

There is great irony in our country's November celebrations. In our Church, we remember our deceased brothers and sisters on All Souls Day. Before Vatican II, vestments for the masses were black. Today the emphasis is on that great gift of Resurrection. I had a dream recently that deepened this truth in me and in my life. As many of you know, I lost my sister, Maureen, suddenly, about 5 years ago. Her memory, her presence and her felt absence are with me on a daily basis, especially when I am with my LAOH family. In the dream, Maureen was young, beautiful, whole and healthy. I hugged her and said, "I missed you so much when you were dead." Read that again..." WHEN you were dead." In other words, she is no longer dead but risen. I still miss her, but my faith consoles me. She is, as the Irish say, "in a better place and wouldn't trade places with me." In Case You Missed October's Irish History Report:

Biddy Early - The Magical Lady of Clare

Born in 1798 in Faha, Kilanena, Bridget Ellen "Biddy" Connors was the daughter of a poor farming family. Biddy was baptized Bridget Ellen Connors, but later adopted the "Early" name which was her mother's maiden name. At 16, her mother died leaving Biddy in charge of the household. Just six months later, her father died. Biddy was sent to work as a servant girl and later to Kilbarron to work for a doctor. It was necessary for Biddy to go into service at such a young age to help her family survive in such hard times.

It was in Kilbarron that she met and married Pat O'Malley, and the couple had one child, a daughter. Pat died, however, after a few short years of marriage and Biddy was a widow at age 25. She later married her stepson John and he passed away leaving Biddy a widow once again at age 42. Her third husband was Tom Flannery from Carrowroe, who was much younger that she was and who sadly died when their only child Tom was only 8 years old.

It was about the time of this husband's death that the first story of Biddy's magical powers occurs. Biddy, being unable to pay the rent to the local landlord because of her husbands' death and the expense of rearing her young son, was served with an eviction notice. The night before the eviction was to take place, her dead husband Tom visited her and told her that when the police arrived the following day to tell them to "stay where you are", and they would leave and return no more. Thus, the following day when they arrived, Biddy said the words her husband had told her to say and the five policemen and sheriff were stuck to the roadside for two hours being unable to move. After two hours, Biddy told them to go away and never return, and the lock which Biddy had put on them was broken and they ran off with their tails between their legs never to bother this lady and her magical powers ever again.

Of all the tales of Biddy's magical powers, none were as fascinating as her "Blue Bottle" with which it was said she could see the future. Her son Tom died as a young man, but being worried about how his poor widowed mother would survive now that he was dead, Tom returned from the dead, to give her this magical "Blue Bottle". He told her "take this mother and it will make a living for you", and this bottle did indeed make her a living. People from all over the country were to seek Biddy's predictions for the future which were said to be amazingly accurate down to the last detail. It was also said that if a weary traveler was coming many miles to meet Biddy, she would see him coming in the bottle and meet him half way.

Biddy was visited also, for her great healing potions which it was said healed most ailments. Biddy had a well at the side of her house, the water from which possessed the most magical powers, and if given with her consent, could cure a person of any affliction. Animals were of enormous importance, the death of a cow or pig could mean failure to pay rent and the death of a working horse could mean destitution. In this time of no veterinarians, Biddy was relied upon to cure the most serious of animal ailments of which it was said she could cure very effectively with a drop of water from her well, or one of her potions. Biddy, not being a selfish woman, did not make a great fortune from her powers, she only accepted a jug of poteen or whiskey, or perhaps some food for her services but never money. It was said that never was a tired traveler turned from her door and many a passer-by was given a jug and a seat in front of her warm fire.

Another great power which Biddy is accredited was her ability to talk to and cure the wrath of the fairies. People used to come to her who had been bewitched by the "little people". One man had his entire herd of cattle cursed by the fairies and they all became violently ill. On the advice of one of his friends, he went to see Biddy. After looking into her bottle, she saw the problem. He had planted a whitethorn bush along a fairy path

in his field. She instructed him to go home and remove the bush. As soon as he had done this, his entire herd immediately returned to full health.


