The graduation ceremonies for the class of 1961 proceeded very smoothly in the crowded auditorium of Lachine High School last Friday, October 27. One hundred sixty-one graduates were presented with their diplomas.

Mr. John Pitcairn of the Lachine Home and School Association acted as the Chairman of the occasion.

The Invocation was pronounced by Dr. J. W. Patterson and the Benediction by the Reverend J. A. Crabb.

Music was supplied by the Lachine High School Singers and the Lachine High School Glee Club under the direction of Mr. Frederick McLearn with Miss J. Meacock as accompanist.

In his annual greetings, Mr. G. T. Graham, Principal, expressed his appreciation to all members of the staff who had contributed so greatly to the success of the year and welcomed Mr. Chesley Sadko as the new Vice-Principal. In his remarks to the students, he urged them to maintain a proper balance of work and leisure in their lives so that they could continue to advance. Particularly, he cautioned them to do as well as they could in everything. Others may be deceived for a limited time, but not oneself.

In his address to the graduates, Dr. John Hughes took as his subject "Life's Quests." He named as the three main quests the following: the quest for a life work -- something sensible and constructive to do in the service of God and man. He told them how important it is to find congenial work. He urged them to seek a life partner, a well-understood and most satisfying calling -- teaching. Secondly, the quest for a life partner, a choice of extreme importance for the lasting happiness of all concerned. He touched upon the prerequisites of a happy, stable, contented marriage. Thirdly, and most important of all, there is man's quest for God. Man finds himself truly only when he has found his Heavenly Father. Dr. Hughes urged the graduates to face a troubled world with steady courage -- "the loveliest of the virtues" -- avoiding the two extremes of Pollyanna optimism and of craven pessimism.

Judgement Handed Down in Noel Case

City Council has received a judgement dated October 20 and handed down by district Judge Bourquet, regarding the case of Chief A. R. Noel vs the City of Dorval.

The case has been pending since August 1960, when Council dismissed Chief Noel and placed the dismissal before the courts for verification. According to law, a dismissal of this kind requires court verification before becoming effective. Shortly after the City Council had taken the case to Court, Chief Noel made petitions to the Court stating that the dismissal was, in effect, illegal. 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Over 200 Ask Mrs. Casgrain To Run

Last Sunday afternoon, a delegation composed of people representing Liberal Party Organizations from all parts of the constituency of Jacques Cartier Lasalle converged on the home of Mrs. Clare Kirkland-Casgrain for the purpose of asking her to place her name before the forthcoming Liberal Convention to choose a candidate for the December 14th Provincial by-election to be held in Jacques Cartier-Lasalle. The convention will be held November 20 in Lachine.

Mrs. Casgrain graciously consented to have her name placed with 5 others, seeking the Liberal nomination for the election called to fill the vacancy created by the death of her father Dr. Charles Kirkland long-time M.P.P. for the constituency.

In a press conference held shortly after her acceptance, Mrs. Casgrain gave her reasons for accepting, the encouraging male backing that she has received from all quarters along with her desire to help implement the Liberal platform which brought them back to power in the June 1960 General Election.

Mrs. Casgrain, a mother of three children, has been actively practicing law in the Province for the past 10 years. Her husband is also a practicing lawyer.

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JOHN PRATT REPORTS FROM OTTAWA

I would like to continue on a subject which I introduced last week, shelters for nuclear survival. As I said last week, the problem of nuclear survival is a vast and complex one, not only to the general public but to the leaders of all the world's governments. Most governments are faced with the dilemma of attempting to halt the spread of nuclear weapons, on the one hand, in order to prevent the possibility of an accidental war, and attempting, on the other hand, to obtain a sufficient supply of these very same nuclear weapons in time to use them in self defence on any aggressor that might launch a nuclear war against them. It must be remembered that, should these weapons have to be used as a last resort, it takes time, not only to obtain them but to train the armed forces in their efficient use.

The very nature of nuclear weapons makes it almost certain that there will be no formal declaration of any future war. Such a war is likely to be launched suddenly, and with as much surprise as possible, at the end of a short and sudden deterioration of international relations. The more or less secret planning might take months, but the sudden deterioration might be a mere matter of days. In the missile age, the actual launching and retaliation may be only a matter of hours or even minutes. At the present time we are coming to the end of the aircraft era and entering the missile era. We have not yet completely dispensed with aircraft nor have we yet completely achieved a satisfactory dependence upon missiles that would justify the complete abandonment of manned aircraft. Consequently we are, at the moment, in a period of imponderables and unknown quantities.

Technical progress is accelerating so rapidly that neither side is at all sure of the precise effectiveness of the weapons it possesses, and even how or when it is going to act. No one knows who is going to do what, with what, and there seems to be some growing doubt in the world today as to the key question of who is going to do it first.

All these, and many other complex issues, are just part of the background of problems that have to be understood and properly assessed before one can even commence to discuss the equally complex question of nuclear shelters. Whether or not we should build such shelters, is of course, in the first instance, merely a question of whether or not we are going to have a nuclear war. It is both as simple and as complex as that. It would be folly to build them if we are not going to have a war, and folly not to build them if such a war is inevitable. Who knows? Neither the people nor the governments.

The only possible procedure of assessing this profound problem is by a continuing daily assessment of the international by-play that ebbs and flows between the great powers as they talk peace on one day and jockey for positions to destroy each other on the next.

This then is the situation that faces a peaceful government such as ours in Canada when it has to decide on a policy for nuclear shelters. The cold war drags on, now hotter now colder, and unless there is definite evidence of an increasing and permanent improvement, we can only presume, insofar as a policy of national safety is concerned, that the world situation is slowly but surely deteriorating. This is not pessimism. This is the position that has to be taken by those responsible for our safety and our national defence. It is very similar to our police forces that have to presume that crime will continue, and our fire forces that have to operate on the presumption that buildings will continue to catch fire. This is their job, just as it is the job of those in charge of our external affairs to do everything in their power to avoid war and bring about a lasting peace by the use of diplomacy, reason, and compromise.





DIET DISPENSARY RUNS COOKING SCHOOL

For the first time in its history the Montreal Diet Dispensary, a Red Feather agency, is featuring a cooking school as part of its fall program of courses, it has been announced by Mrs. Agnes Higgins, executive director of the dispensary.

Margaret Oliver, food editor of Weekend Magazine and former manager of Betty Crocker's Service of Canada. The course

is being held on Tuesday evenings from Oct. 3 to Nov. 28. In making the announcement Mrs. Higgins explained that the course is the result of requests from members who have taken other courses at the dispensary.

"People may find it strange that we should be running a

cooking school," Mrs. Higgins said, "but actually there is real need today for courses in basic cooking for young homemakers. Many young women are so busy pursuing their studies and later working in their chosen fields that they just don't have time to learn very much about cooking."

"All our courses are related," Mrs. Higgins said, "and each one supplements the others. There are actually two needs to be met in nourishing a family. We need to meet the physical on which is found in kinds, amounts and nutrients of foods. We must also meet the emotional need -- to be fed with care. A woman express this care through her choice of menu, through the food she buys, along with loving care, and through the care with which she serves it."

ver explained that the cooking school would be a basic cooking course -- "batters and dough, meat and potatoes." Topics to be covered include skills in measuring, mixing and converting.
