.

Since 2020, one of the ways we do this is by presenting the C. Bernard Jackson UCLA Bridge Builders Award on the third Tuesday of April each year, during our annual Beloved Community Luncheon. As we approach his centennial, the UCLA Beloved Community Initiative is committed to finding other ways to help steward the legacy of C. Bernard Jackson. Presenting "Our Town' a play reading by LA Inner City Cultural Center is another example of our commitment. On behalf of the UCLA Beloved Community Initiative, our partners and stakeholders, thank you for joining us.