It is said by some that Biddy had six husbands, of this they cannot be sure, but know that she had at least four, the last being a man less than half her age. A man called O'Brien from Limerick visited her who was close to death and asked her to cure him. She said she would only cure him if he married her to which he agreed, and after he recovered, the couple were married.

In 1865, Biddy was accused of witchcraft under the Witchcraft Act of 1586 and was brought before a court in Ennis. This would have been unusual in the 1860's. The few who agreed to testify against her later backed out. She was released for lack of evidence. Many of the local people supported her.

Although Biddy possessed such great powers, she was unable to prevent her own death. She died in poverty in April of 1874. Her magical bottle was never seen after her death and it has been said that she only had a loan of the bottle from the fairies who took it back upon her death.

Americans receive tens of millions of unsolicited automated calls and texts daily, with millions of robocalls reported each month. This is an issue at the top of consumer complaints, and there are various strategies to combat them, such as using spam-blocking apps and registering on the National Do Not Call Registry.

Spam-blocking apps

These services use databases to identify and block unwanted calls and messages. Free versions are available, but premium features like more advanced call identification and blocking often require a paid subscription.

Apps can sometimes produce "false positives," blocking legitimate calls, so users should monitor their blocked call logs.

Major mobile carriers also offer their own call-filtering services.

The project began with free farmers' markets for residents afraid to shop and evolved into a home delivery service, highlighting the isolation of many elderly and disabled individuals and emphasizing community connections beyond just providing food.

These unwanted calls and texts can waste time, cause frustration, and sometimes expose individuals to scams. Americans receive tens of millions of unsolicited automated calls and texts daily, with millions of robocalls reported each month. This is an issue at the top of consumer complaints, and there are various strategies to combat them, such as using spam-blocking apps and registering on the National Do Not Call Registry.

Spam Blockers & Caller IDs: Most blocking services use a database to identify and block spam, scam, and robocalls. While some are available as a free app for iPhones and Android phones, <u>most have</u> optional premium features that can identify incoming calls so you know if an unfamiliar number is safe, can automatically block calls based on known spammers, as well as numbers you manually add.

With most of the free versions, the key and most effective features are not available. (Most apps and phone carriers have transferred these features to the paid subscriptions.)

***False positives: While these apps provide a great tool to combat these unwanted call/texts, they may also sometimes block legitimate calls, so it's good to check the app's settings or monitor its behavior (blocked call logs), especially for essential contacts like the doctors! Call blocker apps for iPhone/Android

Hiya: Spam Blocker & Caller ID **It is pre-installed on some Samsung devices as a built-in feature called Samsung Smart Call.

Mr. Number: (Spam call blocker) There are also in-app purchases, but a subscription is now required for all users.

AT&T ActiveArmor® is a free app (iOS, Android) that filters out potential fraud and spam calls, labels telemarketers as "nuisance calls," and sends unknown callers to voicemail. The app also checks your passcodes and provides data breach alerts.

ActiveArmor Advanced Mobile Security: \$3.99 monthly

T-Mobile Scam Shield: T-Mobile has Scam Shield for postpaid T-Mobile and Metro customers.

Scam Shield Premium: adds voicemail-to-text, block lists, and an option to send certain calls to voicemail. \$4 monthly

Verizon Call Filter: \$3.99 a monthly per line, the paid version of Call Filter adds Caller ID, a personal spam list, and other features.

What You Find Behind That OOO Solution OOO Note: The second of the Riverwards, One Cover Knock at a Time

An 83-year-old retired Catholic school-teacher, wrapped in a shower curtain to keep warm.

Two spinster sisters, seamstresses by trade living on Aramingo Avenue, sharing a tea bag and eating birdseed on a cracker with peanut butter.

A Vietnam Veteran in Bridesburg, laying on his kitchen floor after tripping and waiting for someone to find him.

Those are just some of the hungry senior citizens and veterans that LAOH 87 member, Patty-Pat Kozlowski and her volunteers find when they knock on the doors and deliver food baskets and prepared meals with their Food Is Love organization.

Kozlowski started Food Is Love after seeing the need to provide grocery staples to seniors and needy families during the Coronavirus shutdown. As a founding member of Port Richmond On Patrol & Civic (PROPAC), their board members and volunteers began having weekly free farmers' markets in the community during the Covid-19 restrictions.



"Our seniors were afraid to grocer shop with the virus, the crowds and fights and even if they did make it to Shop Rite, they couldn't get food, it was sold out or too expensive," she said.

Anne and Ken Paul of PROPAC had a great relationship with Caring For Friends, a huge food bank in Northeast Philadelphia and every week they would rent a U-Haul truck and go pick up as much food as they could-fresh produce, bread, dairy and meats.

Kozlowski was managing partner of a food truck business and had a full inventory, canceled events and an empty commissary still having to pay rent so it was the perfect storm to simply give all the food away to those who needed it.

Bridesburg Rec Center, Samuels Playground, St. George schoolyard and the Grace Church Incarnate became the place to go when PROPAC sent out Facebook posts letting people know food was

ready to be distributed. The first day about two dozen people showed up, the next week about 50 and soon, hundreds and hundreds of people were lined up down the block.

If there were any leftovers, Kozlowski would bag it up and simply leave it on senior's front porchsteps or in their alleyways. Once, she delivered gallons of whole milk to an entire block in Bridesburg- "I was like the old-fashioned milk man, I didn't have a horse and carriage, just a Jeep and a tubby dog named Gary riding shotgun!"



markets for almost two years and it was a life saver for some people," Kozlowski said. "Not only did our hungry families need the food, but they need to see and hear people after being locked down during the worldwide virus. "A tenminute wait in line and then a simple conversation through facemasks-the simple human

interaction made a world of good."

On weekends, PROPAC and Food Is Love volunteers would make hundreds of sandwiches and salads and drop off food to police, fire and hospitals to feed the staff who were on the front lines. When Philadelphia was hit with riots and looting in 2020 and 2021 due to civic unrest, their volunteers fed the National Guardsmen that were stationed on Aramingo Avenue along the commercial strip. Local businesses like Kitty's Luncheonette, Donna's Bar, Czerw's Polish Provisions, Pat's Auto Tags and Marie's Beauty Shop helped feed over 1500 law enforcement officers over a long weekend.



Long after Covid, the need to feed seniors, veterans and families in need continues. As the 2025 holidays approach, Food Is Love has fed over 25,000 people in the Philadelphia riverwards.

"Our seniors and veterans need grocery staples, we try to give them fresh lunchmeats, Tastykakes, coffee, butter and they always want ginger-ale! If they have a dog or cat, we give them pet food too because these seniors will give their dog a piece of ham before they themselves eat."

The LAOH87 has always been a supportive partner every season and donated funds to feed seniors and Vets in Fishtown, Port Richmond, Bridesburg and Kensington. LAOH87 members like Anne Marie Kuvik, Joann Walls and President Maria Gallagher have packed baskets during Thanksgiving and Easter Week at St. George Hall as well.

Food Is Love 2025 already has a list over 300 residents asking for Thanksgiving meals and baskets. Kozlowski plans fundraisers and relies on local businesses and residents for donations to feed the community. The people of the riverwards always take care of their own.

To donate to Food Is Love 2025 for this upcoming holiday season, you can VENMO @yopattypat or volunteer Thanksgiving Week to pack up baskets and platters.

"You never know what's behind that door you knock on, it's heartbreaking to see our greatest generation in poverty and having to stretch their food," said Kozlowski. "If we run out of money or supplies, I order them a cheesesteak or ask my mom to make to-go platters from whatever she made for



dinner the night before because nobody goes hungry in the Philadelphia Riverwards."
